NOVEMBER 17, 2024

RELC Annual Congregational Meeting Minutes NOVEMBER 17, 2024

The meeting was called to order at 11:21 am by Council President Renee Mushalko who explained how the voting would be done.

Opening Prayer offered by Pastor Dave Kamphuis.

All Council members were present with Nick excused; a quorum of 53 confirmed members present in person, no online was offered for the meeting.

Motion to approve the 2023 Congregational Meeting Minutes by Del Boring, 2nd by Kathy Rotolo.

Explanation was given, discussion offered, no changes requested.

Motion carried via voice vote.

Pastor's Report-Pastor Dave Kamphuis A full report was provided to all members via email.

Pastor opened with Psalm 136:23-26 remembering that God is the one who remembers, rescues, and gives, all verbs assuring us that God's steadfast love endures forever.

In 2024, we lost some of our members, in August, Neall Weber, his was the largest funeral held with Pastor Dave, in September, Harry Hartsook and in October, John Berger. Harry and John were two of our oldest in age and RELC membership to join the Sainthood. The Blue Christmas service is planned this December for those dealing with loss.

Over the last 5 years, even with the decline of the outside Churches, we have added members and increased our giving every year. We have increased our BOLD numbers from 65 to 115 on average and have never run out of food. New ministries like the internship program have been welcomed and we have transitioned to new leadership in others. With all these blessings from God, we need to invite our neighbors to come and join us as we plan to meet these goals:

Expand our YouTube and podcast efforts

- Well ahead in technology
- Online service is well received
- Live Q&A goes well, and podcasts are well liked by listeners
- Hope to use podcasts and videos to teach about Lutheranism to those who do not know about it.

Pastor Dave said he is looking into a practical alternative worship service for those who cannot make it on Sunday morning.

Motion to accept the Ballot-Roger Knudsen, 2nd Dan Suain, Roger Knudsen moved to accept acclamation, 2nd Dan Suain Motion carried via voice vote.

Renee read the Council Covenant, and the New Council signed it.

Susan Shuter questioned the size of Council and are we full, Pastor Dave advised that the size is set. Renee thanked everyone for being a part of 65 years at RELC and how everyone has had a part in shaping the path taken to show how Christ has been a part of all of it and that going forward in 2025 we will continue to focus on Neighboring in our community thankful to Jesus at RELC!

Bridget Daniels explained the salary for our Intern, Vicar Keith Monroe. The Seminary pays \$14,000. And RELC pays the balance of \$10,000 of the required salary. The salary has increased substantially since we had our last Intern. We are not responsible for housing since he does not live in Hilliard.

There was much discussion:

- Louise Vaselakes asked if other congregations helped with additional funds and Pastor said some supplement with Health Insurance money. He was only 24 so he was still covered by his parents' plan.
- Pete Miller questioned the \$10,000 from LCC for 2023, how do we replace that? Pastor Dave said with revenue from members. Charlie Anderson said there was no original line item in 2023 for it and that it was a gift from LCC.
- 2023 Income was \$374,000 and Expenses were \$379.000.
- Pete asked how to vote for the 2025 budget without knowing our current income. Bridget advised she is updating as pledges are coming in, allowing for a projected amount.
- Pete questioned, is there a balance sheet and can it be an ongoing addition?
- There is currently \$109,000 due on the mortgage that will be paid off in March 2027. Pete questioned what we currently have in our bank account.
- Don Kincaid suggested a process to look at the Financial Statement that could be posted on the bulletin board in the Narthex. Currently the Council Minutes are to be posted on the board monthly.
- Patty Eakins asked what happens when costs are more than budgeted? Pastor Dave replied that there are some additional monies we pull from to keep Ministries open and ongoing.

Marty Bretz called to end the discussion.

A motion to accept the 2025 Budget by Roger Knudsen, 2nd by Don Kincaid, Renee called for a voice vote, all yes, Budget passed.

- 3. Continue expanding the work of the evangelism committee.
- 4. The formation of a personnel committee to handle personnel matters.

INTERN PASTOR'S REPORT 2025

To the community of Saints at Resurrection Evangelical Lutheran Church of Hilliard:

Grace and peace from our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, Amen.

