care. Brother Riggs—or someone—has to be with her at all times. Also, she is on very expensive medication. It is now necessary to have someone come in at nights to relieve Brother Raymond. Sister Riggs is afflicted with a combination of Alzheimer's-Parkinson's disease, known medically as "Lewy-Body."

NEW CHURCH BUILDING AT KINGSPORT



Groundbreaking ceremonies took place in October 1997 on a 19-acre plot of land at 2444 Rock Springs Road, Kingsport, for a new church. The men and women of the church pooled their talents and resources and built **New Life Free Will Baptist Church**. All the carpentry, electrical, painting and decorating, both interior and exterior, were performed by the members of the church. Many hours of hard work were donated, just to get the church under roof. The bitter cold of winter was felt while the work continued.

The first service in the new building was on Sunday, September 13, 1998. The pastor, **Rev. Hal Calhoun**, was overwhelmed trying to relate the experiences of the past year and what the church had endured to get where it was. He encouraged the members to continue to grow spiritually. Since the first service, there have been many individuals and families making this their regular place of worship. There have been at least fifteen souls saved or rededicated. To God be the glory!

As a commercial contractor, the pastor was the overseer of the building project. The vote from the beginning was to build, and every vote since has been unanimous. Although the church relocated about five miles from

the original location, not a single member was lost. The Lord has been gracious honor the work at New Life Free Will **Baptist** Church. All of this loudly proclaims that "miracles can still happen."



THE NORTHERN QUARTERLY OF THE CUMBERLAND REACH FOR A GOAL

In 1983, just 17 years ago, the churches of the Northern Quarterly of the Cumberland Association started an annual financial drive for Free Will Baptist Bible College. Since then, on the last Sunday in February, this special drive has been carried out. The various churches usually have a representative from the college speak in the morning service—then all of them go together for the rally which meets on Sunday evening at Pleasant View Christian School.

This drive was begun under the leadership of **Brother Terry Boyd** who was the Northern Quarterly Moderator at that time. The goal for 1999 is \$28,000. When this goal is met—and all signs indicate that it will be—the 23 churches of the Northern Quarterly will have given a grand total of \$300,000 to the college in these annual drives.

This special drive is in addition to the regular support given to the college by almost every church of the Northern Quarterly. We salute these churches and their pastors for this outstanding achievement.

NEWS FROM FREE WILL BAPTIST FAMILY MINISTRIES

Free Will Baptist Family Ministries in Greeneville announces the opening of a brand new emergency shelter for boys, known as a P.A.T.H. Shelter (Protecting Adolescents and Teaching Hope). This home has been under construction since May 1998. With the help of literally dozens of volunteers, under the direction of Buddy Arnold (Plant & Operations Manager), the construction has been completed. There is not room to thank all the churches, individuals and women's groups who helped build and furnish this home.

A ribbon cutting ceremony was held on February 11 with over 130 people in attendance. Visitors included pastors, lay leaders, social workers and local judicial leaders.

This new facility is the product of a successful five year Capital Campaign which ended in 1998. It comprises 4,000 square feet, which breaks down into six bedrooms for twelve young men (including one which is handicap accessible). The staff area consists of two bedrooms, private bath and living room and an office. The large main room will provide ample space for both the living and dining room.

This new shelter was a dream that started five years ago. With God's help and blessings, FWBFM hopes to see this facility serve hundreds of children in the years to come. A recent report on national television announced that child abuse has doubled in the last decade! It's sad that a ministry like this must exist, but FWBFM is glad for the opportunity to serve the Lord in this mission field.

Please remember also that Mother's Day, May 9, is when every church is asked to receive a special offering for the ministry of FWBFM. Do your best!

Sister Winona Riggs Called Home

After this present issue of *Echo* was printed, news reached us on Tuesday, March 23, 1999, that at noon on this day, Sister Riggs passed away. This past week, Mrs. Riggs was admitted to the hospital in Cookeville where it was determined that she was critically ill. At times her body temperature would go as high as 106 degrees. Medical personnel, family and friends did all that could be done for her. All of the Riggs' children, except for their son Stephen—missionary to France—had been at the hospital before she passed away.

The Riggs' have six children, all of whom attended Free Will Baptist Bible College. All four sons are ordained. Charles Riggs is an ordained deacon and minister of music. Dr. Kenneth Riggs pastors West Meade Fellowship of Nashville. (He was formerly Chairman of the Teacher Education Department at Free Will Baptist Bible College.) Randall Riggs has pastored several Free Will Baptist churches but is now between churches. (The last church he pastored was Harper Road Free Will Baptist Church at Joelton, Tennessee.) The youngest son, Stephen, is serving the Foreign Missions Department as a missionary to France. Both daughters are active in local churches. Ramona lives in Virginia and Patsy lives in Murfreesboro, Tennessee. The Riggs' have twenty grandchildren and eleven great-grandchildren. One grandson is a pastor and one is a medical doctor.


