

## ADVENT



To say I joyfully look forward to worshipping with my Trinity family during the Advent and Christmas season would be a severe understatement. I don't know about you, but I LOVE this time of the year. This season is the perfect combination of both preparing with great anticipation for the second coming of Christ as we also look back to celebrate His first coming at Christmas.

I want to share some truths that I pray help serve as a blessing to us all so we can remember why the family of God has certain rhythms or worship habits throughout our church year.

Advent focuses on preparation, not just celebration. Do we get to celebrate and sing some of the best songs ever during this season? Yes! More than that, Advent is a season of waiting and preparation, not just a countdown to Christmas. This is why we have more mid-week worship opportunities. These extra chances to gather and worship Jesus help to shift the focus from the commercial and secular aspects of the season to prayerful reflection and repentance so we remember why we need the greatest gift that took on flesh for you and for me.

Advent unites us into a rich historic Christian tradition. It is great to be reminded of the truth that we aren't the only denomination that observes Advent. Advent helps to unite us to other brothers and sisters in Christ who celebrate the same way through this season. Christ have long followers observed additional worship services during penitential seasons like Advent and Lent. These mid-week services reflect a long-standing liturgical practice in the church that helps bless us with the bigger realization that we are part of a globally wide body of Christ!

Advent has a beautiful thematic emphasis. Each mid-week service often focuses on a particular theme (like hope, peace, joy and love,) or a character in the Advent story (like Isaiah, John the Baptist, Mary, etc.). In our case this year at Trinity, we will be focusing on the idea of Maranatha: Come, Lord Jesus. During our three mid-week services, we will look closely at Jesus' incarnation, Jesus' return, and Jesus' presence within the Church. These services help to deepen our understanding of the Biblical narrative leading up to Christ's birth and how this applies to our lives today.

Advent gives us time for extra devotion. As followers of Jesus, we have an opportunity to pause during a busy season, reflect on God's Word, and gather in community. Many people appreciate the quiet, contemplative

tone of these services, which contrasts with the frenzy of holiday activity. We pray that God continually opens our eyes during these times to the needs we find around us so we can respond to be a blessing.

Advent blesses us through God's Word and worship. There is something calming and soothing about walking into a dimly lit room where familiar faces greet us, songs of worship lift our souls, and the truth of God's Word fills and transforms us. These services are meant to teach and reinforce our faith. Not only are we blessed to hear and receive the gift of God's Word, but we have more chances to sing Advent hymns, which are Biblically rich in theology and only sung a few times a year.

We hope these extra opportunities to come and worship will help you and your family to intentionally live in rhythm with the rest of your church family as we all seek to keep Jesus at the center of the season.

Please see the worship schedule for all the upcoming opportunities to gather together as the body of Christ. We can't wait to gather and sing with you this Advent and Christmas season at Trinity!

I look forward to working together to help keep our church family safe and secure.

What is my background? I am married to Linda Powell, whom most of you already know because of her work as our church receptionist. We will be married for 20 years in June of 2026. We have a wonderful son, Steven, who is a sophomore at Lutheran Northwest and attended Trinity from preschool through eighth grade. We have been members of Trinity since 2015, and I became an elder in July of this year. ## TRINITY FOUNDATION STONE MEMORIAL









Years ago, while planting trees along Van Dyke, John Ruggirello encountered the original stone foundation of Trinity's first brick church constructed in 1905. Inspired by that find, he envisioned using seven of the original foundation stones to create a memorial that would connect the seven churches referenced in the book of Revelation to the life and history of Trinity. Thanks to the generous support of the Trinity Foundation, Trinity Ladies Aid, and Trinity B2BK for the memorial and the surrounding landscape—that vision became a reality. On September 28, 2025, we were blessed to dedicate this historic memorial near the site where the 1905 church once stood.

Set into the curved stone wall are seven original foundation stones from that first brick church building. Each stone is engraved with the name of one of the seven churches of Revelation, serving as a visible reminder that Trinity's story—now spanning more than 140 years—is part of a much greater story: the story of Christ's Church from the apostles to today.

