

Sermon on the Mount Sermon Notes - Part 24 Title: From Me to Us July 13th, 2025

Main Scriptures: Matthew 7:12 [5:17, 5:20, 6:10]; 2 Corinthians 1:3-7

Main Idea: The Golden Rule is more than kindness—it's desire-driven love that reflects

God's heart and invests in others.

1. The Golden Rule (Matthew 7:12)

- Matthew 7:12 points us back to Matthew 5:17-20 [repeat signs]
- "Do to others..." reflects the Law and the Prophets—everything Jesus came to fulfill ("the Law and the Prophets" is shorthand for the Old Testament)



- Matthew 5:17 says He fulfills the Law and the Prophets.
- Matthew 5:20 says we are called to a greater righteousness.
- Matthew 7:12 says that kind of life is the fulfillment of the Law and the Prophets.
- → The Golden rule is not just about being polite; it's about participating in God's greater righteousness—*representing God's heart*

2. From Obedience to Desire (Matthew 7:12 to 6:10)

- The Golden Rule isn't just about behavior—it's about what we want for others.
- (7:12) "would" (Greek = thelo) to desire, to will, to long for
 - Thelo appear 2x in the Sermon—Matthew 6:10 ("your will [thelo] be done") and here in 7:12
- → If God's will is **the seed at the center** of the Sermon on the Mount, the fruit it produces is a life that desires what God desires.

3. "Do to" = "Invest in" (Matthew 7:12)

- (7:12) "Do to" (Greek = *poieo*) to act; context here implies an intentional action—an active investment in the well-being of others
- Faith in Action 2 Corinthians 1:3-7
 - God comforts us so that we can comfort others—it's spiritual investment—sharing in one another's suffering and healing.
 - Quote: "If my desire really is just for me, then the 'self' is me. I am 'me,' and that's it. But if my desire is extending out to the community, my sense of self is expanded. I am not merely 'me,' I am an extension of this community. I am 'us.' My well-being is wholly wrapped up with the well-being of my neighbor." (Bible Project, Sermon on the Mount Podcast, Episode 33)
- Real-Life Example: Corrie ten Boom's story of forgiveness reflects "do to others." (quote from her book, The Hiding Place)

→ 1 Corinthians 13:13 reminds us what lasts: "faith, hope, and love—and the
greatest of these is love ." This kind of love doesn't come naturally—it's learned
by walking with Jesus daily.

5. Reflection Questions:

•	What do I truly desire? Are my desires self-centered or Jesus-centered?
•	In what ways can Linvest in others this week? Who is one person I could

encourage or comfort with the same comfort God has shown me?
