FROM THE RECTOR: MIGHTY IN ALL THINGS

This is a precis of a larger article which can be viewed on the St. Matthew's Website Blog

Every Sunday we say the Creed, a series of statements that convey the core of what we, as Christians, believe to be true. The Apostles' creed arose as a natural outpouring of what the disciples had learned as they met and followed Jesus Christ. The Creed begins with a simple and straightforward line, but in it we find the gospel, our hope and our way forward: "I believe in God, the Father Almighty."

"I believe." The creed may be about God and what he has done, but it actually starts with us. We have an essential part to play in this relationship. The early disciples understood that we need to be living and acting on that belief. God doesn't want just anyone, he wants you.

In its traditional form the creed starts with "I," although there are many ancient Christian Creeds that use "We". Both are important. First in importance is our personal relationship with God; if we don't have a personal relationship then we can't have a communal one. The community is also essential; we confess this together. We hold onto it together, we lift up each other in this reality, we experience it together and the Creed takes on flesh in our midst.

"I believe." Our belief is not something which lacks proof. The simple fact that we say "I believe" or "We believe" states that I or we have experienced something that led us to this belief. Indeed, our beliefs have a lot of proof, because we attempt to incorporate all avenues which lead us to truth—science, feeling, history, community, goodness, hope, love, and more.

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Mighty in All Things (continued)

This proof may confuse us though, because Christian belief is actually more about a relationship than a set of ideas. The relationship we have built with God is such that we know he is trustworthy, that he is good, and that he can do what is needed and more.

"In God." This is the hardest part to define on its own and is dealt with later in the creed. It is important to realize that this God we are talking about has an identity which is particular, (unique, distinct, specific) and can be known. There have been many gods throughout the ages. Most were gods of certain things, but our God is different and his difference changes how we understand everything.

"I believe in God," defines our primary belief. We say this before we say anything, which tells others that this is our fundamental belief. We don't believe in ourselves first, we know we fall short, even our perception falls short. We don't believe in the things of this world first, not even science, or worldviews or culture, governments, family, etc. because again they fall short. We trust God first, as he is the one that never falls short.

"The Father." This tells us something profound about God. At its simplest it tells us that God wants us to look at him as a father and we should see that he wants us to be his children. Already, this tells us something amazing. The God that is beyond and greater than us wants to be close with us, even intimate, like a parent and child. This is an immense and beautiful invitation. Just as a parent grandly determines what a child's life will look like, only imagine what our lives could be with such a great father.

"The Father." The Father, the pinnacle of fathers, the capital "F" father, with traits perfected from the beginning of time. Think about the authority, the strength, the wisdom, the joy, the wonder, but also the love, the care, the guiding arm, the protection and embrace.

A small note on the gender of Father. We know that God in a sense does not have a gender, yet he purposefully revealed himself as Father on numerous

occasions. He also became a male in Jesus Christ. We could excuse this by saying that this was during a patriarchal time, but I think that is limiting God. I need to do more prayer on the shape of God's Fatherhood, but I think on the surface this speaks to our experience of God as close and yet beyond us. This also poses a difficult struggle for all those with bad fathers, because it is harder to connect with God, the Father, when we don't have a good earthly example.

"Almighty." Or mighty in all things. What does it mean to be mighty in all things? Can he be mighty in the contradictory things? You would almost always say that strength is where you would find might. Yet God, the Father, is also the mightiest at showing weakness because he is able to stoop down without belittling himself. He shows his might over evil by redeeming it for good.

In seven words, we have seen so much. In "I believe" we can see our purpose, our foundation, our relationship. "In God" we can see our direction, our faith and trust, and we see our need. In "The Father," we have seen the care, intimacy, authority, character, desire and purpose of our God. In "Almighty," we have seen who God is and who he isn't. We have seen how we are meant to relate to him and how we have fallen short. And so we hear the gospel that we are called to live in: God created us for a loving and intimate relationship with him, yet because we can't always see it (our brokenness), we have to take a leap of trust in the one that has shown himself trustworthy in love and might and since he is both loving (having the desire to) and mighty (having the power to), we know that he is going to create for us a place abounding in everything that is good. I believe in God, the Father Almighty. AMEN

We haven't looked at Jesus Christ or the Holy Spirit, but these seven words should point us to the realities of both.