Why the seven churches? In Revelation 2–3, Jesus speaks to seven real congregations in Asia Minor. Their names on our stones invite us to remember His counsel, encouragement, and warning—timeless words for every generation:

- **Ephesus** | Strong in doctrine but warned: "You have abandoned the love you had at first." Christ calls them (and us) to remember, repent, and do the works we did at first (2:4–5).
- **Smyrna** | Poor and persecuted, yet rich in Christ. Jesus says, "Do not fear... Be faithful unto death, and I will give you the crown of life." (2:10–11).
- **Pergamum** | Faithful under pressure, yet tempted by false teaching. The Lord urges truth and repentance (2:13–17).
- **Thyatira** | Noted for love, faith, service, and patient endurance, yet told to reject what is false and hold fast to what is true (2:19–29).
- **Sardis** | A reputation for life, but spiritually drowsy. Christ says, "Wake up... remember... and repent." (3:1–6).
- **Philadelphia** | "Little power," yet kept Christ's word. Jesus sets before them an open door and promises to keep them (3:7–13).
- Laodicea | Lukewarm and self-satisfied. Jesus lovingly rebukes and invites: "Behold, I stand at the door and knock." (3:14–22).

Taken together, these messages paint a picture every Christian recognizes: seasons of strength and struggle, clarity and confusion, bold witness and needed course-corrections. Above all, they assure us that Jesus knows His churches, speaks to them, and sustains them. For many of our long-time members, these stones are more than symbols; they are pieces of our first foundation—echoes of baptisms, confirmations, weddings, funerals, and countless services of Word and Sacrament. For newer members, they are a welcome into a family rooted deeply in Christ. Whether you have been here for decades or days, this wall says what Scripture says: "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever." (Hebrews 13:8)

### Deaconess Ministry

Family. How do you define it? In sociology, "family" is defined by various structures beyond the traditional nuclear family, including matrifocal, patrifocal, and extended families, all united by kinship ties like blood, marriage, or adoption. Family isn't only defined socially by biological or legal ties; it isn't uncommon to hear people talk about their "family of choice." You hear many different descriptions of family and ways of interpreting what family is in our culture today.

What about "church family?" This is a concept that flows from God's Word. As children of God (1 John 3:1), we are brothers and sisters of Christ in the family, bound for the same eternal home (John 14:1-3). Much like the children of Israel in the wilderness, waiting to enter the Promised Land, we are sojourning together through the wilderness of this sin-sick world until we get to the promised land of the new heavens and the new earth (Rev. 21-22).

While we travel, we are called by God to use our spiritual gifts to build each other up in the faith – to encourage one another until we make it home. Christ calls some to be pastors and teachers in the church (Eph. 4:11) The visible church has developed other vocations to carry out congregational ministry, including deacons (Acts 6) and deaconesses (Rom. 16:2).



It is this last ministry, the vocation of deaconess, that I want to consider in this article, especially since we had deaconess intern Janis in previous years, and now have deaconess intern Jenny Jaroneski. Early church writers have something to say about this office. Origen (c. 185-254) interpreted Paul's statement in Romans 16 to teach "that there were women ordained in the church's ministry." John Chrysostom (c. 347–407) wrote: "You see that these were noble women, hindered in no way by their sex in the course of virtue; and this is as might be expected for in Christ Jesus there is neither male nor female." The ordination rite for a deaconess is included in the earliest extant service books of Christianity. She was ordained by the bishop (pastor) during the liturgy at the altar, and at the same place in the service that a male deacon was ordained. In addition, she was presented with the stole and chalice and received communion with the other clergy.



In the LCMS, deaconesses wear patches to identify themselves in their service. The light blue patch indicates that the person is an intern. The gold cross indicates the deaconess has completed all training and is called to serve as a deaconess.

