### From the Pastor: Who is the *God With US*?

Growing up in the Anglican Church, I must admit that I knew very little about the Holy Spirit. I probably would have remembered the dove at Jesus' baptism, and I probably thought it was the same dove in the *Noah's Ark* story (they relate, but they are different). My parents are both ministers, so I could also have told you all the overly simplified analogies which people use to describe the Trinity as '3 in 1': water as liquid, solid, or gas; the sun as heat, light, and radiation; the three-leaf clover. All these images fail to express the reality that God is wholly one and yet is also three persons in the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit at the same time. A beautiful mystery; our God is a loving community unto himself.

One of the ways I began to connect with the Holy Spirit was through his representations or characteristics. These are not perfect representations, but they speak to us about the reality of the Holy Spirit. I already mentioned the dove: this beautiful symbol of blessing and peace that hovers in the sky and shows such freedom and life. Then there is the air: the wind that refreshes on a hot day, the wind that carries the rain and the seed across the world, the air that we breathe out as we speak, or the breath that fills our lungs and gives us life. Take a moment now to purposefully breathe in and out so that you, too, become in tune with the life-giving reality of God's breath.

I remember also as a child receiving a set of chimes. While giving them to me, my godparents said, "You may not be able to see God, but at least now you can hear Him." I have loved chimes ever since and they constantly remind me of God's presence.

There are many other ways to ponder and experience God's presence in the Holy Spirit. You might think of the burning bush, the pillar of fire, or the tongues of fire. You might experience God through the warmth and light of a fire. Or you might watch the smoke as it rises to the sky and carries our prayers. Or you might look at an empty chair and recognize that He is there. Or you might experience the love of family, friends, or a stranger. Whatever you do, recognize that our powerful God, the Creator of everything, is with you in the Holy Spirit. He is connecting us and he is empowering us to share His love with the world.

# The Bridegroom Cometh: The Music of Judee Sill

In the 1960s hippie counterculture exploded in California. Millions of young people, disillusioned with the repressive culture of post-war America, sought alternative methods of living through community, music, drugs and spirituality. It was in this potent cocktail of California life that Judee Sill (1944-1979) came of age. The product of a dysfunctional household – her parents were alcoholics, and her stepfather was particularly cruel and abusive – Judee sought escape through rebellious behaviour and drug use. By the time she was 20, she had an annulled marriage behind her after impulsively marrying her boyfriend, and was shipped off to reform school. It was here that Judee led the school choir, playing Baptist hymns on the organ, and developed an appreciation for Bach that would remain the rest of her life.

After leaving the school, Judee entered the blues and jazz scene and developed a \$150-a-day heroin habit that she maintained through theft and prostitution. However, it was in this sordid part of her life that Judee had her breakthrough into the music industry, after writing a hit song in 1969 for The Turtles, Lady O. This generated interest in Judee's own solo career, and she was eventually signed by David Geffen's newly established music label, Asylum Records. At this time in California singer-songwriters were a dime a dozen, but Judee stuck out from the rest, for better or for worse. Shy, introverted and with a sharp tongue, she was unable to capture audiences with her presence like Joni Mitchell or other female songwriters in the California folk scene. Then there was the nature of Judee's songs, which she performed either on the guitar or piano – mystical, metaphorical, and with an almost classical sensitivity, all wrapped up in the California twang of Judee's voice. Her lyrics are full of spiritual symbols and metaphors: angels, demons, lambs, roses and crucifixes. At the centre of it all is a man and lover, who will arrive on horseback to rescue Judee from her own troubled life, a "cowboy Christ." This figure, present in dozens of Judee's songs, remains a shadowy presence throughout Judee's brief music career.

When I was stranded at the crossroads it was dismal and grey, And when I asked him for directions he showed me the good way, And if the sky is swirlin' still his pace never swerves Because his heart is always faithful, reachin' higher Because his heart is always faithful to the captain he serves.<sup>1</sup>

Despite the romanticism of it all, Judee's music remained distant from earthly ways and distinctly focused on a heavenly desire to transcend and connect with God. Even when Judee seems to approach the intimate in songs like **The Kiss**, we receive the impression that she is not singing about romantic love:

Love, rising from the mists
Promise me this and only this,
Holy breath touching me, like a wind song
Sweet communion of a kiss<sup>2</sup>

Before performing this song live in 1973, Judee explains that the kiss is "a symbol of the union of opposites." The unification of lovers, or is Judee talking about something more profound, the unification of the eternal and mortal, in the incarnation of the Son of Man? Judee closes her second and final album, **Heart Food** (1973), with her most complex and perhaps overtly spiritual song, the invocatory **The Donor**.

