Kate and I recently went to see the new Superman movie and quite enjoyed it. It was nice to return to a more light hearted and innocent Superman. After seeing it I was talking to a friend about the movie and he said "I've always liked Superman. He just seems like a Jesus figure to me." It is right about there that your pastor begins to have problems because, as much as I like Superman, he and Jesus have little in common.

The thing about Jesus is that instead of strength Jesus is all about weakness. Paul writes in **Philippians 2:5-8:** 

In your relationships with one another, have the same mindset as Christ Jesus:

Who, being in very nature God,

did not consider equality with God something to be used to his own advantage;

rather, he made himself nothing

by taking the very nature of a servant,

being made in human likeness.

And being found in appearance as a man,

he humbled himself

by becoming obedient to death—

even death on a cross!

The whole point about Jesus is that he rejects power in order to save us. Jesus is not defined by his strength or his power, but by his willingness to renounce those things in order that we might be saved. We hope that if some hero comes along who is strong enough we might just have new life.

In our modern world it can be very tempting to hope for a Superman. Some hero who is strong enough to defeat all the evil and solve our problems. Yet, the message of Christianity is very different. It is a message that, as good as the new Superman movie is, rejects the logic of comic book heroes and asks all of us to become powerless and humble ourselves. We are to be like Jesus, walking obediently into powerlessness, weakness, and even death. After walking that way of powerlessness and death, we will then find new life.

So let us give up our attempts and desire to be Superman. We need not be strong enough to save the day. Jesus has already done that. Let us instead embrace the way of Jesus Christ, embrace our weakness, and find resurrection in that way.



#### Visiting with the Vicar,

Kids' Stories for Adults?

From now until September, Pastor Dave and I are revisiting Bible stories from our youth. As a result, I have been reflecting on my early experiences with the Church and the Bible, and how they have shaped me over the years.

In the basement fellowship hall and classrooms at St. Paul's Lutheran in Coldwater, the classroom wing at Faith Lutheran in Oxford, and the small youth rooms at St. John's in Covington, I have had many teachers of the faith who



helped instill in me the values, morals, and teachings of God and Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Stories such as Noah and the Ark, Joseph and the Coat of Many Colors, Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego, Jonah and the Whale, Christ's sermons on the Mount and the Plain, the Christmastide and Eastertide stories, and many others helped shape my understanding of God and how His love and grace break through our sins, our difficulties, and our sufferings in this world. (And yes, that includes my adult relationships at Messiah Lutheran-Urbana, TLS at Capital U., and all of you here at RELC.)

One lesson that especially stands out to me in our current world is what Christ teaches in Matthew 22. In this passage, the Pharisees try to trap Jesus and label him a heretic for prioritizing one of God's commandments over the others. But Christ turns the question back on the Pharisee, saying that the greatest commandment is to love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul, and mind, and the second is to love your neighbor as yourself. He emphasizes that all the commandments and laws stem from these two.

Several years ago, when talking about the problems we face as a society with a friend, I mentioned that one of the greatest commandments is to love our neighbors as ourselves. This person then said to me, "But that is the problem, people do not love themselves." And that made me pause and think about how there was truth in what they were saying. It is said that we are "often our own worst critic" or that we "are our own worst enemy." I often think about how I have failed at this task or this thing—how I haven't done X enough, and so on. But then I am reminded that our works do not justify us; rather, it is because God loves us through our Savior Jesus Christ.

Through that love, we are free to give love back to the world. Perhaps, with the help of the Holy Trinity, we can learn to love ourselves and then extend that love outward to others in return. As Saint Paul says in 2 Corinthians 3:18, "And all of us, with unveiled faces, seeing the glory of the Lord as though reflected in a mirror, are being transformed into the same image from one degree of glory to another, for this comes from the Lord, the Spirit."

By the time you read this, Neighbors of Mercy will have officially launched and held its first meeting; however, as of the time this article was due to Katherine for the newsletter, that has not yet happened. So, I wanted to talk about the organization we are partnering with for this entry.