A year and a half ago, we all took a leap of faith and began a journey together. I was about to start my internship, having just begun my third year at Trinity Lutheran Seminary. Pastor Dave had just come out of a difficult year, and the Council and Church were figuring out how to live more fully in the community. We all took a collective leap: you welcoming me into the faith community here at RELC, and me coming in as a bit of a stranger, similar to being an outsider or foreigner. Over time, we built a relationship, one I will always be grateful for and cannot fully repay except by paying that gift forward in the Spirit someday.



Over the past year and a half, we have celebrated baptisms, confirmations, and funerals together. We have journeyed through Ordinary Time, Advent, Christmas, Ordinary Time again, Lent, Eastertide, Pentecost, and back to Ordinary Time. We have celebrated our life together with our mission partners at First English Lutheran Church. I have focused my time on developing my skills in preaching, teaching, and providing pastoral care as a ministry candidate for Word and Sacrament in the ELCA. All of you, in turn, have shown me what neighboring in the Christian context looks like in the real world by welcoming me and inviting me to be part of the mission and ministry at RELC.

In addition to preaching sermons about twice a month and working closely with Pastor Dave every day, I have led two different adult forums on the Lutheran Confessions and Lutheran History in America. You have also welcomed me to provide pastoral care in various ways and settings. Together, we have launched a new ministry for our church called Neighbors of Mercy. Inspired by God's commands in Leviticus, Christ's Parable of the Good Samaritan in Luke 10, as well as Jesus' commands in Matthew and Mark to love our God and our neighbors as ourselves, Neighbors of Mercy is an outreach to immigrants and refugees. Over 20 congregants helped start Neighbors of Mercy, working with Community Refugee and Immigration Services to support vulnerable neighbors. We raised funds for CRIS's biggest fundraiser, the CRIS 5K, where 12 people ran, jogged, or walked. Together, we raised over \$1,370 for CRIS. I am thankful for all of you and the work we are doing together to make God's love real.

While it feels like our work together is just beginning in many ways, in six short months, our relationship will come to an end as I graduate with my Master of Divinity from Trinity Lutheran Seminary at Capital University, finish my journey with the Southern Ohio Synod Candidacy Committee, and discern a call to serve the church in a new parish as my internship concludes. We will celebrate one final time our life together as I am ordained as a pastor in the ELCA. When I arrived here, I mentioned that we would be together for a season, and I look forward to walking these last months, growing together in faith.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT'S REPORT 2025

To the Faithful Members of Resurrection Evangelical Lutheran Church:

Pastor Dave often talks about the hope we find in Jesus Christ. This year has included pressures on several of our ministries that we did not anticipate during our budgeting process in 2024, including increased levels of clients for B.O.L.D. while donations from grocery partners were reduced and funding to Mid-Ohio Food Bank was also reduced. Costs there and elsewhere have grown throughout the year, straining our finances, particularly on the energy front throughout the building. It's difficult to watch this strain, especially knowing that many of our members are also feeling the strain of these increased prices in their own lives.

So where is the hope in all of this? It's multifold at RELC. First, Christ continues to remind us that we have things to do. More B.O.L.D. clients? Get creative and rely on our garden to provide as much produce as possible AND ask for donations. Finding ways to reduce our energy costs has become a key focus and truly is quite a challenge in a very big building with some areas of single-pane windows, old exterior doors, and so on. This will continue to be a challenge for us into the next year, so we will be called upon to work together to find solutions to this challenge. Working as the BODY of Christ, however, is one of the most hopeful activities that happens at RELC.

Financial Stewardship and Council team members have been discussing strategies for addressing our financial strains, not at a crisis point but certainly of concern. As we implement some of the actions we have planned, I am reminded that there have been ups and downs throughout RELC's history, and we respond by listening to where God is pointing us. That will continue to be the case going forward.

It has been my great privilege to serve as Council President these past few years, and now that my term is ending, I want to express my thanks to everyone for their continued hard work and continued answer of "yes" as God calls. I know the congregation will support the incoming president and the Council through the next stages of the faith journey at RELC, and I look forward to seeing how that progresses over time.

I pray continually for the health and well-being of RELC, and it will continue to be a privilege as I walk with this church in different ways. We all have that opportunity, and I encourage each of you to pray for God's guidance on how you can serve going forward, whether continuing as you have been or pursuing new areas of service. We need but listen to him.

