That is the final part of our mission statement. Welcome all. Tell the story. Grow as disciples. In worship we have been looking at our mission statement. So, as we look at the final part of our mission statement we have to ask ourselves what does it mean to grow as disciples? Well I have two thoughts

- 1. Grow as disciples means never doing it alone: this, perhaps, comes as bad news for those of us that like to do it ourselves. The truth is, however, that no disciple is ever by themselves. We can't do it alone. From the very beginning no disciple was alone. Jesus started with 12 and the community grew from there. This is why we come to worship and why we participate in this thing called church. We need each other.
 - But it's not just that we need community, which we do. It's that to grow we need others around us. If you think about it, someone taught you the faith and helped you grow in hope and love. Many of you have, in one way or another, helped others grow in the faith. So, growing in discipleship is not something we do on our own but something that happens because of our relationships. So, when thinking about growing as disciples you should be thinking about who taught you the faith and who you are passing the faith on to.
- 2. Grow as disciples means suffering: It sounds harsh, but we had to get this out of the way. To grow as a disciple means we have to suffer. Part of this is just being realistic about what it means to grow. After all "growing pains" are a real thing. But another part of this is being honest about what Jesus calls us to. Jesus calls us to take up the cross and follow him. Jesus tells us that to save our lives we must lose them. That is not a calling filled with ease and pleasantness.

Now, to be clear not all suffering is growth as a disciple. Sometimes we suffer just because the world is hard. We suffer because we get sick or we suffer because we make mistakes. This is not the kind of suffering that I mean when talking growing as a disciple. No, the suffering that leads to growth as a disciple is suffering for the love of our neighbor. So it's not an easy question, but we should be asking ourselves how we are serving and suffering with our neighbors?

Those two things are not all that can be said about growing as disciples. Too often people in our world feel like we in this life alone, but all that leads to is more despair in loneliness. The gospel says we are, in fact, not in this by ourselves and called to be in community together. By suffering together, worshiping together, and working together we can grow as disciples.





A BackRow Lesson in Stewardship

There have been quite a few changes to the equipment used in our Sunday morning services over the last few years. Those who worship remotely see and appreciate the differences each week, but for those in the Worship and Life Center, the changes aren't as obvious.

Computers have been replaced with more powerful, more reliable units. Older projectors were replaced with new units that are capable of much higher resolution. You have probably noticed the end results of these upgrades over the last month, but did you know...we replaced the computers and projectors last year?

There's an old adage about a chain only being as strong as its weakest link. Our weak link was not the computers or the projectors...but the screen. The Worship and Life Center was designed to use rear projection on a screen that is framed into the façade of the worship space. That was great when it was designed 20 years ago...

- but modern technology has evolved and that "old tech" was holding us back.
- The BackRow Media goal for 2022 was to take advantage of higher resolution and wide-screen formatting, but we were limited by a 6' x 8' hole in the wall. Once we did,
- the projected image is nearly 80% larger than before. The difference is huge...pun intended.

We mailed quarterly Giving Statements earlier this week. I would ask you to review that statement and your stewardship goals for this year. If you are where you feel called to be...that's great. If you're not quite there, you're not alone. Many of us would like to be more generous, we just don't feel able. My question...and the lesson from BackRow is...what's holding you back? What would it take to work around that obstacle to reach your goal?


We continue to harvest the GG twice a week mostly for cucumbers and tomatoes. Our main harvest is typically on Sunday. This month's harvest was 245#. Not quite what we did this time last year but the tomatoes have struggled to produce. This is common for tomato gardeners this year. Early hot temperatures are to blame as this resulted in blossom drop. Without a blossom to get pollinated there will be no fruit (tomato).

Going into September we will be busy still with harvesting, weighing and delivering produce to BOLD. There will be some garden tear down and soil prep work for next year. Hopefully, we can keep a couple raised beds planted with fall crops but remember....hands up, we give thanks to God for providing us with this beautiful space we call the Giving

Garden.
