Do special days still work? It would be hard to convince Pastor Noah Taylor and the congregation of Evergreen Free Will Baptist Church in Erwin otherwise. The Lord really blessed their efforts on Sunday, May 3 when they had 825 in attendance which is the highest attendance in the church's 94 year history. The Lord also blessed with eight salvation decisions on that day. They filled up the sanctuary to capacity and live streamed the service to their Fellowship Hall with over 100 in attendance watching the service from there. Actually, two of the salvation decision were made during the invitation time in the Fellowship Hall! Over 160 children were present in the gym for a special children's worship service.

Pastor Noah Taylor said, "The Lord blessed with phenomenal weather and following the service we fed all 800+ people under a HUGE tent. The day really gave us a unique opportunity to reach out to people in our community that otherwise we would not have been able to reach. We have been working hard on connecting with the many prospects that were gained over that weekend, and we are already seeing much fruit for our labor. We praise God for what we were able to accomplish for Him. I summarized the day to our church by quoting Psalm 118:23 which says, "This is the LORD'S doing; it is marvelous in our eyes."

FIRST FREE WILL BAPTIST CHURCH OF ELIZABETHTON Burns the note on the Mortgage

When Pastor Nathan Jennings assumed the pastorate of the First Free Will Baptist Church in Elizabethton in August of 2010, the church still owed approximately \$510,000 on their mortgage. Previous to his coming, the church had borrowed a little over one million dollars to finance renovations to the sanctuary and educational wing. Pastor Jennings challenged the church to pay off the mortgage and faithful, committed, loving members took the challenge. Some gave systematically, others participated in fundraising projects and two ladies took it upon themselves to make homemade apple pies and sold them for one dollar each. To everyone's amazement, they sold \$33,000 worth of pies. Two anonymous gifts were given, one for \$100,000 about three years ago and another one for \$47,000 to pay the mortgage off completely. In April of this year, God enabled them to have a note burning ceremony. Pastor Jennings remarked, "The Lord has blessed. I am thankful to the lord for what He has done and is doing. I feel like our greatest days are ahead."





As I See It

Someone once said, "God is more interested in what you are than what you do." I believe this to be very true. In my early years of ministry I was determined to be a man of accomplishment. I wanted to "do something" for God. This is not altogether bad but sometimes we need to stop and analyze the motives for what we do. One of the most hurtful things anybody ever said to me (actually they didn't say it to me, they said it behind my back and it got back to me) was that I just wanted to make a name for myself. Anybody that ever said words could never hurt you, just doesn't know what they are talking about. It did hurt, but then it made me stop and think, "What if that's true? Am I just seeking my own glory?" The Lord showed me that if I worked on being the man I ought to be, He would take care of my reputation and accomplishments. In the last few years I have met some giant Christians that were not widely known outside of their small circle but they were men and women of character, compassion, and faith. They were men and women God could count on to stand in the gap where He placed them. As I see it, if we are what we ought to be, doing what God tells us to do, that is accomplishment.



Board Appoints New Missionaries

The Board of Free Will Baptist International Missions completed its two-day annual session on April 28, in Antioch, Tennessee. During the second day of meetings, the board approved four missionary candidates and accepted the retirement of two missionaries.



The board approved Eddy and Amanda Simmons (Faith FWB Church, Matthews, NC) as career missionaries to the Samburu people group of Kenya. The Simmons will serve in an isolated region in northeast Kenya serving the unreached Samburu people. "This is an historic appointment," stated Candidate Shepherd Jeff Turnbough. "This is the first time we are NOT opening a country (Kenya), yet opening a work exclusively with an unreached people group who mainly reside within the borders of a particular nation. The Simmons already have significant experience working among the Samburu using orality as the basis of their methodology."



The board approved Tyler and Kellie Penn (Champaign, Illinois) as career missionaries to the international students at the University of Illinois Urbana. In 2014, the board voted to partner with the Home Missions Board for the purpose of cross-cultural ministry projects in North America. "I hope this historic appointment," Jeff Turnbough said, "is the first of many such joint ministry ventures with Mission North America." The Penn's, originally appointed as career missionaries with Mission North America in 2011, will partner with a church-planting home missionary.



The board accepted the retirement of Steve and Judy Lytle (Panama) effective June 30, 2015. "Steve and Judy have served selflessly for 40 years," stated Board Chairman Danny Williams. "We commend them for their dedicated service in Panama, in the Mission office, and wherever their services were requested. They have been outstanding examples of God-called missionaries."

The first annual **Acts 1:8 Power Conference** on church growth and revitalization was hosted by North American Ministries in Branson, Missouri May 25-26. The Conference was a great success! Hundreds of folks from 17 different states packed the Stone Castle Hotel and Conference Center for a power packed two days of inspiration, information, and fellowship. The church services had the feeling of a revival meeting and the break out seminars on Tuesday were filled to capacity. Feedback has been unbelievably overwhelming with comments like, "This was the greatest conference I have ever attended"..."I leave this meeting with hope for my ministry, my church, and our denomination."...and..."This conference was much more beneficial than others I have paid large sums of money to attend!"

Discontinues Dividend

For the past several years, Brotherhood Mutual Insurance Company has given the Tennessee State Association an opportunity to receive a dividend based on premiums versus claims through its Partnership Group Program. Even though the state association was not eligible for a dividend during the last four years because of a large amount of claims, we have received tens of thousands of dollars from Brotherhood over a longer period of time.

In a letter dated April 16, 2015, the company officially informed the Tennessee Promotional Office that they had run into problems with several state regulators over the program. Some states would not allow the program at all. Brotherhood decided to end the program in keeping with the founding principles of fairness to all as a mutual benefits company.

If your church has a policy with Brotherhood Mutual and you are satisfied with the cost, coverage, and service the company provides, we encourage you to keep your policy. We still believe it is a good company. Because we know that many of you switched to Brotherhood Mutual in the past few years because of the benefit to the state association, we felt that you should be informed of this decision. In keeping with good stewardship, please do what you think is best for your church.