Much recorded history of this office was lost during the wars with the Muslims in that region in the Middle Ages. The ministry continued among Christians in the East, even after the Great Schism of 1054 AD. In both the East and the West, the monastic movement of monks and nuns replaced much of the work done by deacons and deaconesses. It was not until after the Reformation of the late 1500s, that the renewal of the office of deaconess began to sprout once more in the West among Protestants, including Lutheranism.

Currently, the Lutheran Church - Missouri Synod (LCMS), has multiple pathways available for studying for this specific ministry (lcms.org/how-we-serve/mercy/deaconess-ministry). In 1980, the LCMS established its own deaconess-training program at Concordia University Chicago, River Forest, Ill. Additional deaconess programs were added at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, in 2002 and Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne, in 2003. The Synod's Deaf Institute of Theology, Center for Hispanic Studies and Ethnic Immigrant Institute of Theology also offer specialized courses for deaconess certification.

Christ has gifted the Church with the Holy Spirit, and the Spirit enriches us with spiritual gifts so that we can build each other up in the faith. The office of deaconess is one of the various ways that the church continues to provide Christ-centered care. #### Interview with Jenny Jaroneski, Trinity's Deaconess Intern

What piqued your interest in the deaconess ministry? J: It came on my radar about four years ago that a deaconess would be qualified to carry out certain roles in a congregation. I attended the specialist ministry conference in Fall of 2024. Pastor Leninger, the campus pastor at Concordia University Chicago, presented on his book on vocation. It made me

realize that I was letting things hold me back. I met deaconesses at the conference and learned more about the training and resources. I prayed about it and asked for God's guidance. I called (my husband) Aaron and discussed it with him. We prayed about it and talked about logistics. I learned about the different programs available through Concordia Seminary, St Louis, and Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne. The Fort Wayne program offered a better fit for my time and situation. I talked to Pastor Justin and Pastor Jones. I have received support from LWML from Wheaton, Kansas, through student adoption program through Fort Wayne, a congregation from Apex, North Carolina, the LWML Michigan District, the Council of Lutheran Women, the LCMS Michigan District grant, and continuing education tuition reimbursement at Trinity. Through all of these, the Lord has covered most of the cost of my education.

What has your experience been like as deaconess intern?

J: I have had the opportunity to continue to serve in my current position at Trinity. All the mercy and care ministry has been reinforced by my studies in the Bible. I better understand the theological basis for the mercy and care we provide. I have learned more about the historical context of the creeds and the church. Being able to dig into the doctrine and its application at the congregational level. I have been able to be on campus for two weeks, intensive 40 hours in the classroom and the rest in the library. I have been able to meet awesome professors and amazing women who are also studying to be deaconesses. I was able to go chapel every day, which was great.

What do expect this deaconess training will lead to? J: I have no idea what God has planned for me. I am listening. Ideally, if there were to be a position where the deaconess would be able to float between all the various ministries of the congregation and support all of them as best she could, I would like to do something like that. I see the use of a deaconess in the various ways congregations have done as being very flexible in the LCMS. They serve in congregations, as chaplains, and with Recognized Service Organizations.

Sponsoring a child through HopeChest allows families at Trinity to live out that calling in a tangible way. It's a reflection of Christ's compassion: giving not out of abundance, but out of gratitude for His boundless grace.

Imagine a child in Pueblo Modelo attending school because of your prayers and support, hearing about Jesus through faithful Christian mentors, and growing up to share that same love within their own community.



This is not merely charity - it is Gospel partnership.

Together, as Trinity, we can be a visible expression of the body of Christ - hands that serve, hearts that love, and voices that proclaim hope. Through Children's HopeChest, we have the privilege to join in God's ongoing story of redemption, bringing light to lives in Guatemala and renewal to our own faith as we walk together sharing Christ's story with love.

Each year, your faithful giving helps Trinity fulfill its mission to share Christ's love through worship, education, and service. As we approach the end of 2025, we give thanks for your continued support that has sustained our ministries and allowed us to meet our daily needs. Yet, as we look ahead, we are also mindful of the challenges and opportunities before us.