"I thought I would take a different approach when I wrote this song, in that most of my songs, I try to write 'em to make people feel better, or make 'em feel that their warm human spirit is affirmed [...] Well, maybe I thought I'd take a different approach, and write a song, that would somehow musical induce God into giving us all a break[...] Since that time I decided that I shouldn't get any more breaks, because I already squandered them in weird places."<sup>3</sup>

And shortly after, that was it. **Heart Food** failed to sell, and Judee became disillusioned with the music industry. She was dropped by David Geffen's label and resumed her drug habit. She attempted to record another album in 1974, but it remained unfinished at her death in 1979 from a deadly cocaine and heroin overdose. Her work remained obscure for decades until a revival of interest in the 2000s. From Judee's spiritual interests and pursuits, it was clear that she was a seeker rather than a believer. Like many of her California hippie peers, Judee pursued a patchwork spirituality of gnostic, occult and Hindu beliefs. Despite this, it is still tempting to put Judee in a long tradition of Christian female mystics, writing about Christ as a Saviour and chaste lover. Christ fulfils the longing of the heart as well as the soul. These metaphors might seem icky to the sterilized sensibilities of 21st-century Protestantism, but these depictions are as old as Christianity itself. After all, in Ephesians, Saint Paul compares the union of husband and wife to that of Christ and the church. In the same way that Judee Sill was viewing Christ through a veil – seeing the truth only partially through a blur of drugs and pretension – we also simply fail to accept our own longing to be united in Christ because of the stumbling blocks we place in front of our own path. Maybe Sill's redemption occurs because she allows us to see Christ in all good things, in her beautiful music that illuminates the darkness of her life.

### Tenebrae Service: Available on YouTube

The Tenebrae service teaches us that the darkest hour is just before the dawn. Readings and anthems during the service are about lamenting, destruction, darkness and God's abandonment, all experiences Jesus Christ lived through during His time on earth.

As the service proceeds, candles are extinguished, until only one light remains: the Christ Candle. Even this light is eventually taken out of sight into the sacristy, to symbolize Christ in the tomb. Then a loud noise is heard – the Strepitus – representing the earthquake after Jesus' death, followed by the reappearance of the Christ candle, which leads us out to the world.

This service also features a setting of the Lenten hymn, *Stabat Mater*, composed by our organist and music director Tyler Versluis. This hymn, written in the 13th century, is most often heard at processions during Stations of the Cross or in Lenten concerts, of which musical settings by Pergolesi, Vivaldi, Poulenc, and Charpentier are the most popular.

The hymn invites us to share in the sorrow of Mary, Mother of God, as she witnesses her Son being accused, tortured, and eventually killed by His enemies. The *Stabat Mater* remains popular in Christian spheres, possibly due to its relatability, as young men die in war leaving many mothers, wives, and grandmothers to weep in despair. As war once again erupts in eastern Europe, the bitterness of this reality is once again present.

# Beyond Soup

St. Matthew's supported the Toronto Urban Native Ministry (TUNM) program with the 'Soup's On' program. The program provided meals to this community on a weekly basis for more than a year during COVID. Many parishioners participated in the chopping and cooking of soups, casseroles, stews, and salads depending on the time of year. From this experience, we recognized we were not only filling a need for the homeless but also the need for fellowship within the parish. The weekly event gave us opportunity to maintain relationships and to build new ones. It was hoped that we could continue with this fellowship building.

We will be starting a new program in September to support others in need. The need may be from a parishioner or non-parishioner. Our goal is to provide a meal when someone is in need... financially, emotionally, spiritually. This gift of hospitality is meant to let the recipient know they are being thought of and that we pray this gesture will help them in some way. The recipient may be a family member, neighbour, stranger, or friend. They may have had an illness, a death in the family, just need a pick me up, or need a meal to help until pay day arrives. The gift may be a container of soup, a meal for a family of six, or anything in between. It is based on their needs, not ours.

