"Then Jesus said to the Jews who had believed in him, "If you continue in my word, you are truly my disciples; ³² and you will know the truth, and the truth will make you free." ³³ They answered him, "We are descendants of Abraham and have never been slaves to anyone. What do you mean by saying, 'You will be made free'?" ³⁴ Jesus answered them, "Very truly, I tell you, everyone who commits sin is a slave to sin. ³⁵ The slave does not have a permanent place in the household; the son has a place there forever. ³⁶ So if the Son makes you free, you will be free indeed." John 8:31-36

We read John 8:31-36 every Reformation Sunday. I don't usually preach it because I like to preach the Old Testament lesson. However, I think spending a little more time with this reading could be helpful. Specifically, what does it mean when Jesus says "you will be free indeed"?

Our question starts in the same place that the people who are around Jesus start with: what do you mean we aren't free? We are Americans after all. We have rights and freedoms we use every day. There are choices we make with our free will. Of course we are free.

But the simple truth is that while yes we make choices every day, the choices we make usually lead us toward less freedom and not more. Let's just take free speech as an example. Yes, you have the freedom to say what you want, but often we use it to get into fights and say nasty things to strangers on the internet. Does that really make us free? Jesus' answer to that question is a resounding no. Again and again our choices don't make us free, but lead to slavery, as he says in the reading. Our choices lead us to less and less freedom.

So what's the answer? Jesus says the only way out is him. The irony is that the way to true freedom is through less choice. We are to surrender our choices and follow Jesus because he is the only one who knows the way out. Following Jesus will mean a little less choice, but a lot more new life.

So the only question then is what choice is Jesus taking away from you? Following Jesus will mean that some choices are no longer possible for us. Maybe it means you don't post that cruel response to someone online or maybe it means you don't try and guilt someone for not living like you want them too. Whatever it is for you, it will feel like a loss of choice, but I promise you will be more free in the end.

Nurses Notes - Fall is a time to get the flu vaccinations.



world around us. October's discussion was around Acts 2:42-47 and disciples.





How Are We Doing?







It's been a while since I wrote one of these, primarily because nothing was changing except for the numbers. In the three years since we called Pastor Dave, "Year To Date Giving" exceeded "Year To Date Expenses" every month. What does that mean? The simple answer is that God has blessed us through your giving such that we were able to pay our expenses from the current year's giving instead of having to dip into our reserves.

This summer, we had to make a decision about repairing or replacing the Heat and Air Conditioning unit in the Narthex. FESTA was in full swing, making the decision all the more important. Everyone involved in the decision making process felt that it was more financially responsible to pay for replacing the unit than to pay for a repair that would likely lead to another bill down the road. The total cost was about \$18,000, which meant that our expenses through September exceeded giving to that point by \$14,000.

To be clear, this not a declaration of financial emergency or even an ask for additional giving. It is to answer the question that we so often ask...how are we doing? This expense will not cause us to spend over our approved budget for the year.

Our yearly giving has exceeded yearly expenses...except for that pesky HVAC unit. Our giving has not fulfilled our budget though...we just haven't spent to our budget. I'm proud of this church for being responsible stewards of God's blessing. I'm also realistic enough to know that we have been fortunate.

As you no doubt know, the proposed Ministry Plan for 2023 requires an additional \$461 per week. As I write this, we're half way there (\$234 in increased giving based on 31 Statement of Intent cards.) If you have not already returned a card, I would ask you to prayerfully consider increasing your giving by \$10 per week; knowing that God does wonderful things with what may not seem like very much.