Beyond our general fund — which supports our staff, programs, and ongoing ministry operations,

we are facing new and essential needs to help us maintain safety, care for our facilities, and plan wisely for the future.

**Campus Safety Enhancements** | This year, we have increased investments in security through the hiring of a Safety Team Manager, training volunteers, and adding new emergency response equipment. **Public Panic Devices** will be installed in the Sanctuary and gymnasium to allow immediate police dispatch in the event of a life-threatening situation. We also plan to install Vehicular Traffic Barriers around our campus to protect our students and worshipers from vehicle-related accidents — a costly, but vital, preventive measure. And we are looking to hire a security company to help monitor our campus on

new unit costs approximately \$35,000-\$40,000. With nearly 30 units throughout our building, we know this will require intentional, longterm planning and faithful generosity. We are also expecting to replace our aging Food Delivery Van and Plow Truck. Gifts to Trinity's Special Gifts Fund (given through estate planning or undesignated donations) help us prepare for these non budget significant future expenses.

In all these efforts, we trust in God's provision through His people — through you. Every gift, whether one-time or recurring, helps Trinity remain strong and continue to serve families for generations to come. To make a special gift for Safety and Long Term Maintenance, you may give online through **Planning Center and** pick the Long Term Maintenance account or mail in check or use one of the church envelopes and write Long Term Maintenance in the memo.

As you prayerfully consider your year-end giving, above and beyond regular general fund giving, may you be reminded of the heart of our Father generous, protective, and overflowing with love. ## Foin the Book Club





## NEW SAFETY Improvements

Trinity has many safety and security measures already in place, but we are always planning for and making improvements. As with many safety and security measures, it is not wise to disclose all of them to the public. However, several new additions will be coming to Trinity in the near future that we do want to disclose to you. Please watch for these:

#### **PUBLIC PANIC DEVICES**

These devices will be installed at strategic locations throughout the Narthex and Sanctuary as well as in the gym lobby and gymnasium. These devices will be clearly marked with instructions on their use. These devices are programmed in such a way that when they are activated they will notify Utica Police of an "Active Shooter or Violent" event. Once activated, Utica Police (and possibly other neighboring police agencies) will arrive anticipating an active shooter or violent event. This is a very serious law enforcement response. These devices ARE NOT intended to be used for any other medical emergencies. They are strictly for active shooter or other violent events.

### VEHICULAR TRAFFIC SAFETY BARRIERS

These barriers will be installed at strategic locations throughout our campus to deter any vehicular intrusions. We hope to get these installed before winter sets in, however there are a few obstacles that need to be overcome first.

#### SAFETY MANAGER

As you may have seen in a companion article, we have recently hired Steve Powell as Trinity's Safety Manager. Steve will be the point of contact for safety and security related matters. Steve is working on establishing a team of volunteers to help with safety and security related matters. Please seek him out if you have an interest in participating in this valuable role. At the All Pastors' Conference I learned about the skill of narrative preaching from Dr. David Schmitt of Concordia Seminary. Narrative preaching is about including the story of Scripture within the structure of sermon writing. This helps people understand your sermon better through the lens of Biblical storytelling. As an example, the week I returned from the APC, I included the story of Moses and the Israelites being led to freedom out of the land of Egypt by God. As an expository preacher who typically focuses on the grammatical structure of texts, this was a different skill that I tried applying directly to my sermon. **-Pastor Jones**



# CHILDREN OF GOD So We Are!



There is a good chance that you have heard our theme for this year. It is "Children of God, So We Are" inspired by I John 3:1a, "See what kind of love the Father has given to us, that we should be called children of God; and so we are."

Our God is the greatest teacher and provides methods to help us understand His Word. Jesus used parables to teach us divine concepts. Our God uses the metaphor of children and father to deepen our comprehension of His relationship with us.

