

4/14/24 | The Good Life: "The Realities of Anger" Matthew 5:21-26

NOTES

REFLECT

There is a reason that Jesus speaks about anger and murder together. Anger is a complex feeling and attitude that, when handled incorrectly, may lead to tragedy. This ambiguity is one of the reasons that divide ancient philosophical schools and religions when they evaluate anger. Ancient Greek philosophical schools, such as Stoicism and Epicureanism, contended that anger is wrong or bad, and a truly mature being would do better to eliminate anger completely. Buddhism and Hinduism agree with this assessment, though Abrahamic religions (Judaism, Christianity, Islam) disagree with such a sweeping view of anger.

When Jesus Christ speaks about anger and murder, he makes an implicit connection between the two. He insists that it is not enough to only condemn sinful outward behavior such as murder. A key is to be aware of and address the root causes of sin, such as anger. Essentially, Jesus offers acceptance and forgiveness as a way to moderate and control (better yet, transcend) this feeling.

TAKE IT HOME

- Some manuscripts add the words "without cause" to the end of verse 22 ("...anyone who is angry with a brother or sister without cause..."). What do you think the phrase "without cause" means for the whole passage?
- Recall a situation when you reacted angrily to a person or thing. How did your angry reaction contribute to or detract from the outcome you were seeking?
- Why do you think Jesus specifically singles out murder as a result of anger, when anger can lead to many different sinful actions?
- Notice that in verses 23-24, Jesus recommends reconciliation without mentioning whether the person angry at us is rightly angry or not. Why do you think he does this?
- Do you think Scripture ever describes Christ's anger? If so, what passages or images can you recall depicting this?
- Read Ecclesiastes 7:9, Ephesians 4:26, and James 1:20. How do the teachings of these verses compare to Matt 5:21-26?

WAYS TO PRAY

- What is God calling you to believe, trust or do in response to this passage? Pray today and this coming week that God will help you with this!