MINISTRY REPORT: B.O.L.D (Bread of Life Disciples)

Food Pantry

KEY ACTIVITIES FOR THE YEAR:

BOLD has remained faithful to our mission statement "God's food for God's people in God's house". We are serving an average of 130 families weekly, which is an increase of 15 families per week compared to 2024 which certainly reflects the challenging economic times. Over the last year we have served a total of over 6,700 families. Our highest week ever occurred late this summer and saw 147 families come through the line to receive food. The increasing number of weekly guests reflects the hardships many in our community continue to face with the ever-rising cost of food and higher utility prices.

Our partnerships with Kroger, Aldi's and Giant Eagle have continued to flourish but Whole Foods is no longer providing the same amount of goods as in years past. Corporate Whole Foods changed their policy regarding food donations and no longer allow overnight refrigeration of food to be donated. This has resulted in an 80% reduction in the food available for use to pick up on Monday. If we are able to secure increased produce from our local Giant Eagles, we plan to discontinue the Whole Foods pickup. We have had 2 times this summer when we had no food to pass on to the Russian church who normally pick up any leftovers after 6:30 pm.

As in previous years, we have chosen to maintain our outside distribution model which allows us to operate efficiently with a minimum of volunteers. The weather has been mostly tolerable week to week aside from a few heavy rains this summer. We are planning to replace several of our tent/canopies as our current ones are showing significant signs of wear. We have a dedicated core volunteer group of 10 people who are present every Monday from 3-7 pm. We also have a group of faithful volunteers who pick up and deliver the food each week, as well as a group who prep on Saturdays to have canned good bags and supplies ready for Monday. One of the bright spots for our ministry is the Giving Garden which, at times, has been the biggest weekly source of fresh vegetables.

BOLD appreciates the financial and spiritual support we receive from RELC. We encourage the congregation to join us in our mission to serve our community physically, as volunteers if able, and spiritually in prayer as we continue to do God's work.

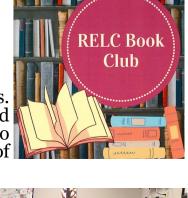
MINISTRY REPORT: Book Club

KEY ACTIVITIES FOR THE YEAR:

Compost is literally life-giving...adding nutrients to plants that are in a garden, the Giving Garden at RELC, so they can grow with gusto. Those who benefit from the produce of the Giving Garden are probably unaware of the dark, rich soil that feeds the roots of that produce. Grounds from the Sunday morning cups o' joe, produce past its prime that comes through BOLD, sawdust from Charlie Anderson's woodworking shop, occasional trimmings from food prep in the RELC kitchen, and recently the addition of coffee grounds from our guest church Center Point are added to the compost pile, turned weekly by Dan Mushalko, and applied to the garden by the dedicated Giving Garden volunteers. produces the fresh produce that is given to the people who come to BOLD for sustenance. Its a "hidden" ministry, but it is one of the ways RELC can take care of God's people while also ensuring organic matter does not go to waste.

The Council has also seen a growth in the participation of its members in engaging the various ministries and in their contributions to the work of the Council and the ministry work of RELC. The Council journey is a call to service to God and our congregation, and these Council members have been devoted to their call, with the confidence of God's helping hand in their work.

Men's Bible Study

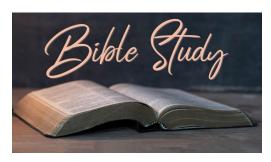
KEY ACTIVITIES FOR THE YEAR:

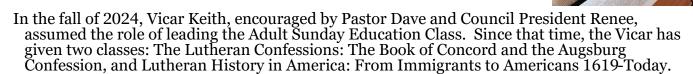

MINISTRY REPORT: **Education: Adult**

Sunday Morning Co-Ed Adult Education Class

KEY ACTIVITIES FOR THE YEAR:



In the Lutheran Confessions forum, the group examined the history of the Reformation from its beginning, including the 95 Theses. They then took a deep dive into the 28 articles of the Augsburg Confession, discussing their meaning and how they affirmed the Catholic-ness of the positions held by the emerging Lutheran movement and its leaders Martin Luther, Philip Melancthon, and Justus Jonas. The Vicar guided the group to study the Augsburg Confession using the book "The Augsburg Confession: Renewing Lutheran Faith and Practice" (Lutheran Quarterly Books/Augsburg Fortress Press) by Timothy J. Wengert, as well as sections of "The Book of Concord," edited and translated by Robert Kolb and Timothy J. Wengert, along with handouts and videos.

