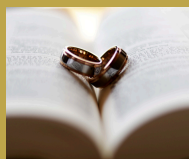

HIGH HOLY DAYS

The High Holy Days are here again! We begin the celebrations this month with the Feast of Trumpets (Rosh Hashanah) and in October we will observe the Day of Atonement (Yom Kippur), the Feast of Tabernacles (Sukkot), Shemini Atzeret, and Simchat Torah.

Growing up in a conservative Ashkenazi Jewish household, Rosh Hashanah was my favorite holiday. My family would attend services at our synagogue and in traditional fashion, the shofar was blown. Our synagogue only blew the shofar on Rosh Hashanah and at the end of Yom Kippur, so every year we all looked forward to hearing it, especially the children. Later, we would gather with extended family for a delicious meal prepared by all the amazing cooks in the family – my Jewish mother, sister, and aunts, all using recipes passed down from their mothers and grandmothers. We lit the candles, ate homemade round challahs with raisins, and dipped apples in honey for a sweet new year. It was a wonderful celebration! For me, Rosh Hashanah was a holiday filled with love, joy and happiness as we brought in the new year together!

And then, 10 days later we observed Yom Kippur, the complete opposite of Rosh Hashanah. Yom Kippur was an extremely solemn and intense day of focusing on our sins committed during the previous year. It included fasting, praying, afflicting our souls, saying the Al Chet prayer of confession at least 10 times, and begging HaShem for forgiveness. It also involved calling friends and family members to make amends and asking for their forgiveness. We did not bathe or brush our teeth or wear leather. As a child, Yom Kippur was my least favorite holiday, as you can imagine. Judaism teaches that Yom Kippur is the one day of the year when HaShem will accept your repentance, cleanse you, purify you, and seal your name in the Book of Life for another year. As an adult, I felt extreme pressure, tension and anxiety to complete the necessary requirements by sundown so that hopefully HaShem would forgive my sins and accept my repentance and seal my name in the Book of Life for another year. It was always an extremely serious, stressful and emotional day.

You can imagine my surprise and distress when I attended a Yom Kippur service at CBM for the first time. Although still a somber service, there was an underlying tone of joy and celebration. Everyone was wearing white and singing worship songs and worst of all, smiling! Didn't they know this was the Day of Atonement when we are supposed to weep and wail and cry out to G-d? What was this peace and love and joy I was feeling and seeing in all my CBM friends?

I now understand that this peace and love and joy comes from only one Source, our Master and our King, Yeshua HaMashiach. He is now my Messiah, my High Priest who shed His own blood and made the final atoning sacrifice for my sins. He has already sealed my name in the Lamb's Book of Life. And He WILL come again to rule and reign. I can now observe Yom Kippur in the same way as before, identifying with my Jewish people by spending the day confessing and repenting, but also in complete joy and peace knowing that I am redeemed, I am cleansed, I am forgiven, and I will spend eternity with Him.

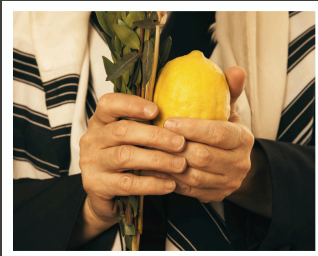

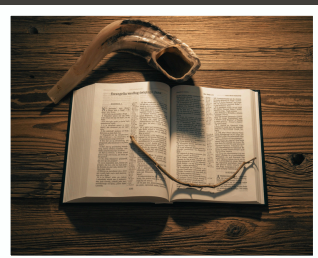

FACTS ABOUT ROSH HASHANAH

- Called the "Head of the Year" as it is the civil New Year. (Lev 16, Lev 23:23-25, Num 29:1)
- Celebrated for two nights starting the 1st of Tishri and called the "day no man knows."
- Biblically referred to as Yom T'ruah; the day for blowing trumpets. The three distinct trumpets blasts serve as a call to confession of sin and repentance.
- This day begins the 10 days of Awe and points us forward to Yom Kippur.
- Called a Day of Remembrance; a memorial, yet scripture doesn't specify what is to be remembered. Tradition holds Adam was created on this day
- Believed by some to be the season of the return of the Messiah (1 These 4:16).
- Associated with the Tashlich service which symbolizes casting away of sins.
- A few traditional foods to eat are Apples & Honey, Pomegranates, Honey Cake, Sweet Kugel, Carrot Tzimmes.
- Round challah is a staple of the holiday, symbolizing a crown for this coronation season.

