## September 2025

As we enter another September, we begin a new year in the Narrative Lectionary. So perhaps it is a good idea to do a quick recap -

#### What is a lectionary?

A lectionary is a list of chosen passages read throughout the church year in Sunday worship. Previously we used something called "the revised common lectionary" which was three readings (one from the Old Testament, one from one of the letters, and a gospel lesson) with a psalm that is read responsively. The narrative lectionary is just one reading and a psalm.

### Why just one reading?

The narrative lectionary readings are a bit longer and go in order of the books of the bible. So we start this year with Genesis chapter 1 and end in Revelation. The goal is to give people a sense of the entire narrative of scripture.

#### Why use the narrative lectionary?

As comfortable as the revised common lectionary can be, with its familiar cycle of three readings, the problem is that the readings are chosen thematically based on the season we are in. This is great for those of us who are familiar with the basic story of the bible and the story of Jesus, but if you are new to the faith it can be very confusing. In order to "welcome all", including those who are new to the story of Jesus or less familiar with it, we are using the narrative lectionary which follows an easier to understand pattern.

While we did the narrative lectionary last year, it still may feel new to a lot of you. That is OK, I understand that new things can be hard. I only ask that you have an open mind as you follow along to this newer way of hearing scripture.

So starting this first Sunday in September we will begin a new journey though the narrative of the bible starting with Genesis chapter 1. I invite you to join us and listen to the overall story of scripture beginning with creation, hearing the gospel of John, and finishing with how we live out our lives in light of the resurrection of Jesus Christ. Some of these stories will be familiar to you, some you may have forgotten, and some will be new. Through it all it is the same gospel message.


As you hear these bible stories, I also invite you think about the two basic questions Lutherans should always ask themselves when they listen to God's word: What commands from God do I hear and what promises from God do I hear. Command and promise, or as Luther put it Law and Gospel, is the heart of how Lutherans interpret the bible and a real important part to listening on Sunday morning.



## Visiting with the Vicar,

I have often considered August and September odd months for new beginnings. Traditionally, the end of summer and fall would bring new seasons of favorite TV shows before streaming became popular. For teachers and students of all ages, the new school year usually starts in August or September instead of January. Kids often feel excited or a bit anxious about starting a new year. Sports like Football, Cross Country, Volleyball, and others kick off their seasons. In the church world, another lectionary cycle begins with the Narrative Lectionary,



starting back at Genesis Chapter 1, marking the beginning of the Bible. Still, curiously, we're in the middle to the last third of the Liturgical year. We are starting a new season of Choir. Neighbors of Mercy is also beginning anew.

Yet, it is also a season of endings. The planting season is ending, and farmers and gardeners are harvesting their crops. Summer vacations and programs are wrapping up. Campers are leaving new friends behind for familiar ones.

For me, this year feels different. I am beginning my last year of seminary graduate school. I just started my final year as the pastoral intern a few months ago. As I reflect on our time together here, I realize that things are ending much faster than I, and maybe you as well, expected. It feels like I just arrived yesterday, but at the same time, it seems like it's been a busy year with enough experiences to fill a lifetime. Yet, here we are, about to start again at the beginning in the Narrative Lectionary with the story of creation.

As we start a new year in the Narrative Lectionary, the stories from the Old Testament continue to resonate across time and space, reaching us from before the first words were written down and before Hebrew had a written language. These stories still shape the faiths of the Abrahamic religions: Judaism, Samaritanism, Christianity, Islam, and others. I am amazed at how much relevance these stories still have in our world; stories about overcoming adversity, slavery, despotism, and tyrants. For example, the stories of Moses and the exodus from Egypt, as well as the origins of ancient Judean society, inspired enslaved African and Black Americans to seek a horizon beyond slavery, disenfranchisement, and segregation. While these stories might shock us in our modern thinking and way of being, they also serve as vehicles for teaching us about grace: God providing clothing for Adam and Eve after they sinned, giving manna to the ancient Israelites in the wilderness, and Ruth caring for and providing for her mother-in-law when she had the right to return to her homeland and family.

So let us take a step back and look at things anew, in the middle of the year, with changes abounding.

