Like the blind beggar in Mark 10 who cried out for mercy despite the crowd's attempts to silence him, we must laser-focus on the Gospel.

Paul warns in Titus 3.9 to avoid "unprofitable and worthless" distractions: foolish controversies, genealogies, dissensions, and quarrels about the law.

These drain energy from our core calling: evangelizing the lost and making disciples (Titus 3.8).

Instead, follow the well-marked "Gospel trail" (1 Corinthians 15.1-4): Christ died for our sins, was buried, and rose on the third day.
