Proverbs helps us to understand God's wisdom and why we should apply it today

A. ABOUT THE "PROVERBS" SERIES

Proverbs is a collection of numerous short instructions for living an effective life on earth, to help us do what is right - wise, just and fair. The Book of proverbs was written with the intention for its wisdom to be passed down from generation to generation. It aims to teach people to use their resources, time, power, privilege in a way to benefit both themselves and the world. King Solomon, the book's primary author, knew the greatest gift he could pass to his children were keys to success by living life wisely.

In this series we will learn how to build wisdom and avoid folly, as well as study what Proverbs teaches about a range of practical topics including money, work ethics, attitude, pride v humility, habits, relationships, morality, speech, envy and counsel.

B. BACKGROUND TO THE BOOK OF PROVERBS

The book of Proverbs is part of the wider wisdom literature, including Psalms, Ecclesiastes, James, Job, Song of Songs. While many of these books offer a godly perspective in the midst of challenges and difficulties life offers, Proverbs focuses entirely on instructing people in the path of practical wisdom.

Looking at the titles within Proverbs points to its authors. There can be little doubt the bulk of Proverbs was written by King Solomon (Prov 1:1, 10:1, 25:1). Other parts were written by advisors to king Hezekiah (25:1), or Agur (30:1) and Lemuel, passed down from his mother (31:1). It's worth noting, however, the value of the Proverb is not placed on the author, as

this collection of wise instructions was ultimately included in the Bible by the inspiration of the Holy Spirit (2 Tim 3:16).

Proverbs can be divided into the following divisions:

Proverbs 1:1 to 7 – As the Introduction, the theme of wisdom is stated very early in the book ending a section on the path to wisdom – "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of knowledge" - 1:7 (c.f. "The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom", 9:10). Notice it says the fear of God is the **beginning** of wisdom and not the **attainment** of wisdom.

Proverbs 1:8 to 9:18 – These nine chapters are devoted to one theme, namely extolling or exalting Wisdom. It is interesting to note in each of these chapters Solomon is addressing these sayings to "my son" or "my children." As parents, it is good to read through and understand the first nine chapters so that you can instruct your children in the practical wisdom contained in the various topics covered by these chapters.

Proverbs 10 to 29 – This includes a long run of proverbs covering many areas of our lives and providing wise guiding principles.

Proverbs 30 to 31 – These are the sayings of Agur and the oracle of Lemuel's mother, ending with the subject of the virtuous woman. Why do you suppose this book devoted thirty and a half chapter in describing and discussing wisdom and then culminates with a verbal portrait of a virtuous woman? Why? The answer is clear. The virtuous woman is the EMBODIMENT of the wisdom of God. We will cover this at the end of this series.

C. OUTLINE OF THE WISDOM SERIES

God calls us to "walk circumspectly [carefully], not as fools but as wise" Ephesians 5:15 (NKJV)

This series aims to help the home group members to understand the source and importance of living a life full of practical godly wisdom.

Of the five sessions, the first two are used to explore the foundations of wisdom. How is wisdom built and why is it so important? It touches on the way of folly as a warning to us if we reject wisdom.

Sessions 3 and 4 involves study and discussion for various wisdom topics highlighted in the book. This will require some preparation by the participants prior to the Session. The final session, looks at an analogy of wisdom, embodied as a virtuous woman.

Building Wisdom

Key Verse: "Through **Wisdom** a house is built, and by **Understanding** it is established; by **Knowledge** the rooms are filled with all precious and pleasant riches" Proverbs 24:3-4

A. INTRODUCTION

This Session introduces us to the Wisdom series by looking at what builds Wisdom. The author intends for us to learn how to grow wiser and how to live well.

Wisdom keeps us in harmony with the principles and purposes of the Lord so that as we follow in obedience, everything works for us and not against us. This doesn't mean we escape trials and difficulties in life, but people with wisdom have the skill to face life honestly and courageously, and to manage it successfully so that God's purposes are fulfilled in their lives.

In Proverbs, the words "wise" and "wisdom" are used at least 125 times, because the aim of the book is to help us acquire and apply God's wisdom to the decisions and activities of daily life. Wisdom is like building a house, there are wise ways and foolish ways to build. This session we will ask the question, what does building a house of wisdom look like?

Wisdom, Understanding and Knowledge are three different attributes and we will discuss the contribution of each attribute to understand the fulness of Wisdom.

- Living in Wisdom is like building a House

When King Solomon ascended to the throne of Israel at a young age, God appeared to him and ask what he wanted. Solomon replied, "give to Your servant an understanding heart" (1 Kings 3:9). The same encounter is recorded in 2 Chronicles 1:6 as "Now give me wisdom and knowledge." Solomon could have just asked for wisdom but he asks for wisdom, understanding and knowledge. He knew the three attributes are required to obtain WISDOM.

Notice how the Lord replied... "I have given you a wise and understanding heart" (1 Kings 3:12) and in 2 Chronicles 1:12 it records "wisdom and knowledge are granted to you." Wisdom, understanding and knowledge are required to obtain the fulness of Wisdom.

