"If my people, which are call by my name, shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin, and will heal their land."

2 Chronicles 7:13

This well-known verse has often been quoted through the years for patriotic holidays, political rallies, and national days of prayer. And though the heart of its words is to inspire change and God's call for repentance and healing in our nation, the promises of this verse go much wider and deeper than we may comprehend. These words, spoken for the Israelites after the dedication of the temple, has strong reminders for our lives today, for all of God's people, in every nation.

In the chapter just before, 2 Chronicles 6, Solomon asked the Lord for His mercy and forgiveness in the times that the people would sin. He knew, as we do today, that none of us are perfect and without sin in our lives. And God answered with these words and provisions that are relevant for believers still today:

God is the same, yesterday, today, and forever. And the way He responded to the cries of His people during Solomon's days, is still the way He is faithful to respond to our cries for help. He does hear our prayers from heaven. He is faithful to forgive us when we come before Him and confess our sin, admit our great need for Him, and turn from wrong. He promises to heal our land.

His whole character, who He is—Redeemer, Restorer, Healer, Rescuer—is a constant reminder to us that He will do what He says He will do. We don't have to worry. We don't have to fear. We don't have to wrestle through all on our own.

The very God who made us and set us free from sin and defeat is the very God who will miraculously heal our land. Our "land" in our personal lives. Our "land" in our families. Our "land" in our communities. Our "land" in America. And wherever else our "land" may be in this world. His power is limitless and reigns over all.

God hears our prayers, He knows our needs. And there's great power in uniting together, turning our hearts towards Him, and praying on behalf of our nation and world.

BEAUTIFUL SAVIOR LUTHERAN CHURCH COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES MAY 10, 2022

Present: Pastor Leavitt, , Pastor Kuehn, Bob Brzycki, Jerry Dalton, Rebecca Reich Sammito, Bill Christensen, Barb Christensen, Dan Najjar, Robert Morris, Jo Ross, Pat Brzycki, Davey Davis, Mary Luecke, Martha Music, Orval Stuckemeyer

Vice-President Jerry Dalton called the meeting to order. Davey opened the meeting with a prayer.

Motion: It was moved and seconded that the minutes of the April 12, 2022 Church Council meeting be approved. All present voted in favor. The motion passed.

Motion: It was moved and seconded that the minutes of the May 1, 2022 Voters' Assembly meeting be approved. All present voted in favor. The motion passed.

Treasurer's Report - Bill Christensen

Year-to-date donations and other revenue are \$211,714 for 2022. The same number last year was \$188,565. This is an increase of about \$23,000. Expenses increased by about \$21,000, leaving us to break even for the year so far. The church has sufficient cash and we are in a good financial condition.

Evangelism - Barb Christensen

The board met last week. Barb informed Council that she, Pastor Kuehn, and Donna Taylor continue to visit new homeowners in the Grady Pointe community. Additional gift bags have been assembled. A map with future visits coded in blue has been posted in the room off the Fellowship Hall. Barb thanked all the parishioners for their generous donations to Community Pregnancy Center. Grief Share classes, conducted by Donna Taylor, ended before Easter. Another session will start in late August. The 'Greeter and Welcome Desk Volunteer' guidelines document has been updated. There is a list of all previous volunteers and of all those interested in helping out. Interested individuals will be soon be contacted by the board. A future meeting of committed volunteers will be scheduled. Doris Schnepel will review the 'Ministries of BSLC' document to assess if the descriptions are still valid. Barb will present details of the Stephen Ministry to the Board of Elders. Teacher Appreciation Week was celebrated last week. The board sponsored this event at Abel Elementary School and Kinnan Elementary School. Pastor Kuehn, Barb and Donna met with a Grady Pointe couple who are involved with a prison ministry program. The couple has expressed an interest in discussing this with the board. Bibles were recently distributed by Jean Evers and Arlene Webb at the Manatee Correctional Facility. Arlene, the new Bible Ministry leader, has proposed an idea to reach out to incarcerated youth and youth facilities. BSLC labels for the Bibles have been revised to include a larger font. Care bags for the homeless was discussed the idea of a 'Parents' Night Out' on church property. Liability issues within our insurance coverage is an issue and therefore, will not be an option. The board meets again on June 7.

