On Being Methodist

In small Methodist history museum in Oxford, England, I got shown a fascinating and strange piece of Methodist ephemera. It was a small piece of cardstock, maybe 2 inches by 3 inches with various small tabs pulled off around its circumference. What I viewed in the case was literally an 18th century version of a Methodist punch card. Every time you met with your group, you got your card punched. If you failed to come to enough meetings and thus accumulate enough punches in a sufficiently short amount of time, they would kick you out of your local branch of Methodism.

Two things about this:

One, John Wesley was a brilliant theologian and skilled organizer who understood clearly many aspects of the faith and Christian community. He was also an incredibly intense, overly driven individual, who often drove even the people closest to him out of his life. So, I promise that we don't need to emulate everything that he did. We'll be okay.



Two, the early Methodist weren't running a church. They ran a discipleship movement. They assumed that you would go to the Church of England for weekly worship, Communion, Baptism, weddings, funerals, and ordination. Methodism, at that time, functioned a voluntary, parachurch organization, so removing someone from Methodism didn't cut them from the Body of Christ. Instead, it merely meant that they didn't share the same focus of fellow Methodist – intensive, communal discipleship.

The punch card speaks to something deep though. Methodism, as a movement, began as a small group discipleship opportunity. Wesley framed God's grace in turns of a journey of sanctification, and he insisted that those who wanted to go on this journey do it together through intentional, accountable relationships. Something important happened when we do this with others. To quote Wesley himself, "There is no holiness without social holiness." They met regularly in small groups and larger groups to study, serve, and check in our each other's souls. That was the method behind Methodism. Overtime and especially with its arrival on this side of the Atlantic, Methodism evolved into something more like a what we now call a denomination with its own churches, clergy, sacraments, and seminaries. We grew and grew, becoming one of the largest forms of Protestant Christianity globally. However, with that growth, it could be easy to miss our most distinct claim on church life – coming together to continue our growth as Christians outside of the Sunday morning experience.

In the coming weeks, we will have a couple of opportunities to live into more Methodist identity. Every Thursday night, from now until October, at 6:30pm, we will be offering some kind of discipleship opportunity. Right now, Mary Wenzel is offering a way to explore your faith through art. In June, we will have an opportunity to explore faith through writing. In July, I will begin an intensive survey of the Old Testament entitled, "Speed Dating the Old Testament." From my own personal life, I know that a lack of childcare is one of the key barriers for folks, so childcare is offered every Thursday night for those who want to be a part of the studies.

On June 1, immediately following worship, we will have a Missions Fair in the Fellowship Hall. There will be representatives from all of the various ways you can work with others to make church life happen and folks from several of our nonprofit partners with opportunities to serve beyond the church walls – out into the community.

All of this is connected to an active, engagement, communal discipleship that has been at the heart of Methodism from its inception.

75th Anniversary—The very first service held by the people who would make up St. Stephen's occurred on Sunday, May 21st, 1950. The service took place at Oak Forest Park near where the backstop and pool are now. There was a single story garage built for a small fire engine, and just a small handful of people gathered to worship that day.

Over the following years, St. Stephen's moved around taking up residence in a house on Ebony Lane, and later the Garden Oaks Theater. This was until 1952, when a sanctuary was built at our current location albeit where the Fellowship Hall stands now.

St. Stephen's has been a part of the Oak Forest Community for seventy-five years. We have welcomed thousands of people into our space from preschoolers to seniors, and held every type of service from baptisms to funerals, and everything in between. We will have a larger celebration of this milestone later in the year but we will mark the anniversary in smaller ways as we approach May 21st, and in worship on May 25th.

Our five teachers and amazing parent chaperones made our walking field trip to TC Jester Park on Earth Day a great one - we completed a nature scavenger hunt, enjoyed a picnic lunch and LOVED the newly remodeled playground! Thankfully, the playground was cleaned up that morning since Easter festivities had left quite a mess and the bathroom doors were unlocked for us - big KUDOS for the Houston Parks Department for coming through for us. Leaf rubbings were done by most classes once we got back because the humidity got the better of us by the end. Some of the classes were even able to release their live butterflies that day - what perfect timing after carefully growing our little caterpillars in each classroom for the week prior.



Why did we organize this walking field trip? A calm walk in nature is not something most of us take the time to do often enough with our busy schedules, especially in our Houston climate. Really noticing nature, acknowledging how much beauty is all around us, and just doing something simple like a walk has so many benefits. We have also done research on the value of "loose parts play" and why our short and structured school day could use more time with this type of focus.

What are the benefits of this type of "loose parts play"?





If you see children engaged in loose parts play, you can see for yourself the true benefits and our parent volunteers can attest to this. Children get REALLY involved, much more than in adult-led activities. They have fun and learn so much at the same time with the extensiveness of the creativity being all their own. Since it is open-ended, this type of play helps students explore, observe, investigate, construct, deconstruct, and engage with others and nature. Their imagination is limitless and playing in small-group settings develops that imagination even more, plus they are able to set their own agenda for play, and use all the items found on a nature walk in a multitude of ways.