In our key verse for this Session, <u>Proverbs 24:3-4</u>, Wisdom is seen as consisting of three attributes, each with function:

- 1. Wisdom builds the house
- 2. Understanding establishes the house
- 3. Knowledge fills the house

The building of a house is a figurative description of our lives. "Through wisdom our house is built, through understanding it is established and through knowledge our rooms are being filled with precious and pleasant riches". All three are required to complete the building of a house. Not one of them can be omitted, and each compliment or builds upon another. For example, in mathematics, you cannot have an understanding of calculus if you do not have knowledge of simple multiplication.

Other examples of scriptures where two or more of these terms are mentioned together are Proverbs $\underline{2:10-11}$; $\underline{3:19-20}$; $\underline{4:5-7}$.

E. DISCUSSION

- 1. What are some of the different areas of Wisdom? Can you give practical life examples of the three different attributes Wisdom, Understanding or Knowledge?
- 2. Read Prov 9:10. How is the fear of the Lord beginning of wisdom?
- 3. How do you build wisdom in your life? What are some of the practices or habits you have found effective?

F. LOOKING FORWARD

In Session 2, we will look further at the Importance of Wisdom and how it is so relevant for us today.

The Importance of Wisdom

Key Verse: "Because I have called and you refused, I have stretched out my hand and no one regarded, Because you disdained all my counsel, and would have none of my rebuke, I also will laugh at your calamity; I will mock when your terror comes, when your terror comes like a storm, and your destruction comes like a whirlwind, when distress and anguish come upon you." Proverbs 1:24-27 (NKJV)

A. INTRODUCTION

King Solomon, the author of the bulk of Proverbs, is thought one of the wisest men that ever lived. But from the story of his moral failures and his writings in Ecclesiastes (Eccl 2:11), we learn that he struggled to always live with meaning and purpose. Through his story we learn that practical wisdom is not just the knowledge of wisdom, but it is choosing the way of wisdom, which maybe harder at times, and rejecting the seduction of the easier path.

There are consequences of the choices we make, and Proverbs makes it clear they can be a matter of life or death. Through his Spirit and by his word God is calling us every day to a life of wisdom, with him at the helm. Wisdom and folly each want to control our lives, and it is up to us to make the choice.

- C. READ SCRIPTURE: Proverbs 1:7; Proverbs 1:20-33; James 1:25
- Consequences are Wisdom's best friend

Wisdom is essential for life. Wisdom isn't so far away we are unable grasp it. In two sections of Proverbs, 1:20-22 and 9:1-2, wisdom is like a person who calls out in the streets, open square, at the city gates and the heights of the city (Prov 8:1-3, 34). This paints a picture of Wisdom in the midst of society's hustle and bustle, reaching out and calling out openly trying to reach everyone to heed her message. She makes her strongest appeal to the simple, scoffers and fools, and warns of the consequence of folly.

The voice of wisdom competes the Temptress (Prov 9:13-18). This is a metaphor for the other easier alternatives, that look attractive, reasonable and pleasurable, but only lead to destruction or death of what you are trying to establish (Prov 1:32-33).

Wisdom's words are plain, spoken clearly and openly so there can be no confusion. For those who receive her message of Wisdom, they are rewarded (3:13-18) but to those who reject her by being foolish (proud), scoffing (unbelieving) or simple (gullible) they will reap what they sow (1:24-27). Unfortunately, sometimes it is too late to undo the path that produced them (1:30-32).

The simple truth is, there are consequences in your life when you refuse to heed the call of wisdom and give in to the temptress. Not that God punishes you, but he warns you of what may happen if the way of wisdom is rejected (Prov 1:31; Job 4:8, Galatians 6:7-10).

We are exhorted to grow in wisdom, but there will be little point unless we apply the wisdom that we already have been given.

E. DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- 1. Read Proverbs 9 together and highlight the qualities that are present in Lady Wisdom and the Temptress Folly. Practice picking a verse and sharing the truth that is contained in it. Perhaps each person can speak to one verse?
- 2. Read Proverbs 1:24-27. Proverbs warns us of the consequences of rejecting wisdom. How do we know when we are listening to wisdom and when we are not?

3. Prepare for next week. What topic/passage will you study in preparation for the next Home Group Session?

Areas of Wisdom (Part 1)

Key Passage: "Look carefully then how you walk, not as unwise but as wise" Ephesians 5:15 (ESV)

A. INTRODUCTION

When reading through Proverbs we find that a number of the short instructions cover similar topics. Solomon wrote over 3,000 wise sayings (1 Kings 4:32), however the Holy Spirit selected only some of them. These are the ones which are relevant to every age as they highlight the common issues any one of us can encounter.

In the first of two similar sessions, we will take time to study these topics and learn the way of wisdom given in scripture.

Proverbs are short statements that use a few words to convey practical truths relating to some aspect of everyday life.

Areas of Wisdom (Part 2)

Key Verse: "Foolishness brings joy to those with no sense; a sensible person stays on the right path." Proverbs 15:21 (NLT)

A. INTRODUCTION

When reading through Proverbs we find that a number of the short instructions cover similar topics. These highlight the common issues we face in everyday living.