Anyone who has a need or is aware of a need may contact the church office (416-231-4014) or Deborah Hurn (905-625-7848) to provide the necessary food to anyone. The meal will be ready for pick up at the Hurn's or an alternative arrangement may be made.


### Audio-Visual Fundraiser

The Warden Team

As most parishioners are aware, there have been ongoing technical issues for audio and visual transmission during both online and inperson worship services. Interference with other transmission signals has resulted in poor sound quality, coupled with microphone problems and old wiring issues. After a very expensive proposal from an AV company, we consulted with Long and McQuade Pro and are able to source most of the equipment upgrades through them at significantly less expense. We require \$30,000 to fund this project.

Due to backlogs in shipping and delivery, the equipment will likely not be available until mid-summer.

Our team is very thankful for the generous donations made to date for our upgrades and at the time of writing this message, we are nearly 66% of the way to our goal with \$19,627 in a designated account. # Discipleship at St Matthew's: Being Followers of Jesus

Many groups and activities at St. Matthew's provide support for us as adults to keep to our call to be followers of Jesus. Some of those opportunities for adults to grow in faith and to support sharing faith within St. Matthew's community, in our families, and in our neighbourhoods are described here.

The first is an account of the activities of the diocesan Bishop's Committee on Discipleship provided by Deborah Hurn.

In June 2020, I was invited to join a group of Clergy and Laity. I became a member of the *Bishop's Committee on Discipleship* formed by Bishop Asbil and chaired by Rev. Stephen Vail, Dean of St. James Cathedral, with a three-pronged approach of focus: evangelism (bringing in people), catechesis (engaging people), and formation. Bishop Asbil expressed his hope that this group would become a community of prayer and that we would build relationships with others, with each other, and with Jesus. Bishop Asbil emphasized the importance of building community. He suggested ensuring that we cultivate a toolbox, not for emergencies, but instead for focus on answering the question, "How does this help the kingdom of God?" Bishop Asbil quoted Bishop Michael Curry, "So many people see our baptismal vows as less of a mandate and more of a buffet." Bishop Asbil asserted that within the mixed economy of crowds to whom Jesus preached there are similarities to our modern congregations. We also needed to look at people who have lost their faith. A key question for the group to consider was whether the work we are doing is worthy of our call to be followers of Jesus Christ.

For the past two years we have been pulling documents, discussing concepts, and listening to each other. Now that the Committee is near the end of its mandate, and I am wondering about St. Matthew's. Is St. Matthew's a community where prayer, building relationships, and being followers of Jesus is what we value and is the road we are on? Is it more than just caring for an hour or two on Sunday morning? It is about caring for each other in programs like Soup's On, Beyond Soup, Christmas Gifts for Friends for Friends, the Card Ministry, Messy Church, Coffee Hour, Pastoral Care and the Welcoming Ministry team, etc. Are we a community of evangelism? What do we do to bring people in? Since the 'reopening post-COVID' we have seen new members join each week. We have watched parishioners bring in family, neighbours, and friends who are in need of our care and compassion. We are engaging long-standing members and new folks alike. Each spiritual journey is unique but something new is happening at St. Matt's. When we assess ourselves, are we worthy of calling ourselves followers of Jesus? Yes, I think we strive hard to be followers of Christ. Whether we know it or not, we are living a life of discipleship in the love of each other, the love of community, and the love of Jesus Christ. As a community, we have been building a Parish that truly walks the talk in Sharing Jesus' Love. I pray this will continue and that we are worthy of seeing ourselves as followers of Jesus Christ. ~Deborah Hurn

# Discipleship at St Matthew's: Being Followers of Jesus

### **Inclusion Group**

As you know, the Inclusion Working Group was never supposed to be an 'event planning group.' Instead, it was meant to be a launch pad for further involvement and ideas from the congregation as a whole. At this point the Inclusion Group is stepping back in hopes that you will step forward to offer ideas, lead a discussion, suggest book studies, or propose other initiatives that fill your heart in this work against racism and for the inclusion of all.

From the topics which were identified by the Inclusion Working Group, one theme will be pursued in the Fall: *Reconciliation*. Because 'reconciliation' is required in so many of our ongoing relationships, we will begin with at least one discussion forum in late September which may well develop into further sessions. We look forward to a healthy discussion by starting to look at examples throughout scripture.

