Rosa Parks' Story

Rosa Parks (1913-2005) lived a long and courageous life. Although famous for one act, she was an activist in many areas: women's rights, voting rights, fair housing, anti-apartheid, reparations among them.

Mrs. Parks was not the "tired seamstress" who refused to give up her seat on a segregated bus in Montgomery, Alabama on December 01, 1955—sparking the Montgomery Bus Boycott and the modern Civil Rights Movement. Rosa Parks had been active in the Civil Rights Movement and serving as the secretary of the local NAACP since 1943.

In an example of her other justice efforts: Enduring threats to her personal safety, Rosa Parks, took on the task of gathering evidence to support Black women who were raped by White men with impunity in the pre-Civil Rights South—the case of Recy Taylor in 1944 and Gertrude Perkins in 1949. Parks and her husband were members of the League of Women Voters in the 1940's. She attended a rally and protest against the murder of Emmit Till before her refusal to give up her seat on the Mongomery bus in 1955.

In her own words, "People always say that I didn't give up my seat because I was tired, but that Isn't true. I was not tired physically, or no more tired than I usually was at the end of a working day. I was not old, although some people have an image of me as being old then. I was forty-two. No, the only tired I was, was tired of giving In."

A far more political figure than many know, Parks was friend to both Martin Luther King and Malcolm X. And involved with Angela Davis and the Black Panther Party. She trained at the Highlander School in workers' rights and racial equality activism. She was forced to leave Alabama and worked for decades in the office of Detroit Congressman John Conyers.

Mrs. Rosa Parks was driven by a commitment to justice and service. She was not someone who was going to let an injustice stand unchallenged. She withstood isolation and death threats. She never made much money but achieved great stature and respect because of her unwavering courage. At her death, Mrs. Parks, was the first woman and the second non-governmental individual to lie in state at the US Capitol and a statue of her is in Congressional Statuary Hall.

Recognizing the ways in which Mrs. Parks' life's work for justice align with Unitarian Universalists principles, The Unitarian Universalist Association's *Beacon Press*, published a comprehensive biography by Jeanne Theoharis - *The Rebellious Life of Mrs. Rosa Parks*.

Hannah Senesh

Hannah Senesh, born in Budapest, to wealthy Jewish parents in 1921, had emigrated to Palestine and was trained as a special operations parachutist. In March 1944 she was dropped into Yugoslavia in order to help organize armed resistance to-Nazi forces.

Captured, she was sent to a prison in Budapest where she was tortured for the purpose of revealing information regarding anti-Nazi operations. She refused to talk. Her mother, who was still in Hungary, was arrested as well in the hope of enticing Hannah to reveal her connections. She refused and, at the age of twenty-three, in a snow-covered Budapest courtyard, refusing a blindfold in order to face her murderers in the moments before death, was shot by firing squad in November 1944.



Her mother, who survived, was instrumental in bringing her daughter's courageous life and death to public knowledge by publishing her diary, poetry and plays.

A kibbutz was founded and called Yad Hannah in her memory.

Virginia Hall

Virginia Hall, the Wooden-Legged American Spy Who Helped Win WWII

Virginia Hall (1906-1982) was an American born in Baltimore, Maryland. She attended school in Maryland, Radcliffe College of Harvard, Barnard College of Columbia, and George Washington. Having studied French, Italian, German and economics, she traveled to France where she continued her education.

In 1931 she was appointed as a consul's clerk at the American Embassy in Warsaw, Poland, followed by a transfer to Smyrna, now Izmir, Turkey. An accident necessitated the amputation of her left leg below the knee. Cuthbert was the name she used when referring to her wooden leg.



In 1940, at the beginning of WWII she became an ambulance driver for the French army. After the rapid defeat of France, she made her way into Spain where she joined the British Special Operations Executive (SOE) In 1941 she arrived in Unoccupied France (Vichy France) posing as a New York Post reporter stationed in Lyon.

She was an expert in camouflage and managed to hide her real identity despite her obvious disability. For instance, after filing down her front teeth, wearing kerchiefs and long black skirts, she passed as an elderly lady of no consequence. In this capacity she supported the French Resistance, made safe houses available and smuggled reports to the British. She was responsible for one of the war's most useful operations of its kind when she succeeded in freeing twelve Allied agents held prisoner and scheduled for execution. from the Mauzac prison.

To the Nazis, Virgnia Hall was "the most dangerous of all allied spies," and they sent their entire stable of double agents to "find and destroy her.' Her face, or many of her faces, was plastered on reward posters across occupied France - but the Reich's most elusive adversary remained at large.

The Gestapo's senior officer in charge of her case, Klaus Barbie, a.k.a. "the butcher of Lyon," was right to fear her. He never managed to uncover her true nationality or her real name. This so infuriated Barbie that he once reportedly cried out in a fit of rage, "I would give anything to get my hands on his limping Canadian bitch."

Virginia Hall was honored with numerous medals by the governments she served. Books have been written about her, including Sonia Purnell's 2019 book, A Woman of No Importance: The Untold Story of an American Spy Wo Helped Win World War II, a work discussed by the Women's Group.


Jane Goodall

"I think empathy is really important, and I think only when our clever brain and our human heart work together in harmony we can achieve our full potential."

