

Parasha Pinchas is found in Numbers 25:10 - 30. Verse 1 talks about how bold Pinchas and others were in their faith. Before the portion begins, there was already an issue with some of the Israelite men worshiping the false idols of the women they were bringing from Moab and Midian into their homes. This sinful act angered ADONAI and He instructed Moses and the leaders to expose and kill these men. Then right at that moment, "An Israelite man brought into the camp a Midianite woman right before the eyes of Moses and the whole assembly of Israel while they were weeping at the entrance to the tent of meeting." (Numbers 25:6). Zimri brought Cozbi into his tent and began a love affair right then! Pinchas witnessed this disgraceful act, and without hesitation, he grabbed a spear and impaled them both, ending their lives. When ADONAI saw how bold and zealous Pinchas was in his faith, ADONAI stopped the plague that was killing all the Israelites. Pinchas had saved Israel. In Numbers 25:11-13, ADONAI says, "Because Pinchas was very zealous for Me among them...I am making with him a covenant of shalom! It will be for him and his descendants after him a covenant of an everlasting priesthood - because he was zealous for his God and atoned for Bnei-Yisrael."

There is another story of boldness found in this parasha. In Numbers 27:1-11, when Zelophehad passed away, his inheritance had to be given to the next generation. The custom at the time was to give the inheritance to the first-born male of the family. The problem was that Zelophehad didn't have any sons, only daughters, and they didn't want their father's heritage and possessions to be forgotten because he had no sons. Boldly, the daughters of Zelophehad stood before Moses, the High Priest, and the leaders of the entire assembly, and said, "Why should our father's name diminish from his family just because he had no son? Give to us property among our father's brothers" (Numbers 27:4). Now, I was born in a household of mostly women, so I know how scary they can be when they're demanding something. But seriously, we should consider that there could've been people who opposed the daughters' petition because it wasn't a custom at the time. They may have felt afraid or unworthy to ask. It didn't take long for ADONAI to agree with the daughters. Not only that, He also established a new inheritance rule. ADONAI says in Numbers 27:7-8, "The daughters of Zelophehad are right...You are to turn over the inheritance of their father to them. Furthermore...If a man dies without a son, you are to transfer his inheritance to his daughter."

After hearing these stories, it brings up the question of how did Pinchas and the daughters of Zelophehad get so bold, or more importantly, where did this boldness come from? 2 Timothy 1:7-8 says, "For God has not given us a spirit of fear but one of power and love and self-discipline. Therefore do not be ashamed of the testimony of our Lord." This passage shows us that it is God Who gives us His courageous Ruach HaKodesh, His Holy Spirit, not a timid spirit. That's why Pinchas was bold, that's why the daughters were bold, and that's why we can be bold too.

But now, there's the other question. If boldness comes from ADONAI, how do we get His Spirit into our lives? Elijah the prophet struggled to find that boldness in himself, even after he had seen the power of ADONAI against the false prophets in 1 Kings 18. After that victory, Elijah became terrified because Queen Jezebel threatened him, and he ran for his life for 40 days and 40 nights until he found a cave. In the cave, ADONAI came to him and asked him, "Why are you here?" In other words, "Why are you running? What are you scared of?" Elijah came to realize that he had seen the works of ADONAI everywhere in his life. ADONAI was there the whole time with him, speaking with him, caring for him. So, having a relationship with ADONAI is the first step. Similarly, in Acts 4: 13 we see that the people realized where Peter and John's boldness came from. "Now when the people saw the boldness of Peter and John and perceived they were uneducated, common men, they were astonished! And they recognized that they had been with Yeshua." Their boldness came from their relationship with Him.

In short, Ephesians 2 helps us to understand this, It reminds us that we were destined to wrath because of our sinful acts, that we were just as sinful as Zimri and Cozbi, and Queen Jezebel and her prophets. However, because of the sacrifice of Yeshua for our sins, we were saved, and we were then given the Ruach HaKodesh, His Spirit of courage and boldness. Hebrews 4:14-16 states, "Seeing then that we have a great High Priest who has passed through the heavens, Yeshua, the Son of God, let us hold fast to our confession. For we do not have a High Priest who cannot sympathize with our weaknesses, but was in all points tempted as we are, yet without sin. Let us therefore come boldly to the throne of grace,

that we may obtain mercy and find grace to help in time of need." We get this boldness from a relationship with Him by holding fast to our confession that Yeshua is our Messiah and that His sacrifice has atoned for our sinsthe same boldness that Pinchas used to end the plague, the same boldness the daughters used to rightfully demand their heritage, the same boldness Elijah used to challenge the false prophets, and the same boldness that Peter and John displayed when they proclaimed the Good News!









Even knowing all this, it's not easy to be bold, that's for sure. Not everyone can go out of their way and do something out of the ordinary without thinking of what the world might think or do, and that includes me. I remember I had a good friend in high school. One day, we were sitting at lunch and I noticed he looked sad. I asked him what was wrong and he told me he was dealing with a lot of stuff back home. Normally, I would've simply smiled and said that everything's going to be alright. Not this time though! A voice in my head (aka the Holy Spirit) kept pushing me to pray, reminding me that it was going to be good, not only for him, but for me too. I got myself ready and I began praying for him, loud enough so he could hear me, which felt awkward at first, but when I was done praying for him, I felt relieved, like a great weight had been taken off my back. As for my friend, he simply thanked me and we went on with our day. I know that this might not be the boldest thing I've done taking into account that I have done many crazy things since I got lost in the mall at 3 years old! - but it was one of the first things that I have done that took a lot of spiritual boldness to do. There is no need for us to feel useless or not worthy when we want to ask ADONAI for something, because, well, He's already there with us. However, it's important to understand that He doesn't fulfill our requests just because we are bold, but because He loves us. And when we show that we need Him, through being bold, He is faithful to answer with "mercy, grace, and help in our time of need."




Ayekah ⊓⊃

Ayekah" is the first word the L-rd spoke to Adam and Eve after they ate the forbidden fruit in the Garden of Eden. "Where are you?" G-d wanted to know where they were in their hearts, where they were spiritually and emotionally, after such a devastating event. Adam and Eve hid from G-d because they knew they had sinned and broken their covenant with Him. They knew they were changed forever. Can you imagine their despair, sadness, and loneliness, hiding in the bushes, afraid to commune with Him as they had done in the past? As the L-rd's holiness entered the Garden, it overwhelmed them, and they were distraught and ashamed.

"Where are you?"

But we serve a compassionate, loving, and gentle G-d, full of comfort and restoration. He reached out to Adam and Eve and tenderly said Ayekah, "Where are you," meaning I know what happened and that you are in pain. I understand that you are troubled and distraught. Tell Me why you turned away from Me and open your heart and confess it to Me. Repent and turn back to Me. I am here for you no matter what you did. I will comfort you. I will restore you.



Ask yourself today, Ayekah, where are you? Where is your heart? Is there anything you need to make right with the L-rd today? If there is, go to G-d in the name of Yeshua and talk to Him. Search your heart and lay it all out confess, repent, and return to Him. He sees you and will take you back with arms wide open. He will rejoice over your return to Him.

Here are some of the students' profound responses:

"Dehumanizing leads to groups that try to get rid of them."

"Dehumanizing others can have many consequences and result in pain, death, and humiliation."

"The people they are dehumanizing could turn on them later."

"It's dangerous because you are calling someone that is human not human and doing whatever you want. You could eliminate the human race."

"A consequence or danger is people dying, causing a loss of population."

"Some of the dangers are humiliation and lack of empathy."

"If there is a possibility that you view someone lesser than you, then someone will do the same to you."
