Discussion & Reflection Questions Epiphany 3B - 21st of January 2024

Reading: Mark 1.14-20

14 Now after John was arrested, Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God, 15 and saying, 'The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news.' 16 As Jesus passed along the Sea of Galilee, he saw Simon and his brother Andrew casting a net into the lake—for they were fishermen. 17 And Jesus said to them, 'Follow me and I will make you fish for people.' 18 And immediately they left their nets and followed him.
19 As he went a little farther, he saw James son of Zebedee and his brother John, who were in their boat mending the nets. 20 Immediately he called them; and they left their father Zebedee in the boat with the hired men, and followed him.

Discussion & Reflection Questions

- 1. Verse 15 contains the first words spoken by Jesus in Mark's gospel. What do you think are the significance of these words?
- 2. What do you think the Simon & Andrew would have thought Jesus meant by "Fish for people"? What do you think he means?
- 3. Fishing for people isn't an expression that we would use today that people would easily understand. How could you describe it in todays context & culture?
- 4. What does it mean to follow Jesus?
- 5. Jesus says he will "make" the disciples fish for people. How does Jesus "make" the disciples & is it as forceful as it first sounds?
- 6. The disciples who were fishermen continue to fish throughout the gospel story. How does God use who we are/were when we follow Jesus? What changes & what stays the same?
- 7. Fishing in Jesus time wasn't a solo activity. How can we follow together?