"Only if we understand can we care. Only if we care, we will help. Only if we help, we shall be saved."

"The greatest danger to our future is apathy."

"The biggest problem we have as environmental activists is to fight the power of money."







WOMEN'S ISSUES

The Good, the Bad...

Every year, this page calls me. As Women's Issues Chair, I try to educate and empower. This year we find ourselves celebrating some victories and recovering from the blows when our rights are withdrawn, disregarded, or overturned. The blows propel me, and I hope you, to act.

Will it be the good news or the bad news? We'll start with the good news. It's the ERA-Equal Rights Amendment. After almost 100 years women in Congress are not giving up. It's back on the agenda. This ERA will explicitly guarantee sex equality that will protect reproductive rights. A national archivist needs to certify and publish the 28th Amendment.

We were glad to see that a musical was made about Rosalind Franklin: "Double Helix. It attempted to finally give the scientist credit for her work which was the basis for discovery of the double helix structure of DNA.

Some of us remember when our women's group highlighted the stories of sexual assault in the military. Our President gave final approval to reshaping our country's Uniform Code of Military Justice, stripping commanders of their authority over cases of sexual assault, rape, and murder. The White House called it "a turning point for survivors of gender-based violence in the military."

Two events on the federal level will have enormous impact. The FDA approved the first pill to aid postpartum depression. The FDA also approved selling the birth control pill over the counter.

Now we'll look at what could use not just our attention, but commitment to act. Reproductive health care glares at us. As maternal mortality rates soar in America, one in five reports being mistreated while receiving care. Mothers are dying. Many American women are afraid of giving birth. The UN found that bias imperils Black women in pregnancy where the mortality rate is far greater than for white women.

Although the military took a giant step regarding sexual assault, the House voted to revoke military abortion-access guarantees. They also voted to bar transgender health services and limit diversity training. One step forward, one step...?

Our Governor authored an opinion piece in the New York Times. For her mother's 70th birthday present, she asked for help to open a home for survivors of domestic violence and their children. It was called the Kathleen Mary in her honor. It's who our governor was named after. Her concern as well as ours surfaced when the Supreme Court overturned New York's 100-year-old concealed carry law. The court ruled that perpetrators of domestic violence had a constitutional right to possess a gun. Later this year, the Supreme Court will decide whether firearms can flood the homes of domestic violence survivors. As the Governor stated, the stakes could not be higher. We need to keep guns out of the hands of abusers. In New York, there are many protections. Nine thousand extreme risk orders of protection were issued last year. In honor of her mother, Gov. Hochul vows to never stop fighting for justice. In whatever way I can, I will too. How about you?

We've looked at the good, the not very good, and the downright ugly developments in women's issues. Throughout the year, you will receive emails possibly asking you to sign petitions, contact your legislators, attend a rally or event to support efforts to improve the lives of women. I hope you'll join us and work with us in our commitment to women's issues.

OUR HISTORY

The first Meeting of Women's Group was held on January 16, 1963. It was held at the North Shore Unitarian Church, with forty-one women present. (Agnes Burton, Mary Watts' mother, Pat Luciano, and Paulette Dundore were at this Meeting.) Included in their goals was the desire "To offer a diverse program to satisfy the needs and desires of all its members, including service and education programs, social events, and occasional fund raising." The Group's spirit was embodied in the quote, "They say it couldn't be done, but I, poor fool, didn't know it, so went ahead and did it." If you attended any of our Programs, you could see we continued following in the footsteps of our insightful Foremothers.

Our Women's Group is part of and contributes to the national organization, the Unitarian Universalist Women's Federation (UUWF).

Women's Group has held an opera night, galas with champagne, and delicious desserts. Proceeds went to benefit organizations that help women and girls. We have had two very successful theatrical productions, a staged reading of *The Vagina Monologues* and an all-girl musical revue *A: My Name is Alice* which included Religious Education students. One of our galas featured music by Fanny Mendelssohn, sister of the famous Felix Mendelssohn. It was performed by Julliard musicians.

We produced a PowerPoint during the time of COVID. The PowerPoint, *Suffrage at 100*, was produced to celebrate the anniversary of the 19th Amendment and featured Women's Group members. It was recorded and is available to watch on our website.

Proceeds from our yearly Holiday sale were

donated to a non-profit organization that works to meet the needs of women and children.

Our members crafted our Women's History month Worship Service featuring experiences related by our members as well as an additional service on reproductive justice. As people of the Unitarian Universalist tradition, we are committed to helping those in need and to encouraging what is good in this world to grow and thrive.

The Women's Group functions under its own Bylaws, but it is responsible to the Board of Trustees. It elects its own officers. Women's Group provides support for women in personal, spiritual and life transition issues, and sponsors educational and cultural programs to enrich women's lives. We are actively engaged in the advancement of women's issues, such as pay equity, reproductive freedom, and the Equal Rights Amendment.

We continue with our intellectually stimulating and lively monthly Book and Film Discussion Groups, our TGIF Programs, as well as our Fall Membership Meeting, Worship Service and Breakfast, and our Mother's Day Luncheon. We end our year with the Annual Election Meeting and Luncheon.
