

Message Title: Worship In It

Point: Worship Address My Concern

Scripture: Genesis 26:24 (NKJV)

²⁴And the Lord appeared to him the same night and said, “I am the God of your father Abraham; **do not fear**, for I am with you. I will bless you and multiply your descendants for My servant Abraham’s sake.”

Example: God appeared to him at night and offered a word of comfort: “*Do not fear.*” In this moment, God is addressing Isaac’s fear.

Fear in the Place of Provision: Isaac’s fear may have been rooted in this question: “*How will I be sustained here?*” He had relied on wells for so long that now he had to rely on God’s **word** more than a visible source.

Key Insight: The Anxiety of No Longer Fighting

There’s another layer here—the **fear of peace itself**.

Isaac had been conditioned by conflict. Some people are conditioned to fighting that they fear peace.

Point: Worship Reveals My Heart

Scripture: Genesis 26:25 (NKJV)

²⁵**So he built an altar there** and called on the name of the Lord, and he pitched his tent there; and there Isaac’s servants dug a well.

Example: Isaac didn’t ignore God’s promise—he responded with worship.

The altar was a physical symbol of spiritual surrender. It declared: “I believe what You said, and I honor who You are.” In a culture where people built altars to idols, Isaac built one to the true and living God.

Key Insight: When God speaks, don’t just move—worship. Our altars reflect our agreement with Heaven. They say, “I believe You, and I’ll meet You here.”



Point: Worship Settles You

Scripture: Genesis 26:25 (NKJV)

²⁵So he built an altar there and called on the name of the Lord, and he pitched his tent there; and there Isaac's servants dug a well.

Example: After receiving God's promise and building the altar, Isaac **pitched his tent and dug a well**. He didn't just have a spiritual experience—he prepared to live there. This showed faith in action. He wasn't just passing through; he was planting himself in the promise.

Key Insight: Real faith is not just expressed in prayer—it's proven in how you plan. Worship is essential, but so is the work that follows it. Dig your well where God has spoken.
