## For Small Group discussion \& application this week:

Based on your personal time reviewing Judges 4 \& 5 this week, what did God teach you?

Oftentimes taking a stand for Christ is risky or dangerous and takes courage. How have you shown courage as a follower of Jesus?

The world expects followers of Christ to be passive or indifferent. How have you taken a stand for truth? How have you also shown grace in these moments?

What did you take away from the message that you didn't get on your own?

## Looking ahead: February 19, spend time in Judges 4 \& 5 this week.

What will God teach you personally as you spend time in His word this week. Draw near to Him asking Him to reveal truth to you.

Chapter 4 gives us the historical narrative account of what took place after Ehud and chapter 5 is a song that Deborah the Judge sings because of the historical reality. Chapter 4 gives us the facts; chapter 5 gives us the theology. Chapter 4 as one author said, is the language of the historian, chapter 5 is the language of the poet. So, engineers will love chapter 4, artist will love chapter 5 . Spend time in both and listen to the voice of God as you do.

From what you see in Judges 4-5, what can you praise God for most? Make a personal investment of time and thought to speak with Him about this and honor Him.

As you read Deborah's song in chapter 5, what further perspectives do we gain:

- regarding the battle?
- regarding Israel's circumstances prior to the battle?
- about the participation of Israel's tribes in the battle?
- see in the requests made in the song's final two lines?
