Message Title: God Did It Again

Point 1: God Will Show Others That His Hand on Your Life

Genesis 26:28 (NKJV) "But they said, 'We have certainly seen that the Lord is with you. So we said, "Let there now be an oath between us, between you and us; and let us make a covenant with you.""

Key Idea: You don't have to chase affirmation or prove your worth to people who once overlooked or opposed you. When God's hand is on your life, He will make it visible. Your consistency, humility, and quiet obedience will testify louder than any defense you could offer. The very people who once dismissed you may one day be the ones who seek peace with you because they can no longer deny what God is doing through you.

Application: If you've ever felt rejected, unappreciated, or pushed aside, don't let it break your spirit. Stay faithful. Keep building. Keep moving. In time, God will turn the tide. Those who once saw you as insignificant may return with a different posture—one of respect, honor, and reconciliation.

Point 2: Walk in Peace

Scripture: Genesis 26:30 (NKJV) ³⁰So he made them a feast, and they ate and drank.

Key Idea: Peace Is a Posture That Unlocks Promotion: Peace isn't passive—it's powerful. Choosing peace doesn't mean you ignore offense or avoid hard conversations; it means you elevate your response to align with God's heart. When you walk in peace, even with those who've wronged you, you create space for God to act on your behalf.

Application: You may not be able to control how others treat you, but you can control how you respond. And when you respond with peace rather than pride, you put yourself in a position that heaven honors. That kind of posture invites divine favor, mends broken relationships, and opens doors that opposition cannot close.

Point 3: God Will Give You Another Well



Genesis 26:32 (NKJV) "It came to pass the same day that Isaac's servants came and told him about the well which they had dug, and said to him, 'We have found water."

Key Idea: God Will Always Give You Another Well: Isaac's life was filled with repeated setbacks—wells taken by others, wells sabotaged, and wells that stirred up contention. Yet, each time Isaac chose to move forward in obedience, God provided again. He never left Isaac without provision. We see this same divine pattern in the life of Elijah. When the brook dried up, God didn't abandon him—He redirected him to a widow in Zarephath, where provision awaited (1 Kings 17:7–16).

Application: God's Supply Doesn't Run Out—It Relocates: You might be facing the loss of a job, the end of a relationship, or a closed door that once seemed full of promise. Don't panic. That well may have run dry, but God is not out of options. His provision doesn't depend on one place, one person, or one opportunity. When one source ends, God has already prepared the next.

This new well will not bring the same kind of struggle or instability. It will be marked by peace, sustainability, and rest. So keep walking in faith and obedience—your next well is waiting.
