Exodus 12:12 - 13 (NLT, pg. 55) On that night I will pass through the land of Egypt and strike down every firstborn son and firstborn male animal in the land of Egypt. I will execute judgment against all the gods of Egypt, for I am the Lord! But the blood on your doorposts will serve

as a sign, marking the houses where you are staying. When I see the blood, I will pass over you. This plague of death will not touch you when I strike the land of Egypt.

Matthew 26:17-20 (NLT, pg. 824)
The last supper was supposed to be the last
because is the Lamb
1 Corinthians 5:7b (NLT, pg. 952) Christ, our Passover Lamb, has been sacrificed for us.
The lamb was:
Isaiah 53:7-8a (NLT, pg. 610) He was oppressed and treated harshly, yet he never said a word. He was led as a lamb to the slaughter. And as a sheep is silent before the shearers, he did not open his mouth. Unjustly condemned, he was led away.
1 Peter 1:19 - 20 (NLT, pg. 1023) He paid for you with the precious lifeblood of Christ, the sinless, spotless Lamb of God.
The lamb was one of:
Exodus 12:5 (NLT, pg. 55) This animal must be a one-year-old male, either a sheep or a goat, with no physical defects.

Hebrews 2:14, 17 (NLT, pg. 1010) Because God's children are human beings—made of flesh and blood—Jesus also became flesh and blood by being born in human form. For only as a human being could he die, and only by dying could he break the power of the Devil, who had the

power of death...Therefore, it was necessary for him to be made in every respect like us, his brothers and sisters, so that he could be our merciful and faithful High Priest before God. He then could offer a sacrifice that would take away the sins of the people.

The lamb was:
Exodus 12:3 (NLT, pg. 55) Announce to the whole community that on the tenth day of this month each family must choose a lamb or a young goat for a sacrifice.
1 Peter 2:4 (NLT, pg. 1024) Come to Christ, who is the living cornerstone of God's temple. He was rejected by the people, but he is precious to God who chose him.
The lamb was slain at antime:
Exodus 12:6 (NLT, pg. 55) "Take special care of these lambs until the evening of the fourteenth day of this first month. Then each family in the community must slaughter its lamb.
Acts 2:23 (NLT, pg. 906) But God knew what would happen, and his prearranged plan was carried out when Jesus was betrayed. With the help of lawless Gentiles, you nailed him to a cross and killed him.
Just as in the original Passover in Egypt, the sacrifice of the lamb saves the lives of
Jesus as the sacrificial lamb, replaced Passover with
Matthew 26:26-28 (NLT, pg. 825)