Are You in the Right Church?

For many of you reading this, your answer is probably "yes", because you go to St. Matthew's, which is a very good church.

If you are a regular person, you probably chose to come to St. Matthew's because it is a place where you feel God's presence and you are being nurtured spiritually, and not because you scrutinized every line of the canons of doctrine of the Anglican Church of Canada and declared it personally to be the one true church founded by Jesus Christ and the Apostles. Funnily enough, there are plenty of people who fall into the latter category, and their rhetoric and reflections crowd theological spaces online and in books.

The funny thing is you won't find many Anglicans among these people. For example, I can name several people personally who will zealously defend Catholic, Orthodox, and Reformed theological doctrine, but I really do not know anyone who would do the same for Anglican theology and doctrine. The Anglican Church has a reputation of being soft and squishy on a lot of things. Our favourite answers to theological questions are "Yes, but..." and "Yes, and...". This is both fascinating and frustrating from someone like me who was raised Reformed, a theological tradition that for better or worse, loves to put its foot down, often on somebody else's foot.

Regardless of what you think about the Anglican Church of Canada, we confess in the Nicene Creed that we believe and adhere to the holy catholic and apostolic church, even though it may seem that its holiness and catholicity are scattered amongst denominations and even in individual parishes. I often feel that no denomination or church gets it right, and at best we can attend a parish church that provides us

with the least number of roadblocks on that path of holiness that Jesus Christ aspires us to adhere to. So, I am deeply thankful for St. Matthew's. But what about Anglicanism?

Although we may not know and appreciate it, the Anglican tradition has become a meeting place for the future of Christianity in the Western hemisphere; its softness and squishiness mean it yields well in our increasingly post-liberal, post-denominational world, a world that is currently suffering from growing pains. It is a church both of innovation and of Tradition, a haven for evangelicals feeling the rootlessness of their denominations, and for Catholics struggling with ecclesiological conundrums and trust issues in church leadership and magisterium.

However, we also have problems. The Anglican church risks dissolving with other theologically liberal denominations in a sea of subjectivity, mainly due to church leadership who believe Jesus to be nothing but radical cultural practice, and who risk pulling our denomination away from that holiness and catholicity that the Creed requires from us. The Anglican path was built on holiness and a respect for balance, and I am thankful that St. Matthew's lives out that holiness in mission, worship, and prayer. Being part of a good church—and denomination—means that we no longer need hold on to replacement doctrines, because it funnels our reason towards the truth of Jesus Christ. We unfortunately witness the horror of these replacement doctrines daily.

Pray to God that He guides us as we mediate between the realness and grittiness of parish church life and the ideals of truth and oneness in faith.

The property team is pleased to share several "good news" items with the Parish:



The work has been completed by their contractor and includes many new improvements for the church, including new washrooms, double glazed windows, fresh painting of various rooms. Costs of the renovation were paid by the school.

Many parishioners volunteered to assist in the cleaning and clearing of rooms and materials prior to the renovation and we sincerely thank all of them for this work.

Most importantly, the Parish owes a huge thank you to Karen Lee who acted as the project manager for this renovation. Her tireless work as the liaison between the school, their contractor, subtrades, and other tenants is greatly appreciated. This renovated space is a tremendous upgrade for our church.

Greentak Premier Signs updated our digital sign because pixels to display our messages needed replacing. They also facilitated the new school sign for Newton's Grove School.

Thank you to Tom Travaglini, our sexton, for his overall maintenance of our building during a very hectic and hot summer, and particularly for waxing the gym floors to a brilliant shine for another year of activity.





As outlined in our Pentecost issue of *Matt's Media*, we did have several very expensive repairs required during this past winter and spring for our roof and fire monitoring system. The M & M Fundraising effort which was celebrated with treats of candy M&M's on Sunday, August 31st, was most successful. We have to date received \$24,000 for which the Wardens are most grateful. Thank you to all individuals who have contributed to this effort.

The control panel and circuit boards are to be replaced shortly by Siemens, as we needed the school renovations to be completed first.

A couple of other jobs are pending, including a service call from Precision Elevators to replace a part for our elevator and Versatech (our boiler service company) will have to repair valves to increase the hot water temperature in our system.