Financial Secretary - Martha Music

Martha informed Council that she has been working on the church website in an effort to attract community residents. Martha reminded all board chairpersons to communicate all volunteer opportunities so that they can be posted on the website, including future events, landscaping volunteers, Thanksgiving dinner event, etc.

Trustees - Orval Stuckemever and Dan Naiiar

Dan informed Council that there was a major water leak on church property and this was discovered when the water meter ran continuously. It was determined that a tree hit the water line. BSLC will be able to ask for a forgiveness of \$1,000 from Manatee County on the \$1,700 payment of the water use due to the leak. Dan asked the Treasurer if the farmer neighbor contributes to water costs. The farmer has access to some water for his cows due to the water coming from our water line. Bill determined that the bill is not separated for the church and this homeowner. Discussion took place and it was agreed that the church should be good neighbors to a farmer and his herd of cattle. Trustees will discuss this issue at their next board meeting. Orval informed Council that the Fellowship Hall chairs, a gift from Service Guild, have been ordered. New chairs for the Administration Building Conference Room will arrive soon. Dan discussed Dennis Wilm's request for a new carillon. Dan described the history of our church's bells. Acquiring a new carillon would come with a cost of about \$16,000 with an additional \$20,000 for installation. Council discussed this and determined that since it is not within the budget parameters of Vision 2025, we would take this issue up in the future. Discussion took place on replacing Pastor Leavitt's microphone and a component of the sound system. Martha brought up the need for better lighting near the Fellowship Hall exterior entry. She reports that it is eerily dark at around 6:00 A.M. on Sunday mornings when she delivers bread from Publix. Trustees will pursue this issue, possibly with a light timer or a sensor light.

Senior Ministry – Jo Ross

Vice Chairperson Jo will be sitting in for Chairperson Dennis Wilm who is spending summer in Wisconsin. No board meeting was held in May. The board will meet in June. The care note program continues with cards and notes sent for those needing prayer, healing and encouragement at a time of grief. Care note writers, including Dolly Morris, Ann Wilm, Christine Wright, Carol Rose and Jean Evers, have received materials to cover May through August. 30 individuals attended a Mayo de Cinco celebration at the Acapulco Mexican Restaurant on April 28. Bingo Day will be held on Thursday, May 12 at 1:30 P.M. Super Seniors will step back to the days of their Senior Prom on Thursday, May 26 with entertainment by Eddie Toben. Special thanks to Norm Kurtz who continues to oversee all Super Seniors events. Attendance at these events is now being recorded. Of the 220 Senior Ministry members, 85% have returned to worship since February when church attendance recording was initiated. Of those who have not returned to in-person worship, more than half are homebound or have experienced recent illness or grief. Two reside out-of-town.

Stewardship - Pat Brzycki

The board met last month with Treasurer Bill Christensen providing a budget update and answering Vision 2025 funding questions. At this time, there will be no major fundraising campaign. The 2023 church donation envelopes have arrived. The board has approved the LCMS Endowment Fund language in the revised Board of Stewardship job duties within the revisions of the Constitution and By-Laws.

Youth - Davey Davis

Davey thanks the entire congregation for their donations towards the upcoming National Youth Gathering event on July 9-13 in Houston. Youth will be assisting Trustees with mulch placement on Saturday, May 14. The board met with Hope Lutheran's youth last month and will meet on May 23 to finalize plans for the National Youth Gathering. Davey thanked

Trustees for the recent installation of a concrete pad to replace the deteriorating wood deck. On behalf of Children's Ministry chairperson, Cassie, Vacation Bible School has been scheduled for June 13-17 from 5:00-8:30 P.M. Martha encouraged Davey to present a list of needed donations for VBS so that it can be posted on the church's website.