In the last session we looked at the topics: finance, counsel, attitudes, adultery and speech. In this session we will study what Proverbs says about Success, Pride v Humility, Envy, Relationships, Habits – good and bad. These are not just superficial topics, but things that impact each one of us in the course of life. The instructions given are good, but we also need wisdom to know when and where they should be applied.

E. LOOKING FORWARD

In our last session, Session 5, we will look at Proverbs 31 and the personification of wisdom. Before the next meeting, have the members read Proverbs 31 and write down any insights and understanding from the scriptures associated with the topics. These can be discussed in the groups at the beginning of the session, before sharing a summary with the main group.

It might be helpful to allocate individuals to share/investigate/meditate on a particular verse or quality of wisdom found in Proverbs 31. Again, here are some helpful questions to ask as you delve deeper into the qualities of Wisdom embodied.

- What is the quality of Wisdom that is being highlighted in the verse that you've chosen?
- What is one practical life example of this quality that you've seen in your life?

How can we apply this principle into our lives?

Wisdom Embodied

Key Passage: "An excellent wife who can find? She is far more precious than jewels" Proverbs 31:10 (ESV)

A. INTRODUCTION

In the first four sessions we have looked at, including

- How to build Wisdom in our lives
- The Importance of wisdom (and consequences of folly)
- Areas of Wisdom (Session 3 & 4)

In this final session we will have an opportunity to undertake a detailed study of the final chapter of Proverbs to see a picture of the embodiment of Wisdom as she is personified as a woman.

This portrait of wisdom was written to help people imagine and remember the excellence of practical wisdom. A life married to wisdom bears great rewards, she will serve you when you work together with her.

Proverbs 31 gives us a final picture of what Wisdom serves you as you commit to her like a marriage

C. READ SCRIPTURE: Proverbs 31:10-31

D. MAIN POINT

Lady Wisdom is the embodiment of Wisdom

Why do you suppose the Proverbs chose to conclude this book of wisdom by devoting most of the final chapter to the subject of a virtuous woman? For over thirty chapters Proverbs has been describing and discussing practical wisdom. Now it culminates with a verbal portrait of the virtuous woman? Why? What has virtue to do with wisdom? Clearly, the portrayal of this woman must bear some relation to the theme of the rest of the book... The virtuous woman is the Personification or Embodiment of the wisdom of God.

The portrait of a woman is used to show what the embodiment of wisdom looks like as we commit to her ways and marry her for life.

E. DISCUSSION

Read Proverbs 31:10-31 then discuss. You may wish to break into groups and each group study a few verses within the section Proverbs 31:10-31. Read each of the versus assigned to your group, discuss their meaning and application. Have one person share their findings with the rest of the group.

Read the versus below and discuss "What does your life look like to be married to Wisdom?"

- A) Prov 31:10 "Who can find a virtuous wife? For her worth is far above rubies"
- B) Prov 31:11-13 "The heart of her husband safely trusts her; so he will have no lack of gain. She does him good and not evil all the days of her life."
- C) Prov 31:13-15 "She seeks wool and flax, and willingly works with her hands. She is like the merchant ships; she brings her food from afar. She also rises while it is yet night, and provides food for her household, and a portion for her maidservants.... She watches over the ways of her household, and does not eat the bread of idleness."

D)	Prov 31:16-18a, 24 "She considers a field and buys it; from her profits she plants a vineyard. She girds herself with strength, and strengthens her arms. She perceives that her merchandise is good, and her lamp does not go out by night She makes linen garments and sells them, and supplies sashes for the merchants."
E)	Prov 31:19-20 "She stretches out her hands to the distaff, and her hand holds the spindle. She extends her hand to the poor, yes, she reaches out her hands to the needy."
F)	Prov 31:21 "She is not afraid of snow for her household, for all her household is clothed with scarlet."
G)	Prov 31:22 "She makes tapestry for herself; her clothing is fine linen and purple."
H)	Prov 31:23 "Her husband is known in the gates, when he sits among the elders of the land."
I)	Prov 31:25 "Strength and honor are her clothing; she shall rejoice in time to come."
۱)	Prov 31:26 "She opens her mouth with wisdom, and on her tongue is the law of kindness."

K) Prov 31:28-31 "Her children rise up and call her blessed; her husband also, and he praises her: many daughters have done well, but you excel them all." Charm is deceitful and beauty is passing, but a woman who fears the Lord, she shall be praised. Give her of the fruit of her hands, and let her own works praise her in the gates."

F. PRAYER

Pray for one another to desire for more wisdom in our lives. If there are any specific areas of need pray to be able to recognise, receive and follow the path of wisdom the Holy Spirit provides.

G. WRAP UP

What was the most memorable Proverb/verse throughout the whole series? What insight will you take forward with you after this series ends. If you feel that you haven't learned anything (or if you feel that you've only heard things that you already know) ... perhaps consider a deeper dive into the Book of Proverbs. It's a book that has intrigued philosophers, theologians and wise people for millennia.
