Excerpts of the Request for an Expanded Profile and Consultation

We acknowledge that in this time and season, congregations and clergy need to be able to respond to a variety of perspectives on same-sex marriage and ordination standards. We see the option of an expanded profile and consultation as a tool to guide us all in a transitory, liminal season. We reject the practice of compartmentalizing churches and clergy into categories according to their actual or perceived perspectives. The Bishop and Cabinet will not treat clergy or congregations that make this request any differently than others who do not make this request. This is an expression of respect and compassion allowing us to honor the differences among us and to strengthen our common mission.

The 2016 Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church already: 1) Guarantees a thorough consultation process with clergy and churches around clergy appointments. (Par. 425-430) 2) Gives clergy the sole decision whether or not to perform weddings. (Par. 340.2) 3) Gives Boards of Trustees the authority to determine building usage policies. (Par. 2533) Should the language in the Book of Discipline related to marriage and ordination change at a future date, the Florida Conference Bishop and Cabinet will provide a way for congregations to more clearly state their perspectives on these matters by requesting an expanded profile and consultation.

The DS will meet with the SPRC to discuss the process for utilizing the annual church profile as a way of sharing the congregation's perspective on prohibiting church use for same-sex weddings and its unwillingness to receive a pastor who identifies as part of the LGBTQ community. The SPRC will represent to the DS the majority view of the church Trustees who ultimately determine facility use related to weddings.

Should the SPRC, in consultation with the DS, choose to expand its church profile to include one or both of these limitations on weddings and clergy appointments, the expectation is that the highest degree of compassion be extended to all persons, inside and outside of the church, who are impacted by these decisions.

What's Our Next Step?

At our recent townhall meeting I mentioned that Art Reeves, Margaret Hogue and I would schedule meetings with anyone who requested to have questions answered regarding the denominational split. Less than 5 members requested a meeting. A majority of members spoke to Art, Margaret, and me, and let us know that they would prefer to not have a church-wide vote to disaffiliate. The next step in the process is for the FUMC HS church board to hold a vote to consider scheduling a church-wide vote to disaffiliate from the Florida Conference of the United Methodist Denomination. The board will vote at its March 21, 2023, meeting.

To help our congregation better understand this process I wanted you to share some history on the disaffiliation. Originally the split of the denomination only offered two options, 1). if a church was open to having a LGBTQ+ pastor and performing same sex marriages, the church would remain in the UMC, and 2.) if not, the church could disaffiliate and join other Methodist denominations, mainly the newly formed Global Methodist. As you have heard me say so many times, our church has a lot of members who are not in either of those groups, but in this scenario, would be forced to choose one of these two options. Also, with only these two choices, I believe our church would be severely divided. Fortunately, the Florida Conference has provided an additional choice, which is called Request for an Expanded Profile & Consultation. The profile and consultation encourages our church to remain United Methodist, but allows our church to not have a LGBTQ+ pastor or conduct same sex marriages in our church. Excerpts of the profile and consultation for your perusal can be found on page 9 of this newsletter.

Since my arrival we have focused on building the Body of Believers. We have focused on being united on loving each other and reaching out to share the love of God with our community and the world. I have seen your love flourish. I know there are things we disagree on. Despite our differences, backgrounds and preferences God has asked us to live, love, and work together to build unity as part of the family of God. I long for unity not division. I am encouraging you to prayerfully consider where you stand on the issue of disaffiliation and share that with one of our Board members. The Board needs your input on the call for a church-wide vote. Thank you for your attention to this matter. God Bless You and God Bless FUMC of High Springs.



The Story of St. Patrick's Day

Like many stories in history, the story of St. Patrick has little to nothing to do with what most celebrate, for it is not about Leprechauns, four leave clovers, pots of gold, or snakes. Patrick was born in Britain in the fourth Century during a time of great uncertainty for the Roman Empire, which gave protection to Britain against Barbaric invasions. The Roman legions were called back to defend other regions of the Empire, leaving Britain open to attacks. Just before Patrick's 16th birthday, while at a family holiday villa by the sea, Irish pirates attacked. While Patrick's family escaped, he and many of the family workers were taken captive. While they were en route to Ireland, Patrick was sold as a slave to a Druid tribal chieftain and he was given the task of herdsman.

Though raised in a Christian home, Patrick had not made a decision to follow Christ. But, through his many sufferings as a slave serving in harsh weather and conditions, his love and fear of God grew stronger and he realized his calling to share the Gospel. He earned the name "Holy boy" among fellow slaves.

Through God's grace, he escaped at age 22 and traveled 200 miles to Ireland, and two years later made it back to his family in Britain. He began studying to become a priest and bishop, when he got a calling to return to Ireland. Against the advise of family and church leaders, who didn't think the pagan Druids were worth saving, Patrick returned to the Green Ilse to spread the Gospel of Jesus and also taught people how to read and write. Enslavement, torture, imprisonment, and eventually death in Christ, St. Patrick is an inspiration for all of us to stand firm in Christ and tell others about the greatest gift anyone can ever receive-salvation through Christ Jesus!
