"How to 'Disciple' Your Kids into Church Dropout Status." The very title of the article caught my attention. I mean, really? Who would intentionally "disciple" their child to drop out of church? As I read the article, I quickly realized the author, Jared C. Wilson, was attempting to show how "religious families may be reinforcing the dropout trend despite their own hopes" that their children will remain faithful to the church. In other words, there are ways in which we may actually contribute to our children's dropout. Wilson listed six such ways:

- 1. Attend church sporadically. Wilson states, "If you treat church like an option, your children will too." By placing other events over gathering with God's people, we are sending a message that the church is just another event or practice.
- **2. Complain about your church.** You have heard me mention this before. If our children constantly hear us talk negatively about the church and its people, then they develop a discouraged spirit as it relates to the church.
- 3. Insulate them from the rest of the body. Now, I totally believe that children, youth, and college students need their own respective spaces. They need moments to gather together to grow and worship. However, we all need generational exchange. The generations need to intermingle together and fellowship together. When a high school student decides to become a member, he or she doesn't simply join the youth group. He or she joins the church—the whole community of believers!
- **4. Ignore their crucial questions.** Too often, we believe surface-level ministry is necessary to reach young lives; yet it is spiritual depth that nourishes all of us. We must take the Scripture and demonstrate how it answers the "big questions of life" and how it applies to our everyday walk.
- **5. Church hop.** According to research presented in The Prodigal Child, the average family remains in an "attractional" church about four to seven years before moving on. Perhaps you choose a certain church for their children's ministry, but as your child grows into a youth,

- you decide to attend another church for its youth ministry. The consumeristic cycle does not end but rather extends to college ministry, young adult ministry, and even to senior adult ministry. Such church hopping does not demonstrate commitment to children, but rather it conveys an attitude of the church as "a consumeristic product one can always throw away for a perceived upgrade."
- 6. Marginalize or muzzle the gospel. The best way to impact young people is through the gospel. Instead of simply telling them that they should or shouldn't do something, we ought to couch attitudes/behavior in the gospel. Our love and affection for Christ motivates us more than a simple "Thou Shalt Not" statement. Please understand me. God absolutely says, "Thou Shalt Not"! Yet, even in the law, the presumption of obedience was based on a unique, personal relationship that God had with His people. Israel was a unique, prized people that God had chosen. And so are we as the church!


You see, the church partners with families to see children discipled into Christ's image, but the primary responsibility for the child's discipleship is the parent! And even when the parent labors for such instruction, children still take detours on their own. But I don't want to contribute to their "dropout." Jesus loves His church, and so do I. I long for my own children to embrace the community of believers as well. That is why I needed to hear Wilson's counsel. Perhaps you did as well. May we as parents heed the warnings above; and may we, through the power of the Holy Spirit, disciple our kids toward Christ and His church!

Thankfully, we have some awesome young people coming behind us as evidenced last week by those who were on campus for WinShape, those who participated in the junior high mission trip to Memphis, those who traveled on mission to Montana, and those who are spread across the globe for the gospel's sake! God is continuing to move in the lives of young people, and He is allowing us an opportunity to join in that work. Let's be faithful to the task! See you Sunday!
