

## "Come and fill us with your peace, you alone, O Lord, are Holy!"

I spoke with a Jewish friend of mine from high school the other day. He was torn. On the one hand, he felt threatened by the attack from Hamas on Israel and the rise of anti-semitism across the world. Yet he knew that Israel's response was causing too many civilian deaths. The world seems too complex and locked in violent ways that lead to cycles of revenge. We clamor for peace, yet we are unsure how to get there.

It is not simply in the world that peace seems elusive. In our own hearts, there seems to be a constant nagging that things are not right. During the height of the pandemic, anxiety rates shot up and they've been reluctant to go down. There seems a constant sense that we lack the time, head or heart space to make sense of how fast life comes at us. We clamor for peace, yet we are unsure how to get there.

"He shall be called wonderful counselor, mighty God, everlasting Father, the Prince of Peace" Isaiah, 730 BC.

As Christians, we believe that Isaiah was referring to Jesus, whom we confess to be the Prince of Peace. This Advent (the church season leading up to Christmas in which we prepare for the coming of Jesus), we will reflect on Jesus as our peace. We will celebrate and rejoice in the ways in which Jesus has already brought about peace. We will also acknowledge where we lack peace in our lives and pray for the peace of Christ to enter our lives. The ministry of St. Paul throughout Advent – worship, bible studies, devotional materials, intergenerational events – is designed to focus us on the peace of Christ.



#### Ways in which you can dwell in the peace of Christ this Advent

**Worship:** We will have worship on Sundays, but also on Wednesdays at 7 PM.

**Small Groups:** A number of study and fellowship groups meet on Sunday mornings. If you are looking for a place to process your life in light of the stories of Scripture and the peace of Christ, we have room for you! We will also offer Pod and Pub during Advent on Thursday nights.

Intergenerational Events: Each Sunday evening we have an intergenerational event, starting with the making of an Advent wreath, a great way to focus your faith in this busy time of year.

Advent Devotional & Online Calendar: In addition to print Advent devotionals, we will also have an Online devotion calendar with links to various St. Paul staff-created videos and audio files for daily devotions.

#### When does all this happen?

Technically, Advent IV falls on December 24. However, to avoid it coinciding with Christmas Eve, we have shifted Advent IV up a week. This year, Advent will begin on November 26th, at St. Paul.

#### Weekly themes for Advent:

Nov 26, Peace in ourselves
Dec 3, Peace in our families
Dec 10, Peace in our community
Dec 17, Peace in the world

Our hope is that as we anticipate the arrival of Christ, that our prayer "Come and fill us with your peace, you alone, O Lord are Holy!" will indeed be answered!



## **Measuring Progress**

GOAL STEPS TAKEN IN PROGRESS

Welcome the next 300 visitors & integrating 150 to active participation.

- Narthex renovations began, including painting, lighting and a coffee station.
- Revamped new member process.
- Added additional faith formation groups on Sundays
- Continuing narthex improvements
- Researching social media trends to expand our reach.
- Learning REALM database to streamline integration.

Add additional worship opportunities and reduce barriers for people unfamiliar with church or Lutheran tradition

- New cameras in sanctuary for improved online worship
- Prayer labyrinth near completion.
- Increased Lutheran content in adult faith formation, including having adult confirmands.
- Implemented a dinner church model for Lenten midweek services.
- Forming "Green Team" committee for longrange Sacred Grounds planning.
- Creating a teaching video on how to use the labyrinth
- Continue expanding learnings opportunities around "fundamentals"

Leverage existing outside relationships to drive participation and share faith

- Reorganized CELC leadership to include church members serving on governing committee.
- Defined priorities within outreach ministries, designating ministries into tiers of financial and communication commitment.
- Developed form for submitting outreach project requests.
- Beginning to share the newly defined outreach priorities and project request forms.
- Expanding ministry with CELC; more chapels and also more baptisms of CELC people at St. Paul!

Design and implement an appropriate structure that allows us to implement strategic plan.

- Our major changes are outlined above.
- Hired Director of Operations
- Director of Operations to implement "invisible" infrasturcture.

#### **BUDGET 2024**

Advancement of internal strategic initiatives will be a core focus of the 2024 budget. While much of the prior year was spent improving the physical infrastructure of the St. Paul campus, including solar panels, a new white roof on the education wing, sanctuary LED lighting, worship cameras, and painting the narthex, the primary focus for the coming year will be internal infrastructure. By internal infrastructure we mean the people, systems, and tools needed to drive ministry, mission, and organizational growth.

#### Comparison of 2023 and 2024 Budget

**Worship & Music** 2023 Budget: \$13,900 **2024: \$13,500** 

The small decrease is a result of budgeting more in line with expense expectations. Important expenditures continue to remain music, instrument maintenance, and guest musicians.

**Faith Formation** 2023 Budget: \$27,000 **2024: \$26,600** 

In 2024 a Youth Gathering will take place instead of the summer mission trip. Fortunately, a strong reserve in the youth dedicated fund will keep the anticipated budget for next year in line with 2023. Additional key expenditures will remain the ministries of summer camperships, VBS, and confirmation camp.

Mission & Outreach 2023 Budget: \$26,600 **2024: \$26,900** 

We will continue to give our allocation to the Synod (\$16,000) and to partner ministries (\$4,000). In addition, support of the Swanson family will increase to support their mission work.

**Personnel** 2023 Budget: \$470,300 **2024: \$493,300** 

The core positions of St. Paul will stay in place with an annual inflation adjustment for wages. Additional funds are set aside in this budget to address strategic initiatives that may arise as the organization grows and requires more resources to deliver on the strategic plan.

#### Communications, Administration,

**IT, Governance** 2023 Budget: \$48,400

Key costs in this area include office supplies (copier and paper), IT, online subscriptions and bank charges. We are actually able to grow opportunities in this area, but reduce costs after negotiations with vendors. We also continue to budget funds to obtain an independent review of financial statements and plan to increase our web and social media presence.

2024: \$47.800

Important costs in this area include building Insurance, gas, grounds care, service contracts, repairs and handyman hours. Electricity costs will plummet due to our solar power. The money we save in electricity will go mainly to other repairs but also other increasing building costs. 2023 was budgeted to be a smaller property expense year because of the capital campaign. We plan to keep that number low again for 2024 and use the coming year as planning for projects in 2025 and beyond.

**TOTALS** 2023 Budget: \$699,000 **2024: \$720,900** 

The 2024 general fund budget represents a 3% increase in total spending and will require a similar increase in giving over projected 2023 income. Currently, we are operating with a year-to-date surplus. The Annual Congregational Budget Meeting will be held on Sunday, December 17 after both worship services to vote on this proposed spending plan. #### GIVE FROM THE HEART CAPITAL CAMPAIGN UPDATE

Thanks to your generosity and support, St. Paul undertook significant improvements to the campus in 2023 that will yield positive results for years to come. The solar panels, sanctuary LED lighting, and white roof on the education wing were all possible due to this campaign. As of October 31, 2023 all projects have been completed and vendors paid. As we continue to await rebates and tax credits for our investment, St. Paul took on a \$60,000 bridge loan with our bank this summer. Thanks to your continued support for pledge fulfillment, that loan balance has been reduced to \$53,900 as of 10/31 and continues to decrease each month. Our current amount of pledges outstanding is \$27,200. Although the campaign runs through 2024, we appreciate all who have advanced their gifts in order to reduce our loan balance and keep interest expense to a minimum.
