

*Affirmation

God's sovereign love is a mystery beyond the reach of humankind's mind. Human thought ascribes to God superlatives of power, wisdom, and goodness. But God reveals God's love in Jesus Christ by showing power in the form of a servant, wisdom in the folly of the cross, and goodness in receiving sinful humans. The power of God's love in Christ to transform the world discloses that the Redeemer is the Lord and Creator who made all things to serve the purpose of God's love. God has created the world of space and time to be the sphere of God's dealings with humankind. In its beauty and vastness, sublimity and awfulness, order and disorder, the world reflects to the eye of faith the majesty and mystery of its Creator.

This hymn's modern text is based upon writings of medieval mystic and anchoress Julian of Norwich. The strong and loving nurture of the Trinity is evoked in a poem in which one syllable words carry great beauty and power, supported by a tune reaching higher with each phrase.

This anonymous song from Mexico is found in our hymnal at 822, but this English translation comes from the Iona Community. The first stanza affirms what Paul writes to the Romans: in life and and in death, we belong to God. (Translation © 2002 WGRG/GIA Publications, Inc.)

As we respond to God's Word and prepare to take it into the world, we say together each week what we believe in an affirmation of faith. As we draw from creeds and confessions from our shared history, let us listen carefully to the words we speak and invite them to guide our actions in the coming days.



This text comes from an eighteen-stanza hymn the author wrote to mark the first anniversary of his life-changing conversion experience. It is now customarily the first hymn in Methodist hymnals worldwide. This tune, adapted from a German composer, is the usual North American setting.

As the tune name hints, this text is derived from images in the writings of the English medieval mystic, Julian of Norwich. In 1393 she wrote down an account of her sixteen remarkable visions experienced twenty years earlier; they formed the basis of her theology of God's love.
