#### Summary

In this week's passage, we are reminded that suffering for our faith is not something to be surprised by. Instead, we are called to rejoice in it, praise God, and look forward to His glory being revealed.

Peter also draws a clear distinction between suffering for Christ and suffering that comes as a result of our own sin.

He concludes by encouraging believers who suffer according to God's will, to continue doing good and remain committed to their faithful Creator.


