Series: More than WordsSermon: James - Live It!Scripture: James 2: 14-22

CONNECT

1. What stood out to you from the service this week?

2. Are you more likely to act without thinking or think without acting?

ENGAGE

- 1. Read James 2: 14-18.
 - What attitude or behavior is Paul calling out in verse 14? What might this look like in real life?
 - What is the relationship between faith and deeds, according to James?
 - In what way is faith without deeds "dead"? What does this mean?
- 2. Read verses 19-22.
 - What is the significance of James reminding us that we believe that there is one God?
 - What is the lesson from Abraham's example? How was his faith put to the test? What does this say about the way our lifestyle should correspond to our professed faith?

APPLY

- 1. David talked about the idea of integration that our words and deeds should match each other, revealing a heart that is undivided in devotion to Christ. When you think about the various circles in your life work, friends, church, school, sports think honestly about how integrated is your faith in Christ and your actions? What is some evidence of this? If there seems to be a broad disconnect, what might this mean, and how do you feel Christ leading you in this moment?
- 2. The Hebrew language is rich and uses many words that contain a "both/and" translation. For example, the word "shema" is best translated as "hear and obey." The word "pistuo" means "believe and trust." In this passage, James is making the point that faith and works are also forever linked. How does this challenge your traditional understanding of the word "faith"? What steps can you take to live out your faith, without falling to the temptation to do "false works" things that might make you look good, but aren't done from a heart of love, rooted in Christ?

PRAYER

Father in Heaven, You are perfectly consistent and whole in your being. Your character is perfectly aligned in Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. You have called us to live a life that is consistent with the faith we profess - a faith that is alive and results in good works. May the fruit of our lives be a result of Your love and Word at our core. In Jesus' name we pray, amen.

GOING DEEPER

This is Holy Week, the days between Jesus' humble entrance into Jerusalem and his crucifixion. As you go through this week, remember the crowds who cheered him on Sunday, only to jeer and scorn him on Friday. Consider how you either stand with Jesus or distance yourself from him in your various circles. Pray that God will help you love him with all your heart, soul, and strength, presenting a consistent and unified life which will function as a most effective witness for Christ.