Just as in any personal property, the church building and rectory are older structures which require ongoing maintenance and upgrades to keep them in good condition. We try to take a proactive approach in safeguarding the premises to the best of our ability.

Book Review: Help is Here by Max Lucado

The season of Pentecost is a constant reminder of the Holy Spirit's role in our lives. During a Children's Focus, Mercy Njeteneh used the hand as a great analogy of the Holy Spirit, with each finger representing a way the Holy Spirit is there for us: Helper, Advocate, Intercessor, Comforter and Standby, from *John 14:26*.

I went to the library looking for something to open my thoughts. Rev. Phillip often quotes or recommends C.S. Lewis, so that is where I began my search. Next to C.S. Lewis' location on the bookshelf was '*Help is Here*', a book by Max Lucado. He is an author I have picked up multiple times since the 1980s. I have always found him insightful, easy to read and biblically based.

The front cover declares, "Finding fresh strength and purpose in the power of the Holy Spirit." Yes, I need that. The inside flap states, "Help is Here reminds us that our Good Shepherd doesn't just feed us; he leads us. He does more than correct us; he directs us.

God keeps us on track—and best of all, he's commissioned the Holy Spirit to guide us down the winding roads of life, wherever they may lead us." Yes, I need that guidance. Each chapter of this book describes and gives biblical authority to the understanding/introduction to the Holy Spirit's ability to be part of our lives. There is also a study/discussion guide for each chapter, for more depth and growth.

Help is Here provides guidance to understand and learn how the Holy Spirit can be active in our life. Max Lucado has a wonderful way with words, supporting them with appropriate bible passages to provide their authority. Reading this book, I hear a voice that understands what goes on in my everyday life and I hear encouragement to keep the Holy Spirit close to guide and direct me. This book is a good refresher and reminder that the power and gifts offered by the Holy Spirit can deliver overwhelming and lifegiving energy.

Congratulations Tyler!

Tyler Versluis, our Organist and Music Director, has won two awards this summer from the Royal Canadian College of Organists (RCCO) in separate Organ Composition Competitions.

Early in the summer, Tyler placed third in the RCCO Rachel Laurin Composition Competition which attracted 29 submissions from around the world. On July 8, Tyler's *Toccata-Gigue* was performed at St. John the Evangelist Anglican Church (Kitchener) by Joshua Ehlebracht, as part of the *Organ Festival Canada 2025* held in Kitchener – Waterloo – Guelph. Press release

Most recently, Tyler's organ prelude *Cantilena* was awarded the Prelude Prize of \$1500 by the RCCO Toronto Centre for its 2025 100th Anniversary Organ

Composition Competition. Composers submitted a two-movement organ work, about eight minutes long, playable either as a complete recital work or as a prelude and postlude in a church service. Prizes were awarded for 'complete recital', 'prelude' and 'postlude' winners. All three prizewinning works received their first performances at a *Celebration of Organ Music* in Toronto on September 19, 2025, at the Church of St Mary Magdalene (477 Manning Avenue). Tyler's prelude *Cantilena* "displayed artful melody-writing idiomatic to the organ, as well as formal clarity and balance. The second movement, *Sainte-Clotilde*, was a close runner-up in the postlude category, and so the jury recommended that both movements be available when published."

The Diocese of Toronto is currently running three multi-session online study series as part of its *Season of Spiritual Renewal*. These began on Tuesday, September 16, but you might catch the remainder if they interest you.

The free courses have required the purchase of a book to be read before each online discussion and used midweek as a workbook.

Christian Foundations: this nine-session program, exploring foundational teachings of the Christian faith, is running on Tuesday evenings from 7:30 to 8:30 p.m., weekly from September 16 to November 11. Each participant purchased their own workbook and registered for the Zoom invitations. The enrollment has been popular: many St. Matthew's parishioners have joined, including the Tuesday evening GIFT Bible Study which is participating during their meeting.

Everyday Witness: this nine-session program, equipping everyday people to share their faith with others, is also running on the same Tuesdays but from noon to 1:00 p.m., weekly from September 16 to November 11. Each participant needed their own reflections journal and to register for the Zoom link.

