Dear Members and Friends,

I never noticed it before because the tomb was there...the women followers of Jesus were there, ready to anoint his lifeless body to give him a proper burial because he was brutally crucified on Friday and then the Sabbath, they must keep. They waited anxiously, until the Sabbath was over, and then hurried to honor Jesus in death, and grieve for him. We heard them fret about how huge the stone in front of the grave was and wondered if they could find someone to help them roll it away. The mysterious figure was there to give the news.

In Mark's version of the story-there's no Jesus. In fact, the messenger says: "he is not here." Um, this is Easter-if he's not here, where is he? The women didn't wait around to ask too many questions. They rushed off, as the story says, seized by "trauma, and ecstasy." The story ends in silence.

This ending is so unsettling that at least three different attempts have been made to fix it. It doesn't seem quite right to leave the story there, and later writers have added to the end.

Mark wrote this gospel down about forty years after the death of Jesus, in a time of upheaval for the Jewish people. The great temple was reduced to rubble. The people of Israel sustained terrible losses due to their rebellion against the mighty Roman empire. The small band of followers were separated from other Jews who didn't believe he was the Messiah. There's more and more distance between those who followed Jesus and those who were still waiting for the Messiah to come, sometimes even members of the same family were divided.

Mark's gospel was birthed into a world full of terror. The bleakness of the ending matched the harshness of the times.

We take the resurrection for granted because we know the story, but it's a huge surprise on that first day. I don't know if I would have been any different. In fact, I admire their courage. If you were expecting a body and you got a message that Jesus who was missing, being afraid makes perfect sense. Still, we want more. Like the women at the tomb, we want to know where Jesus is, and what he's up to.

Glennon Doyle wrote on her blog about teaching Sunday School at her church. The kids came into the sanctuary and sat down, listening to the teacher. After a bit, one little boy got restless and whispered to her: "Excuse me. Is God coming?"

That's the question, isn't it-when we investigate the tomb and find it empty, but we don't know what's coming next. When the job ends. When the divorce papers come in the mail. When you're about to lose your house. When the doctor comes in, she isn't smiling. When your child is lost to drugs. When violence comes into your life and shakes your sense of safety. Is God coming?

Apostle Mark wrote his gospel for people who were already believers. They already knew the rest of the story. They knew that God was coming, that God has come and is still coming. The story is not so much about the empty tomb and the missing Jesus, but the reality that he's already at work again. He's already in Galilee, where they're all from, where it all began. He's not in any place that can contain him, seal him up, or keep him in place. He's in Galilee, where there's work to be done. The very first thing Mark ever says about Jesus is, "In those day Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan" (Mark 1:9).

Jesus went back to where the work was. He went to Galilee, and Syria, and New York. He has gone to refugee camps in Gaza where parents are burying children today. He has gone to the seat on the bus where someone is being bullied, and to the dark walkway where a woman is being harassed. He's gone to the park bench where someone will try to sleep tonight, and to the empty dining room where a family is sitting without food. He's gone ahead to the person standing on the edge of a bridge, planning to end their own life. He's gone because he's busy, coming to us.

We can stand, peering into the tomb, wanting more. We can get lost in our fear, or our surprise at something new, or we can get up and go to Galilee, wherever we find it in our world, right now, and try to find the Jesus who can't be limited, can't be contained, and can't be held down by death.

We can go and find him, for he carries the good news with him. God is coming-to you and me and every place of terror and need, every place of pain and suffering, and every place of joy too.

He has good news for us and work for us to do alongside him. He is not here-he has been raised. Let's hurry and catch up with him.

The Missions Team needs your help to write notes of encouragement to some of the inmates at the Broome County Correctional Facility. Our goal is to collect 350 notes, they will mean a great deal to those who receive them.

There are some bundles (5 notecards each) available on the Connection Center under the balcony.

Please follow these instructions carefully for your note to be delivered:

- Please use only WHITE envelopes
- On the outside of the envelope, write only "Vestal UMC" in the upper left corner.
- Do NOT add stickers or color to the outside, and NO candy, stickers, or trinkets to the inside. NO staples. Only writing is acceptable on the card.
- Children or others may add color to the inside or back of the card with markers or ink stamps only, no crayon — nothing to the envelope.
- Children and youth are encouraged to write these notes of encouragement.
- Sign only your first name to the note.

- Seal the note in the envelope.
- Please return all notes to the church by Sunday, March 24, 2024.
- Leave the notes in the box under the balcony labeled 'Jail Ministry Notes of Encouragement'.

Suggestions and rules for content:

- Please add no greeting for example, do NOT add "Dear _____", etc. Just begin your note right away.
- Your note should be a simple, positive, uplifting message.
- Suggested wording (you may reword or use your ideas);
 - As Spring approaches, I write this note to let you know that you are not forgotten.
 - We are thinking of you / praying for you Spring is a time for new beginnings.
 - We understand this is a difficult time for you and want to let you know that we are thinking of you.
- Avoid a lot of religious/Christian jargon to respect the many religious backgrounds or faiths of the inmates.
- Again Please sign with only your first name.

UMCOR - Department of Service to Palestinian Refugees - Middle East Council of Churches (Advance #14908A)

The goal of the project is the improvement of health among Palestinian women and children (reduction in neonatal and maternal mortality, improvement of mental health). Poverty reduction among Palestinian refugees and Palestinians.

Habitat for Humanity

Habitat for Humanity is a non-profit organization that helps provide families with affordable housing by building or improving places to call home.

The Rescue Mission


Lent Chain

GRIEF SUPPORT

A grief support group is being offered to those finding difficulty coping with the loss of a loved one due to death. This group will offer support and guidance from others who are experiencing the same unresolved feelings of others in the group.

The group will be facilitated by Jan Hallock. While Jan is not a trained professional, she comes to the group with compassion and empathy having experienced multiple losses herself. She's well-read in the field of grief and has facilitated other grief support groups here at VUMC.

Participants will form a bond and trust with others in the group and they will become an important part of the healing process. Each group, with a **minimum of 4**, is limited to a **maximum of 8** to help form stronger relationships. Confidentiality is necessary.
