What is Truth & Peace? Truth & Peace is a long-standing conference hosted by Randall House that teaches leadership qualities to teenage students. The students are divided into teams based on year, with each successive year in the conference representing a new level. For example, a student's first year they are a 101, their second year they are a 201, so on and so forth. This conference takes place over 10 days and includes spiritual training that teaches young people to better understand their gifts and how to use them to draw near to Christ. This training culminates at the Vertical Three Conference, where the student-leaders are asked to serve the conference in a multitude of ways. This year Truth & Peace hosted 144 students, spanning across 20 states, and hailing from 3 foreign countries. The 2017 Truth & Peace conference was also the first to be held on the new campus of Welch College in Gallatin, TN. Truth & Peace is available to any Free Will Baptist High School Student (Grades 9-12). The deadline to apply is October 31, 2017.

Jimmy Aldridge, 79, former missionary to Côte d'Ivoire, entered his eternal home on July 9. He had battled Alzheimer's for several years. He and his wife Janie were appointed as missionaries in October 1962 and departed in July of 1963 for language school. Once in Ivory Coast, they served primarily in the Bondoukou area. The couple served in Ivory Coast four terms for a total of 22 years. For 15 years, the Alabama native made Nashville his home as he served in the Mission office. He retired in 1999 and returned to his home in Alabama. Jimmy leaves behind his wife Janie as well as extended family members.

Tim Coates, 63, former home missionary to South Dakota was tragically killed in a hunting accident on April 22, 2017. After joining the U.S. Navy in 1971, he served as a data systems technician for the next six years. While being stationed in California, Tim became a Christian, and upon receiving an honorable discharge in 1977, he decided to attend Free Will Baptist Bible College in Nashville, TN. During his time at Bible College, he met his future wife, Kathy Jenkins from Norton, VA. They were married on Aug. 2, 1981. Tim was employed by the Free Will Baptist Home Missions Department to establish a church in the surrounding area of Rapid City, SD. Harvest Time Free Will Baptist Church was founded and it was here that Tim would remain for the next thirty-three years. The Coates were blessed with five children.

WHY SHOULD MY CHURCH PARTICIPATE IN THE MISSION NORTH AMERICA OFFERING?

Each department of the National Association of Free Will Baptists is assigned a month to receive a special offering to provide funds for their general fund. November is the month Free Will Baptist North American Ministries has to receive this special offering. NAM designates the Sunday before Thanksgiving as the Mission North American offering day but funds can be sentany time during the year earmarked for this special offering.

Why should MY church participate? That's the question every pastor and church leader must ask. Really, there is a simple answer and one that is a little more complex. I'll give you both. The simple answer is, because your church is a part of the denomination and NAM is a department worthy to receive your support. The more complex answer is, our general fund provides money for ministry critical projects that are only funded through the general fund.

The general fund provides money to run the office in Antioch, TN. It is used to pay salaries and electric bills- stuff no one gets too excited about funding but is critical. More importantly though, our general fund provides operational resources for each of the six main divisions of our office. Our six main divisions are: church planting, church revitalization, cross-cultural ministry, the chaplaincy, the church extension loan fund and Master's men.

Money from the general fund provides resources to recruit, assess, train and coach our church planters, church revitalization pastors, cross cultural ministers and chaplains. Every new church planter and revitalization pastor goes through intensive training that is paid for by the general fund. Ongoing training is provided through conferences, training events and online resources. We use these funds to promote our church planters, print materials such as directories (so you can stay informed and in touch), maps, brochures and many other things.

Our general fund provides money for encouragement to our planters, pastors and chaplains on the field. They are loved, prayed for, visited, trained, motivated and from time to time given monetary tokens of our love and appreciation. Basically, everything except a church planter's salary is provided for by the general fund.

Our church revitalization division sponsors a number of training events and seminars that are all free of charge to the pastors and churches of our denomination. Mostly, we travel to you to make it as convenient as possible for any church to participate in our events. Our staff is available to come to your church (without charge) to provide training, encouragement, preaching and more.

NAM receives a portion of the Together Way plan but those funds only provide about 14% of our total general fund need. Proceeds from the Church Extension Loan Fund provide about 11% so we are dependent on gift income to make up the difference (about 75%). These are only a few reasons why the second answer is more complex!

So, why should YOUR church participate in the Mission North America offering on November 19, 2017? Because our church planters, revitalization pastors, cross-cultural ministers, chaplains and entire team are counting on you! We cannot do what we do without your generous support. We need your prayers and financial support so please pray about helping by participating in the offering this year. All we are asking is that you promote the offering to your church. Tell them who we are and what we do and give the Lord an opportunity to deal with their heart about giving. Then give them the opportunity by taking up a special offering on November 19, 2017.
