As he discussed how his achievements impacted his selfconcept, the top-ranked PGA golfer continued, "That's something that I wrestle with on a daily basis. It's like showing up at the Masters every year; it's like why do I want to win this golf tournament so badly? Why do I want to win the Open Championship so badly? I don't know because, if I win, it's going to be awesome for two minutes." Admittedly, I'm no golfer. I don't even pretend to be anymore. I also don't follow the professional golfing circuit very closely, but when I read these comments in an ESPN article, I felt an initial burden for him. Not a fulfilling life? Victories are fleeting? Sounds hapless and hopeless, right? I immediately wanted to send him a note to explain that true fulfillment and purpose are found in Christ! I even told Leslie how troubled I was for the young man.

But then things changed. I did a bit of research and found that Scheffler was a "devout Christian." The ESPN reporter had failed to capture that aspect of the story—perhaps out of neglect or through intention. Maybe the writer assumed everyone knew of Scheffler's public faith. However, I've already admitted my own ignorance. (No follow-up comments, please!) There was more to the narrative an essential element, in my opinion. Scheffler wasn't wallowing in his own despair; rather, he was underscoring the transience of life's accomplishments while highlighting God's true purpose and priorities.

A few days after the interview, the champ proved his mettle the Grand Slam." Inevitably, the inquiry was offered: "Easy going to be awesome for two minutes to win the Open . . . is seeking Him together!

"This is not a fulfilling life. It's fulfilling from the sense of it going to be longer than two minutes?" Am I grateful for it? Do I enjoy it? Oh, yeah. This is a cool feeling, and I can't wait to get home to celebrate this championship . . . At the end of the day, there is more to life than playing golf." And what is that "more"? Later in the presser exchange, he explicitly mentioned it: "My greatest priorities are my faith and my family. Those come first for me. Golf is third in that." Ah, that is it! God and our faith in Him bring ultimate fulfillment. The Lord's blessing of relationships in family and friendships provides unbelievable joy. It is not about our earthly successes and victories-it is about our relationship with God and His people.

My friends, how many of us get sidetracked by wrong pursuits that lead to wrong priorities that lead to wrong paths that lead to wrong prizes? Probably too many! The Lord spoke to a non-golfing preacher through a preaching golfer this week. Strange, huh? But He did! And what did my Savior say? "But seek first the kingdom of God and His again as he lifted the Claret Jug and claimed the "third leg of righteousness, and all these things shall be added to you" (Matthew 6:33 NKJV). Some wise, wonderful words! Even question: To go back to that quote earlier this week that it is if a golfer helped me hear them! See you Sunday as we keep