It is a blessing to look to His example at school as we look to understand just how much God loves each of us. One example is when a student is receiving correction at school. This can lead to times in which a student shares faulty conclusions that their misstep will erode their parents' love for them. We can share that nothing is further from the truth. Parental dismay is because of their deep love for their child. They have a profound desire for their children to learn and grow from experiences. I tell kids that disappointment from parents is because they care so very much. A parent who doesn't care would not be too disappointed. "Your mom and dad still love you ever so deeply!"

In the same way (but even greater!) our sin does not cause God's love for us to decrease. The Apostle Paul writes in Romans chapter 8: "For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord." Children of God - so we are!

We can carry the image of a father and his children into other aspects of our school. We have established "Faith Families" during the past few years at Trinity. We are all part of a family with God at the head. The entire school body is broken down into smaller family-like units. Each Faith Family has about 20 members.



Individual Faith Families have several representatives from each grade level. Each family is led by at least two faculty and staff members from our church and school. We periodically sit in chapel with our families. Our families do an activity together about once a month. The Faith Family activity at the end of October was a full campus clean up. Our kids pitch in at home to help to keep their actual house neat and tidy. At Trinity we had nearly 400 students participating in cleaning up "their house" here at school. They picked up trash outdoors, on the playgrounds, in the Children's Garden and in grassy areas. Stairwells, hallways, and entrance areas all received attention. Kids cleaned the youth rooms, the computer room, the Music Room, the Art Room, the Board Room and the Latchkey Room. Several families were busy in the Sanctuary, the balcony and the gymnasium. They hit the library, the science lab, the Meeting Lounge and the Fellowship Hall. It is rewarding to observe our students taking active ownership in the school house that God has given to us. Our Faith Family faculty committee did a wonderful job in organizing our campus clean up.

You cannot help but notice that Christmas is approaching! It is with JOY that each of our students participate in some way to celebrate in worship the coming of the Baby Jesus. Our students' engagement in services culminates with our 3rd and 4th grade students presenting the Christmas musical, "Hotel Noel." You're invited to this musical presentation at the 7:00 pm Advent worship service on Wednesday, December 19.

In October, we held our annual Trunk or Treat, and it was a fantastic evening filled with joy and connection, allowing us to engage with our wider community beyond Trinity. Over 500 people joined us for a night of fun! One of our goals in Children's and Family Ministry at Trinity is to connect our ministry with other ministries within the church and serve as a bridge for outreach within the community. One way we do that is through our canned food drive, which we have every year at Trunk or Treat. This year, we collected more than 400 canned goods! Thanks to your generous donations, our Food Ministry Coordinator, Beth, shared that the pantry shelves are now well-stocked and ready for the upcoming open pantry days. By pairing fun events with meaningful needs, we embody our church's mission: to love God and serve our neighbors.

As the fall season wraps up and we transition into Christmas and winter, there is even more to look forward to in Children's and Family Ministry. We are busy preparing our annual Christmas Boxes, designed to bring families together as they engage with the Advent season. This year's boxes will include an Advent devotional booklet, featuring a short reflection for each day leading up to Christmas. Families will also find hands-on activities, crafts, and conversation starters that help to bring the Christmas story to life at home. We hope these resources will enable families to slow down amidst the hustle and bustle of the busy holiday season and connect with the true meaning of Christmas. We are excited to see how God continues to use our ministry to strengthen families, deepen faith, and share His love with our community this Christmas season and the upcoming year.



Our Father's heart is always full of grace and mercy to those in need. Matthew 25:35 says, "For I was hungry and you gave Me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave Me something to drink, I was a stranger and you took Me in."

In June 2020, at the height of the COVID pandemic, Delivering Disciples was born. Trinity was seeing food still coming in from Forgotten Harvest and others, but with no place for people to gather and eat it. What was Trinity to do with all that food? Pastor Lew Stier and John Bullaro, who led the Food Van ministry, came up with the idea to cook up the food, put it into takeout containers, freeze it and then deliver those frozen meals to low-income senior housing facilities in our area.