Sister Winona Riggs was a very gifted person. She was an outstanding organist and pianist. She was also a good singer and a unique writer. She wrote a book of humor entitled *Bologna From Winona*. Mrs. Riggs loved music and could play from memory almost any hymn that one could suggest.

Mrs. Riggs was the daughter of the late Reverend and Mrs. Newton P. Gates of Arkansas and Michigan. She has two brothers, both of whom live in Michigan, Graydon Gates and Lowell Gates.

The Riggs' have been a great ministry team. Brother Riggs' preaching, Mrs. Riggs' playing the organ or piano and both of them singing have blessed the hearts of multiplied thousands of people.

The Riggs' have been married for 62 years. They have contributed much to the cause of Christ and the Free Will Baptist denomination. Mrs. Riggs greatest contribution is that of the six outstanding children who are following them in the faith. She was admired and loved by all who knew her. There is no doubt that she was one of the most interesting and colorful personalities among Free Will Baptists.

Sister Trula Cronk, former missionary to India, said of Mrs. Riggs: "The greatest compliment that I could pay Winona was to tell her how much I love and appreciate all of her children. My fondest memory is her music. My, I wish she could have willed that gift of hers to me! But there will be wonderful music for all of us when we join her in heaven with the Lord."



A LETTER TO PASTORS AND CHURCHES OF TENNESSEE

I enjoyed the state association with the wonderful messages from the pulpit and the fellowship. I know that the state of Tennessee lives up to its name when there is a need...not only in military volunteers but also in spiritual warfare.

That is why I am writing this letter. God most definitely has placed in my heart the burden to plant a Bible-believing Free Will Baptist church in Carthage, Tennessee. There is not a Free Will Baptist church in this area. The Tennessee State Missions Board and the National Home Missions Board have given me a chance. I thank God for these men of God who have a burden to see a Free Will Baptist church in cities where there is not one.

They encouraged me, prayed with and for me, and sent me out. Nevertheless, the burden God gave to plant this church is mine. God gave it to me. He and I know that it's too big a task for me alone. I am asking you and your church to pray about this mission and seek God's guidance in helping to bear this burden.

I was the first full-time pastor of my most recent pastorate. To be full-time as many of you are, I sacrificed health insurance, wages, vacations, and retirement. However, I never asked for more than they could give.

I share this with you so that you might see how difficult it is for me to ask, but I do not know what else to do. I know without a doubt that God wants a Free Will Baptist church in Carthage, Tennessee.

God had laid this on my heart, and I ask you to pray about it. If God leads you to help me with financial support, I am sure that you will. If you cannot help financially, please help with much prayer that we will succeed in what God has led us to do.

WORLD MISSIONS OFFERING

The World Missions Offering is the first of four annual offerings under *The Together Way* plan of the National Association of Free Will Baptists. This year, **Foreign Missions Sunday falls on April 25**. Churches are encouraged to participate with a sacrificial offering on that day to undergird the Foreign Missions program.

In 1998, Free Will Baptists gave nearly \$79,000 to the World Missions Offering. If every church would do something for Foreign Missions on April 25, many of the needs would be met on behalf of world outreach.

Churches are asked to designate their offering to "World Missions Offering" and send it to Foreign Missions, P.O. Box 5002, Antioch, TN 37011-5002. Offerings can also be sent through the district or state association but should clearly be designated for the World Missions Offering.

NORTH AMERICAN STRATEGY FORUM REPORT

From across the denomination, 109 pastors, state moderators, promotional directors, college presidents, and businessmen from 27 states met in Nashville, January 6-8, 1999, for a North American Strategy Forum to discuss how Free Will Baptists can more effectively promote the cause of Christ until Jesus returns. This was sponsored by the National Home Missions Department.

Seven priorities were identified: **Prayer** for our churches, pastors, leaders, one another, and for God's blessing and leading; **passion** to reach the lost for Christ and to encourage believers to remain faithful; **preaching** the Word of God with the power of God to meet the needs of the people; **positiveness** in our attitude about our service to God and His control over the future; **peace** among ourselves, our members, and our preachers as we promote the work of God; **purity** of heart, soul, and daily life so that God may hear our prayers and bless our service; and **purpose**, a firm commitment and focus on extending the witness of Christ and the building of His Church throughout the world.

He went on to share with the congregation that she had taught the 4- and 5-year-old Sunday School class for 50 years! In addition, for 60 years (from the time she was 16 years old until shortly before her death) she had served as the communion stewardess at her church. Thus, she was the one who prepared the elements when the church celebrated the Lord's Table and then cleaned up after wards—for 60 years!

Pastor Goodwin concluded his remarks by reading to us Paul's words in 1 Corinthians 15:58—"Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ve steadfast, unmoveable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, for you know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord."