Columbus Refugee and Immigration Services, also known as CRIS, was established in 1987 as an outreach of the Buddhamamaka Society to assist refugees from Laos in

resettling in the United States. It was reorganized in 1995 after receiving a grant from the Columbus Foundation. In 1999, it became an independent organization with close ties to the Buddhamamaka Society, forming strong partnerships with the City of Columbus and the United Way to help establish immigration relief services for all people. It affiliated with Church World Service (CWS) in 2001 to expand its capacity to help others navigate the complex process of building a new life in the United States.

While the ELCA is directly involved with immigration and refugee services through the Church-affiliated mission ministry of Global Refuge (formerly Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services-LIRS), it also partners with Church Wide Services in mission and ministry. The Church Wide Service unites 47 American church bodies in a shared mission, focusing on disaster response, food and hunger aid, immigration and refugee support, and relief efforts. It also provides emergency assistance such as hygiene supplies, school materials, and infant care. Established in 1946 from work carried out by the National

Council of Churches, with which the ELCA partners (initially through its predecessor bodies of the LCA and ALC), Global Refuge is also a partner organization of CWS. (For more information on CRIS or CWS, please visit their websites at crisohio.org and cwsglobal.org)

Let us thank God for all the organizations, such as the National Council of Churches, Global Refuge, Community Refuge & Immigration Servi

Church Wide Service, CRIS, and our new ministry, Neighbors of Mercy, so that we, as people of God, can provide service and meet the needs of humanity. Amen.






August 24th will be a Hymn Sing service with our worship service at 10am. More details to come. Choir starts back August 21st.

#### Giving Garden News - August 2025

Beetles, bugs, and bunnies!!! Yes, all three plus other creatures have come to call the lush green vegetable plants in the GG their banquet buffet. This year has been especially troublesome with beetles snacking on eggplant, bunnies munching on the Italian pole beans and our resident squirrels taking bites out of the just barely ripened, perfect tomato before we can get them picked. As I inspect the garden every few days it becomes evident that the GG is a tasty meal!!

Just recently (7/17/2025), the Columbus Dispatch had a front-page article on the increase population of our native rabbit, the eastern cottontail, over the past 10 years. Some gardeners have just given up their gardens this year and will decide on barrier strategies for next year. In the GG there will be at least one harvest of the pole beans but next year watch out. I have already figured out the barrier strategy and you can bet those bunnies will not be happy.

As we all know that barriers and boundaries are set up for our protection and help keep us safe. I hope that no barrier keeps you from thanking Jesus for His protection that is given to you just for the asking.

Dear Jesus, you graciously protect us and keep us safe. May we always remember to thank you for your caring ways and protective shield.


#### ....Scout Troop 672? They meet here at RELC on Wednesday evenings!

Troop 672 is an active Scouts BSA troop with Scouting America for Scouts ages 11 to 17. We meet weekly at RELC on Wednesday nights, participate in at least one outdoor activity/campout each month, and spend a week each summer at summer camp at Camp Friedlander near Cincinnati. We focus on leadership, service, personal development, and most importantly, having fun. We also learn skills in areas like first aid, camping, hiking, knots and lashings, cooking, and citizenship.

Over the past few years, we have sent crews to all four of Scouting America's high adventure bases: Philmont in New Mexico, Northern Tier in Minnesota, Summit Bechtel Reserve in West Virginia, and Sea Base in Florida (pictures of our crews are in the display case in the lobby). We have also camped at several national and state parks including Cuyahoga Valley National Park, New River Gorge National Park and Reserve, Hocking Hills State Park, Alum Creek State Park, Delaware State Park, East Harbor State Park, and Buck Creek State Park. And we have camped at area Scout camps like Camp Lazarus, Camp Falling Rock, Camp Birch, and Camp Otter Run.

Our 40 Scouts are actively advancing along the trail to Eagle, earning rank advancements and merit badges throughout the year. In 2024, we celebrated 6 Scouts achieving the rank of Eagle, bringing the total number of Eagle Scouts to 16 since the Troop was established in 2014.

Troop 672 is all about preparing our Scouts for the future and making a difference in their lives, in our nation, and in our community. We are very fortunate to have the support of RELC for all that we do and cannot thank the congregation enough!