Elders - Robert Morris

Worship services are going well and the church continues to welcome numerous visitors. Robert reported that 11 new members have been received since January 1; 3 members transferred or moved; and 7 deaths have been reported.

Parish Health Ministry - Mary Luecke

The board continues to contact those on the prayer list with recipients expressing much appreciation for the cards and thoughts. CPR/AED training was offered to Council members before this evening's meeting. We thank Mary and Chris for providing this essential training. The availability of wheelchairs on church property continues to be an issue with only one wheelchair now available in the narthex. The board has decided to purchase another universal wheelchair for church use only. Durable medical goods, including walkers, canes and crutches, are available and members may borrow with permission from the board. The church is in possession of a scooter. Chris Wright is presently reviewing the list of interested persons who may best benefit from borrowing this scooter. Mary inquired about an Elder liaison for their board. Robert Morris reported that this will be discussed at the next Elder's meeting on May 16.

Pastor Kuehn

Bible studies continue via Zoom on Wednesday evenings and between worship services on Sunday.

Pastor Leavitt

Pastor Leavitt presented details on future memorial services: Deborah Miller on Friday, May 20 at 2:00 P.M.; Dina Hink at Sarasota National Cemetery on Friday morning, May 20; and Carroll Bennett with a private service on Saturday, May 21. Pastor is happy to report that the church has been receiving numerous visitors. Visitors are appreciating the warmth and welcomeness by our members and the beautiful grounds. Bible study on the Book of Jeremiah was recently completed. A new Bible study, focusing on topics with a Biblical connection will begin on June 1. The installation of Hope Lutheran's new pastor, The Rev. James Krach, will take place on Saturday, June 11 with FL/GA District President Walton officiating. Hope has expressed much appreciation for Pastor Curt and his wife, Joyce, for graciously stepping in during their pastoral vacancy. Pastor Leavitt and President Bob Brzycki will be attending the District Convention in St. Augustine on June 16-18. The convention will acknowledge the termination of President Walton's term.

President's Report

Bob reported attending the recent Board of Stewardship meeting and will attend the Board of Elder's monthly meeting on May 16. With Vacation Bible School scheduled during the week of June 13, Council will need to meet on another date. Council members voted in favor of meeting on Thursday, June 9 at 7:00 P.M. in the Still Building Conference Room.

Motion: It was moved and seconded that the Church Council will meet on Thursday, June 9 at 7:00 P.M. to accommodate the scheduling of Vacation Bible School from June 13-17. All present voted in favor. The motion passed.

Old Business

Board of Elders discussion on financial assistance to members' families that have children attending Christian schools and the possibility of homeschooling on church property will be held at the next Elders' meeting on May 16. Council will discuss this issue at the next Council meeting on June 9.

Board of Stewardship has approved the establishment of the LCMS Endowment Investment Fund. Future details will be forthcoming.

Motion: It was moved and seconded to approve the establishment of the LCMS Endowment Investment Fund with the Board of Stewardship. All present voted in favor. The motion passed.

BSLC Emergency Response Guidelines will be reviewed again at June's Council meeting so that it may be officially posted on the church's website.

New Business

Bob Brzycki conducted the process of Council's review and approval of the revised Church Constitution and By-Laws. He thanked members of the committee who tirelessly worked on this endeavor as one of Vision 2025's goals: Chairperson Mike Murphy, Secretary Rebecca Reich Sammito, Dennis Bonneau, Jo Ross, Randy Thies, and Marian Murdoch. The revisions of the Constitution were approved by Council members. Much discussion took place on the revisions of the By-Laws. Some of the revisions will be tabled until Council meets in June. Upon complete approval from Council, Rebecca will electronically submit the entire revised document to the District during the week of July 4th. The District will review the entire document in August and upon their approval, the Constitution and By-Law revisions will be presented to church parishioners for their vote at the fall Voters' Assembly Meeting.

