The Vine and the Branches - John 15:1-8

"I am the true vine, and my Father is the gardener. Every branch in me that does not produce fruit he removes, and he prunes every branch that produces fruit so that it will produce more fruit. You are already clean because of the word I have spoken to you.

4 "Remain in me, and I in you. Just as a branch is unable to produce fruit by itself unless it remains on the vine, neither can you unless you remain in me.

5-8 "I am the vine; you are the branches. The one who remains in me and I in him produces much fruit, because you can do nothing without me. If anyone does not remain in me, he is thrown aside like a branch and he withers. They gather them, throw them into the fire, and they are burned. If you remain in me and my words remain in you, ask whatever you want and it will be done for you. My Father is glorified by this: that you produce much fruit and prove to be my disciples.

"I am the Real Vine and my Father is the Farmer. He cuts off every branch of me that doesn't bear grapes. And every branch that is grape-bearing he prunes back so it will bear even more. You are already pruned back by the message I have spoken.

4 "Live in me. Make your home in me just as I do in you. In the same way that a branch can't bear grapes by itself but only by being joined to the vine, you can't bear fruit unless you are joined with me.

5-8 "I am the Vine, you are the branches. When you're joined with me and I with you, the relation intimate and organic, the harvest is sure to be abundant. Separated, you can't produce a thing. Anyone who separates from me is deadwood, gathered up and thrown on the bonfire. But if you make yourselves at home with me and my words are at home in you, you can be sure that whatever you ask will be listened to and acted upon. This is how my Father shows who he is—when you produce grapes, when you mature as my disciples.

The Message

What do we know about Groups/Leadership at GABC:

- Groups will not cry together until they laugh together
- People will go deeper in discipleship when relationships run deep
- They want to engage in their local community
- People don't know their spiritual gifts
- People often don't see their community engagement as ministry
- They want to ministry with a purpose

Key Points in leading connect groups:

- Understand your Group may not operate like any other Group
- Pray with other leaders in your Group, to discover what might work, how you can work together and discover God's plans
- You may have successes and failures that is OK
- Allow ideas and input from Group members, Give them ownership, Engage them
- Different generations will engage differently
- · Get to know your people and understand their world
- Plan ahead
- Understand if someone says "no" could mean "not now"
- Encourage people to use their personal life experiences to minister to others
- Discover ways to use professional and business experiences in ministry
- Consider joining with other Connect Groups on ministry projects
- Choose events that involve the entire family
- Consider multi-event ministry projects
- Allow other members in charge of activities

Leaders/Coordinators must work as a team:

- Work with your fellow coordinators on how all coordinators can work on the same project - Learn to coordinate events by working together. (prayer, planning, executing, evaluate, responding, etc.)
- Plan ahead
- Plan things that are "easy wins" with growing impact

 - Pray that God will prepare other and to show you who they are
 - Ask individuals to help
 - Watch their interest level (you have an idea; you have a job)
 - Look for skills needed for the position

 - Start/stop class on time
 - Curriculum teach what is scheduled (or with approved exceptions)

Know Your People and Generations:

The Greatest Generation: 1901-1927

The Silent Generation: 1928-1945
