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1. The Kingdom Is of Supreme Value

Scriptures:

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The Kingdom is worth more than possessions, status, comfort, reputation, and personal ambition.

When Christ and His reign are truly seen, everything else becomes secondary.

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Scriptures:

Matthew 13:44;

Matthew 13:11; 1

Corinthians 2:10–14

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The treasure was hidden in a field, showing that the Kingdom may be present and still unrecognized by many.

Spiritual value must be revealed by God and discerned by the Holy Spirit.

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3. The Kingdom Requires a Response

Scriptures:

Mark 1:15; Acts 3:19

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The treasure was discovered, and the pearl was found, but both men had to respond.

The Kingdom comes by God's initiative, yet it calls people to repent, believe, turn to God, and follow Jesus.

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4. The Kingdom Produces Joyful Surrender

Scriptures:

Hebrews 12:2; Acts 16:34

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The man sold all that he had “for joy,” because the treasure was greater than the cost.

True Kingdom surrender is joyful because Christ is worth more than what is left behind.

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5. The Kingdom Demands Total Allegiance

Scriptures: Luke 14:26–33;
Matthew 6:24;
2 Corinthians 5:15

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The men sold all they had, showing that the Kingdom cannot be added to a life still ruled by self.

Jesus calls for full allegiance, where every area of life comes under His Lordship.

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6. The Kingdom Reorders Priorities

Scriptures: Matthew 6:33;
Colossians 3:1–4;
Mark 8:34–37

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When the Kingdom becomes first,
everything else is brought under God's
order.

Earthly gain, comfort, and personal
control become secondary to the
reign of Christ.


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7. The Kingdom Calls for Enduring Faithfulness

True faith continues in surrender, obedience, and endurance until the fullness of the Kingdom is revealed.

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
