


Jwa Jwa Jwa

As teachers build their teaching skills and perspectives to be relevant in today's world, student learning also takes on new meaning and significance in the world in which they live. He leads work-

shops with teachers on teamwork and child development. He also trains teachers in using technology in their teaching practices. This summer, he has made it possible for teachers and staff at LCS to be enrolled in a week-long Educator and Leadership Institute (ELI) in Cap Haitian along with many other educators in Northern Haiti. The Institute, sponsored and led by Wilfred Laurier University, Ontario, Canada, supports educators in science, mathematics, critical literacy, early learning, special education and school leadership.



Interns Bring Art Therapy to LCS

This year we have focused on supporting students who struggle academically. The After School Support Class continues to provide help for students who do not pass their exams. Approximately 60 students stay for an hour after school on Mondays, Tuesdays and Thursdays for extra instruction and practice led by four of the LCS teachers. In April, LCS entered into a partnership with the Education Department of the Université Franco Haitian in Cap Haitian. Several Master's level students

are completing their internship at LCS during the After School Support Class scheduled times. They conduct assessments on students with exceptionalities and then lead Art Therapy classes directed at specific learning needs. The interns also coach the teachers in helping them to understand different styles of teaching and learning that best help students to learn. What a joy to see that students are being seen as God has created them... 'fearfully and wonderfully made" (Psalm 139).



Technology Makes its way into Lagossette Christian

Technology in learning is becoming a reality at LCS! Teachers have access to a video series called 'Lakou Kajou', which supports studies in Science and other subjects. Lakou Kajou is an innovative educational media program designed for young Haitian children. Designed and produced in Haiti by Muska Group, LAKOU KAJOU features animated brother-sister twins Lili and Tilou, who encounter fun adventures in and around their family's lakou (Haitian Creole for courtyard).

Students watch the video in the classroom at COTP, and then return to class to learn more about the topic. Teachers are trained to integrate the videos into their teaching using them as an added resource.