In the Lutheran History in America forum, the group has traced the story of Lutherans and their faith from the first known pastor to set foot in the "New World," Rasmus Jensen, who was a pastor to the 66 Lutherans under Captain Jens Munk, to Lutherans in present-day America. The course also covered topics related to the founding "father" of Lutheranism in the US by examining the life and legacy of Henry Melchior Muhlenberg, reading excerpts from his journals in The Journals of Henry Melchior Muhlenberg, Volumes 1-3, edited by Theodore G. Tappert. They are currently learning about Lutheran ecumenical and inter-Lutheran denomination efforts around World War I. The class will continue through the formation of the ELCA into the present day. The Vicar has had students look at personal stories from the book "Most Certainly True: Lutheran History at a Glance," edited by Lutheran historian and pastor Mark A. Granquist.

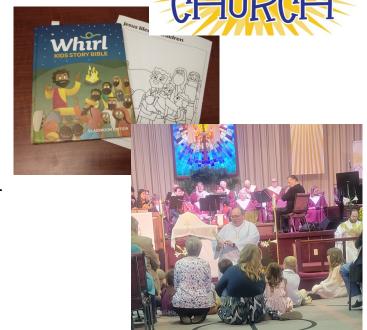

MINISTRY REPORT: Neighbors of Mercy

KEY ACTIVITIES FOR THE YEAR:



Neighbors of Mercy is the newest ministry outreach of Resurrection Evangelical Lutheran Church. The groundwork for this new

ministry stemmed from the congregation's desire to engage in mission work on behalf of the Holy Spirit, serving our neighbors in need who are immigrants and refugees in Central Ohio. The congregation had been expressing this sentiment for several years, but had struggled to bring it to fruition. As a part of Vicar Keith Monroe's education with RELC, Trinity Lutheran Seminary at Capital University, the Southern Ohio Synod, and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, Vicar Keith developed the initial plan to establish this ministry as his ministry project.

Launched in July of 2025, Neighbors of Mercy is inspired by the Biblical commands from God in Leviticus 19: 33-34 to care for the aliens the same as the native born, the Parable of the Good Samaritan in Luke 10: 25-37, and the commands of Christ to love God and love your neighbor in Matthew chapters 5, 19, 22, Mark Chapter 12, and Romans Chapter 13, and

Galatians Chapter 5.

Neighbors of Mercy is a ministry dedicated to assisting immigrants and refugees who have relocated to Hilliard and the surrounding Columbus area. As part of this effort, RELC and Neighbors of Mercy will partner with local non-governmental organizations, such as Community Refugee and Immigration Services (CRIS). Currently we have over 20 active participants helping Neighbors of Mercy in various ways.



While we are currently exploring with CRIS how to help families one-on-one, we have participated in two events with CRIS. Neighbors of Mercy sponsored a table at the CRIS Block Party on World Refugee Day. We have helped raise funds for their biggest fundraiser for the year, the CRIS 5k. 12 members of RELC and Neighbors of Mercy participated in the 5k run/jog/walk, and RELC and Neighbors of Mercy helped raise over \$1,370 through direct donations, race fees, and congregation donations. We thank the RELC community for this wonderful gift to help our Neighbors in this time of need. Everyone is welcome to join Neighbors of Mercy as we develop our newest ministry.

 receive a simple shoe box gift and the precious message that God loves them. It's
 a powerful journey.

- 500 patches were used for the Operation Christmas Child shoe boxes

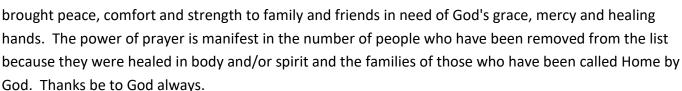

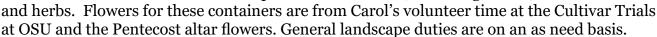
