Sermon Notes / Titus 1.5-9

Sunday, 14 September 2025

Key Theme: God calls for order in His church through qualified leaders who are above reproach, reflecting His character and protecting His people.

I. From Pentecost to Present: A Timeless Timeline

(Acts 2.11, 37-41)

- Historical jump: ~1,961 years since Titus; just 30 years from Pentecost to Crete's church.
- Cretans at Pentecost hear the gospel and carry it home, birthing the church Titus serves

II. From Jerusalem to Crete: Explosive Church Expansion (Matthew 28; Acts 1-28)

- The Great Commission launches disciple-making (Matthew 28).
- Empowerment at Pentecost (Acts 1-2): From 120 to thousands.
- Multiplication through preaching, persecution, house churches, and Paul's missions.
- Growth to tens of thousands by AD 63-66—fueled by obedience to "Go and Make Disciples."

III. Paul's Purpose for Titus: A Call to Order

(Titus 1.5; 1 Corinthians 14.33, 40)

- Paul leaves Titus to "put what remained into order" and appoint elders.
- God is a God of order; Satan sows disorder, chaos, and division.
- Disorder wounds people; order protects God's people (see: chaotic services in Corinth).

IV. God's Antidote to Chaos: Start with Qualified Leaders (Titus 1.5-6)

- Titus's task: Appoint elders to bring structure—because leaders set the tone.
- The command is non-negotiable ("as I directed you")—a strong imperative from God.

· Without ordered leadership, hurt is guaranteed.

V. Worldly Wants vs. Godly Requirements

(Titus 1.6-7; 1 Timothy 3.1-2)

- Worldly suggestions: Charisma, success, talent, degrees, wealth, trendiness, influence.
- God's standard: Resolute leaders who rise above reproach ("without blame," not sinless perfection).
- Problems in Crete/Ephesus: Leaders' conduct disgraced the church.
- Elders must be unimpeachable—worthy of imitation, protecting the gospel's reputation.

VI. Elders Above Reproach in 3 Key Areas

(Titus 1.6-9)

- Area 1: Marriage & Family (v. 6): Faithful husband, believing children not wild/rebellious.
- Area 2: Character & Conduct (vv. 7-8): Not arrogant, quicktempered, etc.; instead, hospitable, self-controlled, holy.
- Area 3: Solid Grip on True Teachings (v. 9): Hold firm to sound doctrine; teach and refute errors.

Personal Reflection

- 1. Looking back, have we prioritized "flash" over biblical qualifications in choosing leaders? How has that impacted our church?
- 2. Where have we seen disorder cause hurt, and how can godly order heal it?
- 3. In what area (family, character, doctrine) do our leaders shine, and where can we support growth?
- 4. How can I personally aspire to or encourage "above reproach" living to reflect God's holiness?



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