Elders will open and close the Church Council meeting on Thursday, June 9 at 7:00 P.M.

Davey closed the meeting with a prayer.

Motion: It was moved and seconded that the meeting be adjourned. All present voted in favor. The motion passed.

Meeting adjourned at 9:25 P.M.



Beautiful Savior Lutheran Church Emergency Response Guidelines

Unfortunately, emergencies occur everywhere, even in church. The Ushers, Elders, and Parish Health Ministry Team are usually the first responders to handle these situations and to call 911 as needed.

Try to remain calm. You can help the congregation maintain its service and prevent panic and alarm.

- If the person is unconscious, call for help immediately (911). Most have cell phones and there is also a telephone in the Fellowship Hall near the kitchen if needed. Stay on the call with the dispatcher until they have all of the information that they need.
- Check for breathing and pulse. If the person is not breathing and/or has no pulse, start CPR and have someone retrieve the AED (Automated External Defibrillator). If you are uncomfortable with giving mouth to mouth breaths, it is ok to do just the chest compressions. The AED is the machine that shocks the heart back to a normal rhythm. It is located in the Fellowship Hall near the kitchen. It will instruct you on what to do once it is turned on.
- If 911 is called, someone should go to the street entrance of the parking lot to flag down and direct the emergency responders to the doors nearest the patient's location.
- If the injured/ill person is responsive, keep them calm and comfortable. Obtain basic information (name, contact information, who to notify). The injured/ill person, if responsive, may not feel it necessary to call 911. Despite their objections, ALWAYS call 911 when in doubt. The dispatcher and emergency personnel will make the decision regarding treatment and transport.
- If the ill/injured person is being transported via ambulance and is alone, obtain the contact person's name and phone number so they can be informed of the situation.
- If the ill/injured person's injury is a minor "First Aid" treatment issue, encourage follow-up/contact with their Primary Care doctor.
- If the service is streamlined and the patient is in view of the recording camera, please try to move the person out of view of the recording or stop the recording.
- There are first aid kits in the Fellowship Hall and the administration building. Please remove them from the walls before opening them so the contents do not fall out.
- Complete an incident report, found in the yellow folder at the welcome desk in the narthex as soon as possible. Instructions for completing that form are in the folder as well.

There are 13 fire extinguishers:

Still Building:

One fire extinguisher located in the hallway, between the Pastors' offices,

Northside double exit doors

Westside double exit doors

Kitchen exit door

Church and Fellowship Hall:

There are fire extinguishers at every exit door.

Additionally, there is one fire extinguisher in the kitchen hanging on the east wall.

2nd story storage area:

One fire extinguisher is located at the top of the landing and around the corner to the left, hanging on the wall.

Youth Building:

Near west exit door

Fire Alarm Pull Boxes:

Still Building:

Located at all exits except for the two dining room doors.

Church & Fellowship Hall:

Located at every exit door in church and fellowship hall

Located in kitchen on east wall (next to sink) - prefer that that alarm is not used.

***| f a fire alarm sounds, evacuate. No one is permitted to reset a fire alarm except for the fire department.

Alarm Control Modules (2): These boxes can be used to summon police and emergency services.



We, though few in number, are busy cutting fabric for the quilt tops, sewing quilt tops, cutting backings for the quilts, assembling the 3 layers of the quilts together, finishing sewing the quilt edges, ironing fabric, etc.

These quilts are being made for Lutheran World Relief, and are picked up in February each year. We hope to make at least 83 quilts, which is the number of quilts we made last year.

We were very pleased to have Bert Bellhorn join us recently, and are looking forward to having her come again. Won't you come too?



I found this article over at CBN (Christian Broadcast Network) and thought it is a good read as we celebrate the 246 year of our country's existence.

How Founding Fathers Who Loved the God of Liberty & Their Freedom Built the Freest of Free Nations

PHILADELPHIA – As we celebrate Presidents Day, it's important to remember the first five commanders-in-chief were also all Founding Fathers of the nation. What you may not know is how crucial The Founders' faith was in America's beginning. And much of that beginning took place in Philadelphia.

