For those who do not know who is on the Missions team yet, let me introduce them: Mike and Christy Baker (chairs), Rick and Diana Calvert, Bobbie Stoess, Steve Kidwell, Eric Mohn and Jeff Moody. Stop and ask them how you can get involved in CUMC Missions.

Our Goal is simple. To Educate and Engage CUMC members to "...Therefore go and make disciples of all nations." Matthew 28:19

Speaking of going to all nations, our **Costa Rica Team** of 20 went to the Methodist Rural Center in Quesada, Costa Rica. The team was led by our own Jim Powell. This was the first time we took our own team from CUMC. Historically we went with the Ashland UMC team. Jim Powell and Christy Baker, along with several personal testimonies from those on the team, spoke at our Wednesday night GAFFA and the theme seemed to be fluidity. They started with their plan and God took over as soon as they left for Costa Rica. While their "best laid plans" changed, their expectations exceeded anything they thought they would experience. God used their skills and talents to his glory. They laid block, installed arcs for a roof and connected to the men, women and children there with VBS, hugs, healing, and evangelizing. Their stories were powerful and each person that spoke said that their goals when leaving turned out completely different from when they arrived. They received as many blessings as they gave. Missions & Ministry, continued

Our Laundry Love Ministry happened on Saturday, February 8th. Laundry Love is part of the South Oldham Inter Church Council mission. It was started in the summer of 2018 here in our community. It is part of a national program. Currently Crestwood Methodist, Crestwood Christian, Pewee Valley Presbyterian, St. Al's Catholic Church and St. James Episcopal churches are part of Laundry Love. Each Church takes the second Saturday of the month twice a year and goes to the Crestwood Coin Laundry from 8:45 AM-11:15AM. Our Mary Louise Guild has been supporting the project and having people come help. Bobbie Stoess And Georgiana Doty spearhead Laundry Love for our church. Each church brings tide pods, fabric softener sheets, \$500 in quarters and debit cards. Snacks, coloring books and crayons are also provided for the children. People in need know to come the second Saturday for Laundry Love. We have money for the washers and dryers. They load their laundry and we put in pods and quarters. We keep track of those we help each month with first names and how many loads we do. They move their clothes to the dryers and we put in quarters and fabric softener sheets. We are being the hands and feet of Jesus. The families are so appreciative.

Last Saturday when we arrived at 8:30 to set up on a cold snowy morning the laundromat was filled with families. All the washers were ready for us to begin at nine. A young man about 14 came in with his entire family's laundry. He was panicked because there were no empty washers and he had no money. We told him to sit up front and he would get the first 4 washers on the front row when they became empty. He was still concerned when his clothes were in the washers. We assured him we would stay until his laundry was dry and we did. He was so very thankful. We also helped a women in labor trying to get her laundry done before she had to go to the hospital! We did 80 loads of laundry from 9-11 and spent \$455. It was a wonderful day for Laundry Love.



Pastor's Corner

SEVEN DIFFERENCES BETWEEN YOUR CHURCH AND A CAFETERIA

I have pretty clear memories of my first visit to a cafeteria. I was five years old, and my parents wanted our family to experience a Morrison's Cafeteria in Montgomery, Alabama.

It was amazing. I saw untold numbers of dishes of meats, vegetables, salads, fruits and, of course, desserts. I had never seen anything like it. Mom and Dad had already given my brother and me strict instructions on how much we could choose. But, for a small-town kid who had never seen such a feast, I was amazed.

The concept was basic. If you paid your money, you could choose whatever you wanted. Your preferences were paramount. It was all about you.

It sounds like some churches we know.

Though we don't have the numbers of cafeterias we once had, the lessons are instructive. Simply stated, your church is not a cafeteria. Here are seven differences.

- 1. In a cafeteria, you pay for your preferences. In a church, you should give abundantly and joyfully without expecting anything in return. If you ever hear someone say, "We pay the bills in this church," you know they act like the church is a cafeteria.
- **2.** In a cafeteria, the focus is on you. In a church, the focus should be on God first and then others. If you ever hear someone say, "I'm not getting fed in this church," you know they act like the church is a cafeteria.
- 3. In a cafeteria, you demand to have things your way. In a church, you should sacrifice your own needs for others. If you ever hear someone say, "I want the order of service to be like it's always been," you know they act like the church is a cafeteria.
- **4.** In a cafeteria, the business must continue to make things more appealing and attractive for you to return. In a church, you should not expect to be entertained to get you to come back. If you ever hear someone say, "I'm going to a church where the music is more exciting," you know they act like the church is a cafeteria.
- 5. In a cafeteria, if the customer does not get his or her way, the business must make every effort to address and remedy his or her complaint. In a church, we should be so busy doing for others and serving Christ that we don't have time or the desire to whine or complain. If you ever hear someone say, "People are saying . . .", you know they act like the church is a cafeteria.
- **6.** In a cafeteria, you have a full staff serving you behind the glass partitions, indulging your every desire. In a church, you should not expect the staff to do all or most of the ministry or service; instead, the members are to do the work of ministry. If you ever hear someone saying, "Pastor, you should . . .", you know they act like the church is a cafeteria.
- 7. In a cafeteria, you will likely complain to others in person or on social media if you are not fully satisfied. In a church, you should not have a gossiping or complaining spirit; instead, you should be building others up. If you ever see someone complain about their church on social media, you know they act like the church is a cafeteria.

Cafeterias were fun when I was a kid. But Morrison's went out of business and the pieces were picked up by Piccadilly Cafeterias. And Piccadilly declared bankruptcy in 2012.

The big cafeteria chains have not fared well. And neither will churches if they keep acting like cafeterias.

Discipleship—Know, Show, Grow—Go

As we at CUMC ask ourselves how we might become better disciples of Jesus, a good place to look for teaching & example is found in The Book of Acts. Acts is an important book for us to-day because it confirms the power of the Holy Spirit, which transformed the believers' lives, is the same power that can transform our lives today!

The story of Stephen is about an "ordinary" man full of faith, full of the Holy Spirit and wisdom, full of God's grace and power. (Acts 6:3 - 7:60)

I read about Stephen, who was not one of The Twelve. He was just a willing and committed servant, who day by day, went about distributing food to those in need. He <u>applied</u> the truth and faith and grace that the Spirit <u>supplied</u>. As I look at the model of Stephen, I want that - to know God better and to serve Him each, every ordinary day, whether I'm involved in a big project in the workplace or at home with my family.

Think about a person who makes you want to know God better. What are the qualities you see in that person? Why are you are encouraged by them to want to know God better? And, what about those eyes who are watching you? Are we showing any Christ-like compassion or characteristic of lasting value?

Ask God to fill you with His Holy Spirit. Ask Him to help you to faithfully, boldly and sensitively proclaim and live out truth. Our usefulness in His service will be maximized as we operate in the Spirit's power.


The Anderson's have three adult daughters: Angella, Jessica and Desiree. These gals have blessed




