

ABOUT TODAY'S WORSHIP



As the letter of Hebrews concludes, the author shares final instructions regarding godly living.


¹Let brotherly love continue. ²Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for thereby some have entertained angels unawares. 3Remember those who are in prison, as though in prison with them, and those who are mistreated, since you also are in the body. 4Let marriage be held in honor among all, and let the marriage bed be undefiled, for God will judge the sexually immoral and adulterous. ⁵Keep your life free from love of money, and be content with what you have, for he has said, "I will never leave you nor forsake you." 6So we can confidently say, "The Lord is my helper; I will not fear; what can man do to me?" ⁷Remember your leaders, those who spoke to you the word of God. Consider the outcome of their way of life, and imitate their faith. 8Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever. ⁹Do not be led away by diverse and strange teachings, for it is good for the heart to be strengthened by grace, not by foods, which have not benefited



Then you will be honored in the presence of all who sit at table with you. ¹¹For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted." ¹²He said also to the man who had invited him, "When you give a dinner or a banquet, do not invite your friends or your brothers or your relatives or rich neighbors, lest they also invite you in return and you be repaid. 13But when you give a feast, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind, ¹⁴ and you will be blessed, because they cannot repay you. You will be repaid at the resurrection of the just."

COLLECT FOR GRACE



I am always strengthened by the words of the apostle Paul. I was reading a devotion vesterday that talked about how Paul signed his letters when he was imprisoned. He never signed them, "prisoner of Festus," or "prisoner of Caesar," or "victim of the Sanhedrin," but instead "a prisoner for the Lord." (Look at Ephesians 3 & 4). I would think that solitary confinement would have to be one of the worst things imaginable, yet Paul wrote some of his most beautiful words from behind bars. I do believe that it is because Paul focused on something outside of himself. He focused on his Heavenly Father, and because of the trials he endured, he was able to strengthen others. The trials we go through here on earth that strain us to our breaking point are the strands that strengthen and ground us in something outside of ourselves. These experiences allow us to come alongside others and be encouragers, pointing to something beyond the prison walls...the hope and promises that are found in Jesus Christ alone. When trails come your way, run into the arms of your Savior, ground yourself in His truth, pray for provision, peace, God's abundance, and strength to take the next step. "Now to him who is able to do far more abundantly than all that we ask or think, according to the power at work within us, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, forever and ever. Amen." Ephesians 3:20