May you find Peace and Grace with the help of our Lord in this new season of Beginnings and Endings.


#### <HELP NEEDED>





## Giving Garden News - September 2025

Let's get choosy...... about when to pick tomatoes. Right now, the tomatoes are really coming on and in various stages of ripeness. They can be the perfect size but green from pale to dark green. They can be just flush with some color (pink, reddish, orange, or yellow hues) emerging. This is referred to as the "breaker stage" when the fruit begins to show the first signs of ripening indicating that the tomato has completed its development and can be harvested. It will continue to ripen off the vine. THIS IS THE PERFECT TIME TO PICK YOUR TOMATO! If the tomato is left on the vine to fully ripen to that perfect hue you risk that predators will enjoy it before you do, you risk it cracking and becoming mushy and you risk that the flavor you anticipated is mediocre at best.

As the first frost date is predicted this year to be October 17th let's get choosy.....about when to pick those "green tomatoes". As we get into September, we are losing heat and light which are needed for ripening tomatoes so it is best to begin thinking about trimming back those out-of-control tomato vines. Any new tomato developing at this stage of the garden season will have no chance to fully mature in size and color so get out those pruners and cut away. As the vines start to come down with pruning you will have many green tomatoes still attached or start to fall. Sort them out according to color. The mature (pale) green ones will ripen indoors. The immature (dark) green ones will not ripen but can be used in salsa or fry them.

In the garden there is always a lesson to reflect on. Let's get choosy.... choose God each day to be your Savior. He does not care about your skin color (breaker stage or dark green) or how religious you are (fully ripe) or brand new. He will pick you right off the vine and be there for you in whatever stage you are in because of His love or you.

Thank you, Jesus, for harvesting your people in the world at just the right time. May we always remember to choose you when life gets frosty.

# ....Serendipity 4-H Club? They meet here at RELC the 1st Thursday of each month!

Serendipity 4-H Club is grateful to Resurrection Evangelical Lutheran Church for allowing us to use your facility so we can hold our

monthly 4-H meetings. Our members Pierce and Ewan Kountz and their parents Mollie and Jeremy are active members at RELC. Our Club meets the first Thursday of the month from November - June. This year we had 39 members (ages 8-18), 8 Cloverbud members (ages 5-8) and 7 adult advisors. Our members took 54 projects this year ranging from cooking, clothing, goats, horses, rabbits, STEM, Leadership, health and creative arts to name a few. Of these 54 projects we have 20 members participate in the State Fair and of those 20 kids we



had 4 clock trophy winners (top award in the state) and 5 Outstanding of the Day. We were honored to have the 2025 Fr. Co. Fair Horse Queen from our Club Delaney Warner and 1st runner up Fr. Co. Fair Princess Katey Joos represent Serendipity 4-H.

At our meetings members are required to give a demonstration in front of the club and we practice parliamentary procedure and learn how to run a meeting. We also took a club project that focused on Public Speaking, called Finding Your Voice. We took a club tour of Battelle Darby Creek Nature Center as well. Our Guest Speaker was Master Chief Aaron Shipley who spoke about USA flag Etiquette. At each meeting we complete a hands on Community Service Project. The projects that we completed this year were: Assembled 50 Lutheran Social Services Thankful Meals, 500 VFW Star Packets, 200 Valentines Day Cards for Avondale Nursing home, 100 Dog and Cat Toys for Pets w/out Parents, 100 Snack Packs for Ronald McDonald House, 50 Care packets for Fr. Co. Sheriff's Dept. and 100 Complete meals for Dublin Food Pantry. We use Thrivent Action Team Grant money to fund several of our projects. We held a pop tab contest and collected and gave Ronald McDonald House almost 30 pounds which is around 38,400 pop tabs. We recognized our Advisor Barb Mulford for her 50 years of service to the 4-H Program by honoring her on our club T-Shirts, club booth and a tablescape in the Home and Fine Arts building at the Fr. Co. Fair.

Finally Serendipity was awarded the 2025 Ohio 4-H Community Service Award for our 10 years of donating over 1000 complete meals to the Hilliard Food Pantry and offered a cooking class to the families who were receiving meals.