One aspect of Inclusion that St. Matthew's has been working at for some time is our relationship with Indigenous people. The St. Matthew's Indigenous Issues Group (SMIIG) began seven years ago. Nancy Hurn has provided a review of SMIIG activities below.

The St. Matthew's Indigenous Issues Group was formed in 2015 in response to the Diocese of Toronto's Motion to Vestry that all Parishes learn more about the First Nations, Inuit and Métis people of Canada. A motion was also made to encourage parishes to understand the impact the Anglican Church had on the indigenous people during its operation of Residential Schools beginning in 1820. SMIIG held monthly meetings until the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic. Many projects have been undertaken by this group since its inception.

### Summary of SMIIG Activities:

- Support for the Clinic and Community of White Dog, Ontario, sending baby blankets and toques for newborn babies
- Christmas gifts to Toronto Urban Native Ministry (TUNM) several years
- Clothing and coat drives in support of TUNM several years
- Kairos Blanket Exercise to provide a deeper understanding twice
- Talking Circle about personal indigenous experience led by Rev. Andrew and Esther Wesley
- Attended the movie, *Indian Horse*
- Attended the Premiere of the Anglican Video, *Doctrine of Discovery: Stolen Lands, Strong Hearts*
- Hosted Kairos event to acknowledge work by Anglican Church of Canada (ACC) on the Truth and Reconciliation Commission
- Discussing and implementing a project with the Kingsley School
- Outreach financial support and Coat Drive to the Anglican Church of the Ascension in Inuvik, NWT
- Creating, collecting, knitting and sending baby blankets, warm hats, mitts and prayer shawls
- Visit by three Inuit women from Kugluktuk (Coppermine), NU who showed us how to light a fire with oil, how to use an Ulu to cut meat
- Visit by Bishop Chris Harper from Diocese of Toronto Indigenous Ministries



# Discipleship at St Matthew's: Being Followers of Jesus

- Visit by Melanie Delva, Animator for Indigenous Ministries for the Anglican Church of Canada and we received an update on the Calls to Action established by the Truth and Reconciliation Commission in Canada
- Soup's On Program in support of the Holy Trinity Unity Kitchen/TUNM as COVID began
- Celebration of Indigenous Sunday (June 21) each year
- Visits by Archbishop Mark MacDonald, National Indigenous Anglican Bishop in person and online
- Online visit by Rev. Leigh Kerns and Zach Grant, co-ordinators of the Holy Trinity Unity Kitchen, expressing appreciation for *Soup's On*
- Support for the Indigenous water projects at Big Beaver House in Mishamikoweesh, the Indigenous Anglican Diocese in north-western Ontario and northern Manitoba
- Acknowledgment of the discovery of the unmarked children's graves at the Catholic residential school in Kamloops, BC. A collection of children's shoes was placed on the front steps and an Orange Shirt painting was created by Sandra Wilson and placed on permanent display in the Narthex recognizing that "Every Child Matters."

At each meeting many topics were discussed, and we often had indigenous people come and share information about the healing and resilience of the people who have occupied the land of Canada for more than 10,000 years. Now that we are open to having in-person meetings in the church, it is important that we look for ways to continue our understanding of the colonization of the indigenous people and communities in Canada and around the world.

In September we will continue to explore ways to be in reconciliation with Indigenous people and to build our relationship. The Anglican Church of Canada film, "Doctrine of Discovery: Stolen Lands, Strong Hearts" will be shown at St. Matthew's. That will be followed by one or more discussion opportunities to explore our calling to reconciliation.

### Future potential projects include:

- 1. Arrange monthly meetings for SMIIG Members.
- 2. Arrange Mapping exercise offered by PWRDF.
- 3. Assist Clergy in planning the Indigenous Sunday Service (June 21).
- 4. Consider joint events with other churches on this topic.
- 5. Participate in Indigenous working group (ISWG) and Indigenous Justice Coalition.
- 6. Visit and tour to Mohawk Institute and Chapel in Brantford, ON.
- 7. Presentation on Indigenous Racism to help understand the personal and systemic concerns.
- 8. Many more group opportunities to see plays, speakers, walks, etc. to support this work.