That ministry continued on with 50-100 meals a week for a couple of years. Delivering Disciples was then blessed by Stephen Harris who led the ministry to new levels by recruiting volunteers and establishing standard processes. He led the effort in working through barriers

to expand the ministry to not only help those in senior housing, but to also do home delivery to seniors and families in transition. Many seniors enjoy not only having to cook one more meal, but also having someone stop by and visit each week.

The ministry now serves 500 meals a week. A small army of 30-40 volunteers assist in cooking, packaging, putting meals in freezer, and then delivering those meals. A very beneficial help to the ministry is all the prepared food donated by catering companies in the area.

A special shout out to the small team that makes homemade soups to also send along with the meals. This is a real blessing! Our clients LOVE the soups!


And then we do it again the next week, and the next week....52 weeks a year.

Terry Measel was baptized at Trinity in 1938 and was a lifetime member of Trinity involved in many areas. He was the architect for a major expansion and renovation at Trinity in 1987. His favorite Bible verse was Psalm 31:3 – "For You are my Rock and my Fortress; for Your Name's sake lead me and guide me." He joined the Trinity Foundation Board of Trustees in Nov. 1994 and served for over 30 years until his transition to heaven to be with Jesus in April 2025.

Over the past 51 years, gifts from our Trinity family members have totaled \$1.2 million. Market appreciation, along with those gifts, has brought the Foundation's balance invested to \$2.5 million at the end of 2024. These investments generate interest and dividend income which is all used in support of grants to Trinity's ministries today and in the years ahead. Trinity Foundation has given back \$667,000 in grants to support Trinity's ministries.

Trinity congregation elects Trustees to oversee the Foundation's ministry. Glenn Ross and Gary Vandeputte serve as Chairman and Treasurer, respectively. They, along with Pastor Justin Krupsky, Peter Rynearson, Pam Rank and our newest appointee of Mindy Pioch, look forward to guiding this ministry into the future.

One thing I know is true about our God is that He has a heart for His children—and that's who we are! That's why I'm so proud that our youth ministry doesn't just teach about God, but helps students truly know Him. When young people realize that their faith isn't just something their parents want them to learn, but a relationship with a Father who loves them immeasurably, lives begin to change.

From Junior High Youth Group to TABS (Trinity's Adultish Bible Study), every gathering gives students a chance to encounter Christ personally and be transformed by His presence. Across our core programs—Junior High, Confirmation, Senior High, and TABS—we've had the joy of connecting with hundreds of students this year.

Our Junior High Youth Group has gone through transitions, reminding us that while things around us may change, our God never does. We thank God for leaders like Kelly Patterson and Jennifer Cleland, who show up week after week to remind kids of God's love. Kelly, who's missed just one youth group in two years, shared this about her experience: "It's deepened my faith and helped me see how important community is. What comes to mind with the Father's heart is love, compassion, and commitment—He loves us unconditionally as His children."

In Confirmation, our goal is to help students form holy habits that last far beyond their confirmation day. We don't read Scripture just to know the story, but to know the One revealed in it. Our High School Youth Group continues to be a beautiful mix of students from all backgrounds—some who grew up at Trinity, some from other churches, and some discovering faith for the first time. They often tell me what makes our group different is how "real" it feels. We have space for open, honest, and sometimes deep conversations about who God is and who we are to Him.

And then there's TABS, our "technically adult" Bible study for those still figuring it out. This group keeps me on my toes in the best way. No matter how much I prepare, someone always asks the one question I didn't research—and that's where the real learning happens. Their curiosity and hunger to know God better inspire me every week.

As we head into Christmas, I'm reminded that our Father's heart is one of presence—He shows up, draws near, and gives Himself for His children. My prayer is that every student, whether a fifth grader just starting out or a twenty-something searching for direction, would know that same love.

If you want to know more of who God is, consider joining one of our groups—or, like Kelly, step up to serve as a leader and experience how God deepens your faith through community.

Our God is worth knowing. His heart hasn't changed —He still delights in His children, steps into the mess, and loves us enough to show up every time.