The Love of Learning and the Desire for God: this six-session course, exploring how the ancient Rule of St. Benedict can guide us today, is running on Thursday evenings from 7:30 to 9:00 p.m. from September 18 to October 23. Each participant should have a copy of the Rule of St. Benedict, for use during this course. Registration was needed for the Zoom link.

Immediately following the session on the first evening of *Christian Foundations*, Rev. Philip gathered all St. Matthew's participants in a Zoom link. It was exciting to greet new faces and begin to know each other!

All men of St. Matthew's and/or any of your friends are welcome to join us.



The Tuscan Sun: Travelogue by Damien Macedo

Many of you will remember Damien Macedo as our guest organist on several occasions. Damien has been studying abroad and, when he returns to Etobicoke, practices on St. Matthew's organ. He has written a travelogue recounting his adventures, which we will share in this and subsequent issues of Matt's Media.

For the past three years, I have been in Cambridge, UK, undertaking a PhD in law. It has been an incredibly rewarding experience, but I thought I could use a break, both from the pressure-cooker environment and from the scenery, lovely though it is. The friendly folks at St. James Episcopal Church in Florence offered me a solution: play some recitals and assist from the organ during Holy Week and for regular Sunday services, and I could have use of their carriage house, behind the church, for all of Easter break, to write, cook, host friends passing through, and be a part of the church community. It is not often that a trip leaves me speechless, but if one could, it would be this one. Couple simply being in Florence with an excursion to Umbria and La Marche chauffeured by my singing teacher who happens to live in the neighbourhood, a walk through the Chianti region to Siena staying overnight in independent wineries, and the food—oh, the most wonderful food—and you have one of the most extraordinary adventures I can recall. My experiences were so many and so diverse that it is difficult to tell them chronologically, so I have collected them into different categories that will be spread out across multiple editions of Matt's Media. I hope they prove interesting reading.

An Opening Excursion

Trinity College Cambridge provides its singers with some of the most renowned singing teachers around. Mine, Sheila, has worked miracles with my singing over the past 3 years or so. It also happens that Sheila





resides for much of the year in a small township near Perugia, and our schedules overlapped for a few days. Thus, my time in Florence actually began with an excursion out to the surrounding regions, chauffeured around La Marche and Umbria for fine food and wonderful natural scenery in excellent company.





Perugia, the capital of Umbria, sits quite high and offers some beautiful views of the surrounding hills. Some years ago, Sheila was a student of Italian there, so she served as the perfect guide around its streets and many stunning buildings, though I did on one occasion have to question a rather scenic "shortcut" that took us around the edge of the city on a seemingly endless circuit. We did eventually get where we were going, of course, and, though the weather rarely cooperated throughout my visit, we saw some remarkable landscapes and ate many, many outstanding meals.

Among the many memorable sites and meals, I must highlight the Baroque churches in Cagli, one with a recently-refurbished organ, for which Sheila kindly pumped the bellows while I played, and the incredible restaurant, La Gioconda, which offers a "workman's menu" with a glass of wine and a bottle of water, a starter and a pasta, plus a main, all for €15 or so. It would hardly be the last of such places I encountered on this trip: it was a common theme that made me increasingly appreciate why the lengthy lunch hour is a cultural norm.

Coffee Hosting Instructions


Please volunteer to host coffee hour on Sunday mornings after the 10:30 (Unity) or 11:00 a.m. service.

Coffee (grounds, water) is already set up in the coffee maker on Saturday morning (by Jim Currie) in preparation for Sunday Service. All you need to do is plug it in on Sunday morning—see below.)

- Bring on Sunday morning:
 - Whole (3.25%) Milk (works for both coffee and tea) 1 Litre
 - Cookies (store-bought or home-made) for 30 people
 - If a Unity Service (10:30 am), also bring juice (and cookies for 50 people)
- On Sunday 15 minutes before the service starts, set up Lounge:
 - Plug in coffee maker
 - Fill kettle with fresh water
 - Put out sugar and milk
 - Put cookies on plate
 - Tea bags on counter or white cabinet (key in tea wagon drawer)
 - Napkins on serving table (extras in drawer underneath)
- Leave church during the final hymn
- Plug in kettle and make tea
- Serve coffee and tea as required
- Collect cups for washing
- Wash cups, put on tray, leave beside coffee maker in lounge
