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From the Pastor

Doesn't it often feel like the length of time between Christmas and Lent is very short? After basking in the hope and love of this newly born Christ child, we are suddenly faced with 40 days of struggle so that we might become something more. In parenting I now face a similar reality. It's like tightrope-walking between joy/elation and adjustment: while juggling and figuring out where my parenting must improve, I am learning that there is still more I must do for this joy and potential to become established.

This tension between a new hope and the need to change becomes more natural for me as I experience their convergence. New hope and life are great, but we must be open, ready, and reformed enough to receive them, let alone to live in this new reality. Just like the Israelites who escaped from slavery in Egypt, it doesn't matter whether God provides everything we need or brings us into a new land. If we continue to live the way we did before (in Egypt or without a baby) or even to desire the old ways, then we never really left – the new hope doesn't live in us yet.

God wants to help us live in this new life and love. That is the reason the Easter season lasts so long, followed by Pentecost, which stretches into months of regular time; God wants us to rest in hope, to live it out, and to know it throughout our days – not to have it end. We are not just Christmas people, where hope and life were born among us. We are meant to be Easter people, where we have died to the old life and been reborn into a life of hope intertwined with the very life of God.

That is why Lent is so important. For 40 days plus Sundays, we relive the 40 days of the flood that Noah and his family endured in the ark, we relive the 40 years in the desert which Israel spent on the way to the Promised Land, and we experience the 40 days during which Jesus was tempted in the desert. In each case, these 40 days/years mark a purification or preparation for the ministry and hope that follows. For Noah, he was meant to begin a whole new changed humanity; for Israel; they were meant to live in and create a land of bounty, not unlike the Garden; for Jesus, he would change people's hearts and so change humanity and the world forever.

What could these 40 days of Lent mean for you? What kind of life is God trying to lead you into?

What must die, or be put aside, so that this new hope might live in you? It is not an easy question, because it is about so much more than just fasting. God is trying to create a changed world, a changed humanity, and it starts with your heart.

Be thoughtful about this. Be prayerful and discern with God what the next step is in your journey. Be particular about what you do, because our faith is not just thoughts. Our faith is words and actions, too; it is lived out and it is meant to be a part of our whole being.

This Lent, our sermons will lead us through a series called "Escape for Your Life," where we look closely at the first few chapters of Exodus when God, through Moses, leads Israel out of slavery in Egypt. This is a message not just about God's saving work then, but also about his saving work now. It is meant to show us what he wants to save us from and bring us into. You might think you know the story, but there is so much more than what I heard in Sunday School (though we have some superb teachers).

Our short Lenten Bible Study will be about the next step: What Do We Escape Into? We will spend four weeks on the first half of the Beatitudes (in a study by John Stott). These short little phrases which Jesus speaks at the start of the Sermon on the Mount attempt to shape our hearts and minds to both be and experience God's blessings.

I hope you will use both the Sermon series and the Bible Study in your journey towards a renewed life. May this be for each and every one of you a Holy Lent where you grow in your closeness with God, so that His resurrected hope may live in you.

In the past few months, our food cupboard has been operating in a very limited way. We currently have few clients asking for food, but those that do come regularly, and we want to be able to help.

The Food Cupboard stocks small amounts of many items: soups, stews, pasta sauce, peanut butter, canned meat, small cereal packs, canned vegetables and fruit, and Kraft Dinner. We don't need large amounts but like to have a stock of everything. We are currently well stocked with dry pasta, beans, soap, and toothbrushes.

Your donations of any amount are appreciated. If we have surplus or if stock will not be used before its Best Before Date, we are taking it to St. James United Church, which manages a large "Food Basket" operation. We will continue to collect your donations, and put them to the best use as we help provide for those struggling with food insecurity in our area.

Being Open and Being Christlike

In his book *The Church Impotent: The Feminization of Christianity*, polemicist Leon J. Podles argues (rather haphazardly) that the modern church has grown to largely appeal to the sensibilities, needs, and spiritual desires of women while ignoring the same from men. According to Podles, this manifests not only in the programs and services offered by churches and the clergy, but is also inherent in the music and liturgy itself.

There is some basis for what Podles is arguing. According to a Pew Research study on gender and religion, women are generally more religious than men, spanning across cultures, religions, and age -groups. 64% of American women say they pray daily, a large difference from American men at 47%. Podles writes that there is something about church that turns men away, and that this problem is not new. In the days of the early American colonies, a group of men lodged complaints against their local priest, claiming he was stealing away women from their community, and that he was a largely useless addition to the colony as he was unable to perform hard physical labour. In the 19th century, Friedrich Nietszche argued that Christianity itself was largely anti-masculine as it stressed weakness, submission, and empathy. According to Podles, songs of devotion to Jesus, and consistent metaphors of the Church being the "bride of Christ" also seem to repel men, whether overtly or subliminally.

While I won't claim to be a defendant of Podles' or Nietszche's criticisms of modern Christianity, it is a good reminder that the Church is for all believers, regardless of gender, age, stature, or race. No doubt in the Anglican denomination we struggle with this reality, as our rootedness in "Englishness" and our elite position in Canadian history holds us back from welcoming people outside our quaint bubble. While polarized sides are much more eager to "one-up" each other rather than pursue a balanced view of reality, I am reminded more often that the Church seems to be the only truly universal organization left on Earth, and yes, the one I place the most hope in.

"The trouble with having an open mind, of course, is that people will insist on coming along and trying to put things in it." Terry Pratchett, author

I am also reminded that being universal and embracing "openness" does not necessarily mean wearing away our traditions or hiding the more daring truths that Christianity has to offer under the rug. Rather, openness is making sure that we are good disciples, and not building up structures, programs, and liturgies that seek to please a closed-off community, content to exist in a feedback loop of their own satisfaction. Surely Jesus Christ showed us how we are to do this. The only problem is our own lack of obedience.

We're Collecting Again!

Over the years we have collected various items to support local charities. At the Welcome Ministry/Pastoral Care Team meeting, we were remembering items that we dropped into boxes at church! We have resumed collecting the following:

Stamps: Oxfam collects used postage stamps to raise funds for the *Stamp Out Poverty* program, with a focus on the needs of women and girls. Save foreign, Canadian, and commemorative stamps. Please save the entire envelope if there are clearly identifiable town/village postmarks or registered/special delivery postmarks.

Eyeglasses: The Lions Club of Canada will collect and donate eyewear free of charge to people in developing countries. They accept prescription and sunglasses.

Milk bags: The outer plastic bag from your three bags of milk can be made into sleeping mats! MILKBAGSunlimited collects the bags to weave mats, purses, shoes etc. The bags cannot disintegrate in landfills. They will become a mattress for people who have nothing but bare earth or cardboard to sleep on.

Pop can tabs: have long been collected by many people. A little research found it to be true...they can be turned into wheelchairs! March of Dimes Canada collects aluminum pop tabs year-round, and the recycling of these tabs generates revenue that benefit their Assistive Devices Program that helps buy, repair and maintain a wide variety of mobility or assistive equipment including wheelchairs.


