# A Message from the Senior Pastor


It is hard to believe that it's already April, and that it's already Easter time! What a year we've had, and how glad I am to reflect on the story of Easter in the midst of it.

I think it's easy for us to gloss over the importance of the Easter message. In an increasingly secular world, something interesting has happened in the last decade or so: The folks once jokingly called "Creasters" or "twice a year Christians," folks whose church attendance was only on Christmas and Easter, have become once a year Christians. That one time a year? Christmas, not Easter. I have a working theory on why this is: the calendar. Christmas is always on December 25, but because Easter is a lunar calendar holiday, it moves around. And you know what? Maybe it is okay that people who are not actively part of the church are not as aware of the Christian calendar as they once were.

But what if Christians ensured that people all over the world, even if they didn't know our calendar, knew about the good news of the resurrection? What if we lived so thoroughly as world-changing, love-bringing, hope-filled resurrection people that everyone knew about Easter, even if they didn't know when it was?

This last year has changed so many things for so many people, and some of those changes — good ones and bad ones — are probably here to stay. But what hasn't changed is that the tomb really was empty all those years ago, and Jesus showed us that love wins in the end. Jesus's call to each one of us to live our lives in certain hope of resurrection is as true and as difficult today as it was 2000 years ago. So lets get busy showing people what Easter really looks like.

#### Summer Camp Update!

**Lakeview**—Lakeview is a stay-away summer camp located in Palestine, Texas. Children entering the third grade in the fall through recently graduated high school seniors are able to attend.

At Lakeview, your children will take part in a number of faith-building classes, worship, and studies but that is far from all we'll do. There is generous time given for all the classic camp activities you'd expect. From paintball to fishing, ropes courses to crafting, water slides, and square dancing, there's lots for children of all ages to engage in. **UM ARMY**—Our UM ARMY will be a mixed-aged camp so any student who is entering junior high in the fall through those who have recently graduated can attend. Got college-aged kids? They can register too in more of a leadership role. Think of yourself as a big kid? Adults can register too!

UM ARMY is a service-led summer camp. Our church will join churches from many different areas as we work together to assist individuals and families with repair and construction projects. In the evening we return to the host church that everyone stays at for evening programs and worship.

**Registration will be open soon**. Once it is, we'll send an update out with more information. We also don't have our location information yet but I will let you know separately when we have that. UM ARMY did release a draft of their safety protocols for this summer and I (who am very cautious in these matters) was pleased with the measures suggested. When registration opens, I'll also send out their safety requirements for camp. (edited)

UMYF—Youth will be back on Sunday, April 18th from 5-7 PM. At this session, we will talk about the results of the St. Stephen's listening sessions and about how we may implement some of the suggestions, especially from the youth. Topics will likely include increasing the number of UMYF evenings a month, moving back inside, and any facility or amenity suggestions brought to light. We'll also have our usual fun, games, dinner, and Bible study.

**VBS**—Our VBS registration will open Tuesday, March 30, at 9:00 am! We have had to make a few changes this year to accommodate the world we currently live in. All of the necessary details can be found during the registration process. This year our theme is Discovery on Adventure Island. At VBS, children will explore ways God shines great light in the world, and learn how they can also shine God's light by reflecting what they've learned. The cost is \$15 for one registration and there are discounts for siblings. Children of volunteers attend for free!

## Welcome, New Member!


