away on June 23.

In 1974, Brother Davis answered the call to the gospel ministry, was licensed to preach later that year, and was ordained in 1976. He pastored New Home Church for two years, Fugate Church for five years, and had pastored Woods Memorial Church for fourteen years.

A fellow preacher, Brother Jimmie Lowe, said of Brother Davis, "He was an outstanding person, a quiet, solid, really topnotch man. He was a loving, caring, friendly person who touched a lot of lives for the Lord."

One of his fellow pastors, Brother Jesse Meade, said, "Brother McNeese was extremely steady and consistent; he was always the same. He was a tremendous man of God." He graduated from Free Will Baptist Bible College in Nashville in May 1989. He now holds a doctor's degree in Education Administration from LaSalle University.



During his time there, 19 new classrooms were built, along with a two-story dining hall/gymnasium, baseball/soccer field, state-of-the-art science lab and a 24-unit online computer lab.

He pastored in Virginia and Tennessee for eight years and served as assistant director at FWB Camp Jacob in Clintwood, Va., for two years.

"I am very excited about joining the ministry of Free Will Baptist Family Ministries. I feel God has called me here for a purpose. I want to help this ministry expand and grow to better minister to the needs of the hurting children and their families. I also want to be a help to the churches in any way I can. I look forward to visiting our churches, getting to know everyone and being a part of the work here."

Thurman Pate, Sr. Honored



The Union Association at its recent annual meeting honored Brother Thurman Pate, Sr. for serving 60 years in the gospel ministry. Few men among Free Will Baptists have contributed as much to the cause of Christ as Brother Pate. His pastorates have all been in Tennessee, except for one in Michigan. He has pastored Faith Church in Knoxville for over 30 years. Earlier on he had to serve as a bi-vocational pastor. He has held many denominational offices and now serves as Treasurer of the Union Association.

Brother Pate believes deeply in our Lord's Great Commission. He promotes the entire denominational ministry, but he has a special heartbeat for foreign missions. He has been very active in the Sexton Walk-A-Thon from its beginning.

He and his wife Faustine have been married 54 years. The Donelson Church Breaks Ground For New Worship Center



After four years of careful planning, members of Donelson FWB Church gathered on the church's lawn on June 15 to break ground on a new two-level worship center. The \$2.2 million structure is uniquely designed to be multi-purposed, with a stage that rises into the wall and seats that are easily removed, allowing the room to be used for fellowship, sports, childcare, and educational activities. Pastor Robert J. Morgan, quoting Psalm 102:18, told the crowd, "Let this be built 'for a future generation, that a people not yet created may praise the Lord." Charter member Mrs. Oleda Rudy Lundquist offered the groundbreaking prayer.

Completion of the 32,600 sq. ft. facility is expected by Easter 1998.

To further emphasize Brother Hood's role at FWBFM, on this same day a large crowd gathered for a groundbreaking service for an emergency shelter for boys. All the events on this day were very ably planned and directed by Beth McPherson, the Director of Development for FWBFM. Mr. Larry Estepp, President of First Tennessee Bank in Greeneville, gave warm greetings from the business community. Among those attending the groundbreaking were many supporters from across the state, pastors, FWBFM trustees, neighbors and friends from the area. Another honored guest was Mr. Scott M. Niswonger, President and Chief Executive Officer of Landair Services Inc., who has made a challenge matching-gift pledge of \$250,000.

In addition to that which has already been pledged and raised for this much needed expansion, an additional \$400,000 is yet needed. The total project includes the shelter for boys, an emergency shelter for girls, and an endowment for the maintenance of the buildings at FWBFM. This was an outstanding day for all Free Will Baptists in Tennessee.

Kevin Trimble, Assistant Executive Director of FWBFM, will serve as the Acting Executive Director until the newly chosen director comes to FWBFM.
