"Being merciful sometimes means you get taken advantage of."

Pastor Sally Padget said that once when I was working at First English Lutheran Church. We had just finished the regular Sunday breakfast and several people had asked for leftovers to take home. Some members of the church objected, saying that they were probably just going to take that leftover food and sell it. The above quote was pastor Sally's response to that objection.

Why should we be charitable in our modern world? It may seem like a strange question for Christians to ask, but if we are honest with ourselves it is a question many are asking. There are, after all, a lot of scams in our world. There are the telemarketers, the internet scams, email scams. It seems like everyone has an angle they are playing and you can never be sure that your money is going to where the person asking says it is going to go. Sociologists call this "a low trust society." We live in a world where our baseline assumptions about people are distrustful. So why, in such a world, should we give?

There are lots of answers to that question, the first and simplest is because Jesus says so. Jesus says in the gospel of Luke chapter six "Give to everyone who asks you, and if anyone takes what belongs to you, do not demand it back." There are no footnotes or exceptions to that command. There is no qualification that we should give only if the person is truthful or if we think they are going to do the right thing with our charity. Jesus just says give to all who ask, period. So we Christians are charitable, perhaps foolishly charitable, because Jesus commands us to be so.

But why? Paul can help us here. In 2nd Corinthians 8 Paul is taking up a collection for those in need in Jerusalem and he writes:

"Our desire is not that others might be relieved while you are hard pressed, but that there might be equality. At the present time your plenty will supply what they need, so that in turn their plenty will supply what you need. The goal is equality, as it is written: "The one who gathered much did not have too much, and the one who gathered little did not have too little."

So one reason for this foolishly giving spirit is equality. We have much and others have little and we should give so that we all have enough.

The other reason is in the next chapter of 2nd Corinthians. Paul writes:

And God is able to bless you abundantly, so that in all things at all times, having all that you need, you will abound in every good work. As it is written: "They have freely scattered their gifts to the poor; their righteousness endures forever." Now he who supplies seed to the sower and bread for food will also supply and increase your store of seed and will enlarge the harvest of your righteousness. You will be enriched in every way so that you can be generous on every occasion, and through us your generosity will result in thanksgiving to God.

So for Paul, giving is an act of faith. Faith that God can bless us, even when we foolishly give. Acts of faith necessarily require us to give up control, even control over how our money is used. Yet, Paul argues, in giving up control we will find God's abundant blessings.

So yes, being merciful in this world means we will get taken advantage of. Instead of resentment we should focus on God's abundant blessings and give thanks that God has so richly provided for us.

Visiting with the Vicar,

Grace and Peace to you from our risen Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, the one who was, who is, and yet to come, Amen.

At the end of October, I attended my Fall Semester intensive class, Theological Leadership. This class condenses a full semester's worth of material into six or seven days. We discussed several leadership topics, and one of the books we examined was Canoeing the Mountains: Christian Leadership in Uncharted Territory by Tod E. Bolsinger. Using real-world historical examples, such as Meriwether Lewis and William Clark during their Expedition, known as the Corps of Discovery, through the newly purchased Louisiana Territory, the author explores leading groups of congregations through change. On their journey, Lewis and Clark faced situations on the road that, if they had not adapted, they would not have survived. Indeed, change and reform are at the core of the Church—something Luther and the other Reformers taught us: we should always be engaged in that work. Not that we throw the baby out with the bathwater, so to speak, but the church today is not the church the Apostles encountered, nor is it the one that Luther began the Reformation.

For example, the church was established when the Apostles were expelled from the synagogues, with the scribes, priests, and Pharisees claiming that their teachings confused those worshiping in the Temple in Jerusalem. This shift in worship within the early church community led them to create house churches, so the Word could still be preached and taught to the faithful. From these initial house churches, the Way of Christ Jesus spread first from Roman Judea and then into the known world at that time—Greece, Syria, Egypt, Rome, Ethiopia, and beyond, as recorded in the Book of Acts. Change and tradition meet at the crossroads of the Church, making it an organic, living body of all saints and sinners: those who are becoming, living, and have lived.

Additionally, during this period, the Seminary hosted Trinity Days at Trinity Lutheran Seminary at Capital University. Trinity Days is the Seminary's version of homecoming, and this year it was held alongside the Capital University Law School and the rest of the university. I hope we continue this tradition in the future because it helps unify the entire community. We spent some time with alumni, students, faculty, staff, and the broader community of all three schools at the university's homecoming tailgate before the football game on Saturday. It was inspiring to see a Lutheran university come together to celebrate its community, its history, its present, and its future. Future students were on campus experiencing the community. Current students, from those just starting to those nearing the end of their studies, both undergraduate and graduate, celebrated their time together as a community, surrounded by alumni, faculty, staff, and others from the broader community. The past, present, and future are all coming together. It is the same Capital University, but at the same time, it is not the Capital University that was founded in Canton in 1830, nor the one that occupied two small buildings at various times on North and South High Street, nor the one that moved to Bexley and the current campus in 1876. In fact, it is not the same university I started seminary at four years ago.

Experiencing these things reminded me of how we are in the church and how we navigate change in our world of the church, an odd community where the past, the present, and the future all come together in this thing we call the Church for the Glory of God. May we all give glory to our great redeemer who unifies us across time, honoring the past, adapting in the present, and dreaming of the future and what could be.

May we always be Reforming. Amen.



In late October and early November, we celebrate the end of the gardening continuum. We have harvested all the green

tomatoes and pulled the plants. We will harvest the final peppers, eggplant, and cool crops BUT the Giving Garden begins again for 2026 with the planting of the garlic. The gardening continuum is set in motion, a new beginning.

Last year was a record 1150# of fresh garden vegetables for BOLD. Currently the GG has

produced 1145# but we still have carrots and kale to harvest over the next several weeks. Looks like we are right on track and may very well exceed our 2024 harvest total.

In this month of November where we reflect on being thankful, let us remember to thank God for life's continuum. From all the youthful moments to current situations, take time each day to raise your hands and say "Thank you Jesus."