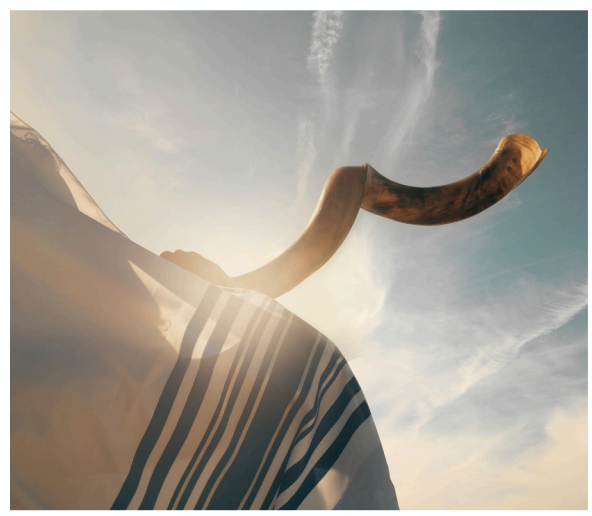
THINGS TO REMEMBER:

1. For some, it is traditional to wear black. Some men will wear a white kippah.
2. Only those authorized by CBM should blast shofars at the services.

YOM KIPPUR

SEASONAL GREETING:
"YOM TOV" OR "GUT YUNTIF"

MEANING:
HAVE A GOOD HOLY DAY!



Things to remember:

1. Those with medical conditions or who are pregnant are excused from fasting food.
2. Some choose not to wear leather in honor of the sacrificed bull.
3. It is tradition to wear white to the evening service.
4. This is the only service where a tallit can be worn in the evening.
5. As you fast, pray for the Jewish community to come to know Yeshua the Messiah as the final atonement.

Facts about Yom Kippur



- Celebrated on the 10th of Tishri (Lev 16:29-30, Lev 23: 26-32, Num 29:7-11).
- Called the Day of Atonement or the Day of Covering.



- The only day in the year the High Priest was allowed to enter the Holy of Holies.
- Sacrifices were made for the high priest, the priesthood and B'nei Israel.



- It is a day to "afflict your soul" meaning a day to fast, most fast for 24hrs.
- Points to the day of salvation for the nation of Israel after the second coming of Messiah (Rom 11:25-27).

Facts about Sukkot

- Called the Feast of Tabernacles, Booths , or the Ingathering (Lev 23: 33-43).
- An eight day feast that starts the 15th of Tishri, the last day being Shemini Atzeret.
- We dwell in temporary shelters as a reminder of God's provision during Israel's forty years in the wilderness.
- We are commanded to rejoice during this feast (Deut 16:13-14).
- Traditionally, the entire law was to be read publicly.
- Mentioned as one of the pilgrimage feasts (Duet 16:16).
- Points to the era when the Messiah will set up his millennial kingdom, tabernacle with His people, and have the wedding feast of the Lamb.
- A citron fruit, palm fronds, myrtle boughs and willow branches (Etrog, Lulav, Hadasim, and Aravot) are bound together and waved before the L-rd. Judaism has several interpretations for why. We wave these as thanksgiving for the L-rd's provision.

1. There will NOT be Shabbat service at the CBM building.
2. Oct 11th Shabbat Services will be held at Texana Campgrounds.
3. Day passes are available for Shabbat Services.

Shemini Atzeret & Simchat Torah



Facts about Shemini Atzeret & Simchat Torah

- "Shemini" means eight while "Atzeret" comes from a word that means to stop. This is the last or eighth day of Sukkot.
- The following day is Simchat Torah (Joy of the Torah). Which marks the restart of the Torah parashah cycle and the scrolls are rolled back to Genesis.
- This is a major holiday (Yom Tov) marked with much rejoicing.
- Starts the evening of October 13 and ends at sundown October 15.

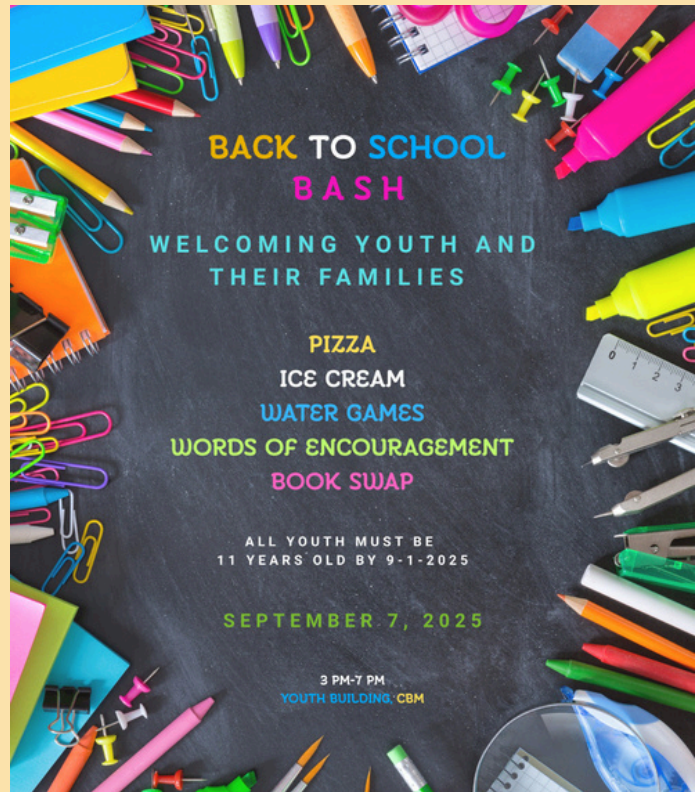
