Not All Christians Are Alike

Not all Christians are alike. Do you notice that? When you are in a faith tradition you notice the nuances of your tradition. You can detect differences between different Christians. Some might take the Bible literally and try to convince you that the earth was created in 6 days, and on the 7th day, God rested. If you are a Lutheran, you might feel uneasy around a fellow Christian trying to convince you of that belief. Yet both of you are Christian.

We have thousands of denominations for a reason. We all see something that speaks to us in scripture and lift it out of the Bible and say, "This is what the Christian faith is all about." The reason we do this is because a particular Bible verse resonates with my experience and beliefs. Others might see something different and lift up a verse that doesn't speak to your heart.

The early Christian Father, St. Augustine wrote that when it comes to interpreting the Bible, the proper interpretation would lead us to further love God and love our neighbors. If we find something leading us away from this ideal, it most likely is not the proper use of the Bible. It's pretty simple and easy to understand. St. Augustine speaks to my understanding of Bible interpretation.

With so many varieties of Christian denominations representing different beliefs, there is one grounding practice of faith ALL CHRISTIANS stand upon, AGAPE. God's love for us, and Jesus' challenge that we too can grow at loving as God loves. This aspect of the Practice of Christianity holds true for all Christians around the world. We may not all believe the same things, but we are called to AGAPE.

It is November, traditionally STEWARDSHIP MONTH in the church. It is the season of Harvest Home and the recognition that all that we have, all that we are, and all that we can ever become, comes from Mother Earth. The earth sustains us. Followers of Jesus centered in AGAPE, consciously live our lives, realizing our impact upon the earth. We must live in ways that sustain Mother Earth while providing for a healthy earth for future generations. We are called to LOVE the earth.

Stewardship is not simply giving money to the church. It is using your resources to support people, places, and institutions that support you and your stewardship principles. We all share responsibilities for sustaining Christ Lutheran. Hopefully Christ Lutheran Church is a place of spiritual nourishment for you. Together, as members of this church, we create an environment of welcome and grace for all people. Remember, no matter who you are or where you are on your faith journey, you are welcome here! Hopefully you are a Christian that centers your faith journey on both LOVE and STEWARDSHIP.

NORTHEASTERN PENNSYLVANIA SYNOD MONTHLY NEWSLETTER

Do Justice, Love Kindness, Walk Humbly: The Work of the Lutheran Advocacy Ministry in Pennsylvania

In a well-known scripture, the prophet Micah proclaims, “He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?” (NRSV Micah 6:8) It has been pointed out that we Lutherans often are more comfortable loving justice and doing kindness; that is, we find satisfaction in feeding hungry people but shy away from calling out and addressing the root causes of hunger and poverty. For the past 46 years, Lutheran Advocacy Ministry in Pennsylvania (LAMPa) – funded in part by your mission support giving – has taken up the important, but daunting task of working to change systems that perpetuate inequity and injustice.

LAMPa's staff – Tracey DePasquale, Director, and Pastor Erin Jones, Communications and Advocacy Engagement Manager, joined this year by Hunger Advocacy Fellow, Daniella Garber – work with a Policy Council composed of representatives of Pennsylvania's seven synods, the United Lutheran Seminary, and a synod bishop to develop a biennial Policy Agenda that guides our church's engagement with state legislators and departments in the governor's office.

The current Policy Agenda includes the following priorities:

- Hunger: improving access to healthy, affordable food;
- Creation Care: advocating for laws that protect clean air, water, and land;
- Poverty: addressing homelessness and housing insecurity;
- Education: working toward adequate and equitable school funding;
- Healthcare: working to ensure all Pennsylvanians have access to affordable care;
- Civil Rights: working to reduce hate crime and safeguard the right to vote;
- Immigration: standing for welcome to our newest neighbors; and
- Violence Reduction: addressing the root causes of violence, including trauma and extreme poverty.

The LAMPa staff and Policy Council pursue this ambitious agenda in several ways:

- By forming and participating in coalitions with leaders of other denominations, faith-based organizations, and community groups that are passionate about these same issues;
- By engaging with state legislators and those who work in the governor's office, regardless of party affiliation, to advance measures that benefit all Pennsylvanians;
- And, most important, by equipping and supporting the members of the 1,050 ELCA congregations in Pennsylvania so that each of us becomes more confident expressing our faith in the Good News of Jesus by becoming bold advocates for a just and compassionate society. The widely used Bonhoeffer curriculum is just one example of this.

Preparing for Advent... TODAY!

In Sunday School our kids are learning the seasons of the church year. They started off with a hard one: Pentecost, the season that stretches all the way from the end of Eastertide right up to the start of Advent.

Advent, of course, runs from the beginning of December to Christmas Eve—AKA, the busiest time of the year. The calm, retrospective, preparatory season of Advent can often get lost in the madness of holiday shopping, house decorating, and cookie baking.

The time to prepare for Christmas *and* Advent isn't the middle of December—it's right now! Consider starting early so that your Advent season has room to create a spiritual anticipation for Christmas and not an anxiety-induced dread of the holiday season!

Here are some ways to bring peace to your Advent and your December:

Create a Mindful Advent Calendar — when I was young my Advent calendars were filled with tiny Lego sets or chalky-tasting chocolate. But JollyFestive.com has a different approach to the Advent tradition: marking your own calendar with small activities or practices to keep you in the right Advent mindset. Tasks like writing a letter to a friend, going for a winter walk, or listening to the sounds of nature can keep our hearts focused on the spirit of the season; treats like going out for tea, taking a friend out to dinner, and attending a local Christmas concert are all great replacements for stale candy!

Light Your Advent Wreath at Dinnertime — taking time to light your personal Advent wreath at the dinner table is a great outlet for kids eager to get to Christmas morning. Try adding prayer-songs to your tradition as well. Hymns like *Light One Candle* and *Light the Advent Candles* are written for this very purpose, adding a verse on every week as the season progresses.

Be with Each Other — this is simple to say, hard to do! Christmas preparations can overwhelm the sense of peace, love and joy that we should focus on during the Advent season. Make sure to create intentional time to be with your friends and family. Your Advent season shouldn't be a to-do list.