In locations all around colonial Philadelphia, Founders who knew the God of Liberty fought to form a nation of liberty.



Touring around the sights, Lillback described how Bible beliefs backed each step the Founding Fathers took. Standing near a statue of George Washington, Lillback stated the first president personified this.



"Washington said we need to follow Christ or we're never going to succeed as a nation. That's not a minister. That's not a right-wing conservative fundamentalist. That's the father of our country!" Lillback exclaimed. He offered that it's significant and apropos that Washington's statue is located right outside Independence Hall since that's where the Founders declared the colonies' freedom and formed the fledgling country's constitution.

Washington led the army that fought for that freedom, then presided over the 1787 Constitutional Convention, and finally led the nation as its first chief executive. But he was always guided by his faith that he held so dear.

How to be a Happy Nation

Lillback explained of Washington, "He's the one who said, 'Unless we imitate the Divine Author of our blessed religion in terms of His charity, humility, and specific temperament of mind, we'll never be a happy nation."

In a world used to rule by monarchs, he almost singlehandedly broke Americans out of the habit of being subjects. "When he was called on to become king, he refused. Because he said, 'We're going to let the people decide," Lillback shared.

Followers of Christ the Carpenter Met in Carpenters Hall

But many years before that, leaders from the various colonies gathered for the first time and in Philadelphia in 1774 to figure out how to remove the oppressive grip Britain had wrapped around the colonies' collective neck. These colonial leaders were overwhelmingly of the Christian faith, following Jesus Christ, a carpenter. And interestingly enough, where they first met was called Carpenters' Hall.

They longed to unite against Britain but were divided by deep denominational differences and even regional customs. Like when Massachusetts' John Adams first encountered Washington, the Virginian.

Some Would Shake Hands, Some Would Bow

"They're all gathered together. They've never been in the same room, they're meeting each other for the first time. John Adams meets this big tall Virginian, George Washington. And they don't even know how to shake hands. John Adams comes up to shake his hand and George Washington steps back. Because Virginians don't shake hands. They give a bow," Lillback explained.



These men gathering in Carpenters' Hall were taking the actions that would someday give birth to America. Did it begin in rebellion? In bloodshed? It actually began in that hall with prayer.

Standing in front of Carpenters' Hall, Lillback stated, "This is where the first prayer for the country happens. But not without a debate. They debated the question could they even pray? Not because they didn't believe in prayer, but because all the different denominations believed that the others were wrong, and they couldn't fellowship with them," Lillback related.

The Spark Plug of the American Revolution said 'I'm no Bigot'

That's when one of the fieriest radicals against the British stepped into the breach and bridged the gap.

"This is the great accomplishment of Samuel Adams, called the spark plug of the American Revolution, who said, 'I'm no bigot. I can pray with any man who loves his God and loves his country'," Lillback said.

Adams called on this First Continental Congress to invite over local Anglican minister Jacob Duche to come and lead them in prayer. Adams was a Congregationalist. Not all that many years before, his people waged war against England's Anglicans and even beheaded the British king, head of the Anglican church.

They Prayed in Jesus' Name

But like Samuel Adams, Jacob Duche rose to the occasion, and soon arrived in Carpenters Hall.

"Leads in prayer and he does it in the name of Jesus Christ," Lillback shared. "So we can honestly say the United States was begun with a prayer meeting."

He went on, "I think it's a beautiful thing to realize that American colonialists found a way to come together, and they did it in the Gospel name of Christ, crossing denominational boundaries."

What these men accomplished, Lillback characterized as, "The spiritual and political first step of the First Continental Congress of the United States."

And Lillback said of Adams reaching out across the denominational aisle, "It was at that moment that Sam Adams created the American ecumenical spirit, where, in the public square, we can walk over our denominational boundaries."
