Maasai Girl's School

This January Tanzania Action Committee will be sending five deserving girls to Maasai Girls Secondary School in Monduli near Arusha, Tanzania. The five are either orphans or extremely impoverished, and have proven themselves academically. Pastor Abel has assembled a committee to assist us in ensuring they are qualified and unable to attend a private Christian school without our assistance. With this commitment TAC has turned a new page in support of girls' secondary education.

Why have we chosen to support Maasai girls? The Maasai are a semi-nomadic, tradition oriented tribe. Male elders wield the power and are the main decision makers. Women have many disadvantages in Maasai culture. Polygamy is commonplace. Education for girls is considered unimportant. In some Maasai areas only one in five girls make it to 8th grade due to early marriage, preference for boys, and poverty. Female genital mutilation is prevalent. Girls are often considered property, forced into early marriage in exchange for a cow or two.

We believe Christian education provides the answer to independence, economic empowerment, and a closer relationship with Christ. Graduates of Maasai Girls School are seven times less likely to contract HIV. Their future income is three times the national average. They marry later in life and have two fewer children. Graduates' children have a 40% better chance of surviving to age 5.

Why Maasai Girls School? It is considered by many to be the premier facility for Christian girls in northern Tanzania. It has graduated more than 650 girls since 1999. Students are secluded on their lovely expansive campus in rural Tanzania to protect them from outside influences and kidnapping. The campus is well maintained and living conditions are excellent. Graduate test scores are among the highest in the country. So are graduation rates. More than 300 have gone on to post-graduate education.

This December TAC will be seeking sponsors for five or more girls. Won't you please consider being a sponsor? Talk to present Rockland sponsors. Ask them about their experience. When sharing with a couple in church on Sunday about all that Rockland does in Congregational Care, specifically Daily Bread meals, caring visitors, etc. A woman in our congregation exclaimed, "Well I didn't realize you had all of these services! I had surgery recently and no one reached out to me, and I'm a member"

My first thought was with all of the paper literature, articles, bulletins and so forth how did this person not know we had all of these services??

My reaction was to comfort her and apologize to her for us not reaching out but then I presented her with a question.

I said to her "Did you ever let someone know you were having surgery?"

My question was two-fold. One I wanted to make sure that she hadn't reached out and we missed it somehow. Secondly, it was to place accountability on a person for not alerting us to her need.

Once I asked her, the reaction she gave me was beautiful. She stated "Oh my! I guess I never told anyone that I was going through surgery! How can you serve me if I don't tell you?!?!?"

Needless to say it was an awesome moment of connection that contained a heavy message.

"How can we, Rockland serve you, if we have no knowledge of your need?"

Years ago as a Caregiver the Lord spoke to my heart "If you don't speak your need, then the person I have waiting to serve you, won't hear that need."

Romanian Outreach Mission

During the final week in August Rockland hosted Cipri Tehei from World Vision Romania, along with two of the current students in the Romanian scholarship program, Tony Baran and Denisa Simiciuc. They traveled to Colorado to interact with Rockland members and experience our local area. A few excursions around Colorado were on the agenda, as well as a day at Golden High School. The three were introduced at the worship services on August 27 and participated in the church Carnival later in the day.

There was a need for 15 new students to be sponsored for the upcoming school year and thanks to the generosity of our Rockland congregation, this goal was achieved.

The ongoing outreach mission is called "I want to be in the 9th grade" program in Romania, and allows vetted high schoolers from rural villages the financial assistance to attend school. The cost of transportation and school supplies alone often prohibits otherwise worthy students from completing school.

The requirement to stay on track academically is an obvious requirement of the program, but Cipri's oversight expands far beyond this. He is involved with all the students and knows their unique personal situations. Beyond school itself, he has organized training in personal finance, sports competition and overall exposure to life outside school and their villages. The program offers these students a window to the world where they can continue to grow and contribute for the rest of their lives.

The Death of Joan Cherry: An Historic Rockland Story

The historic Rockland church suffered hard times after the community dedicated it in January of 1880. The church operated intermittently for many years until the members resurrected it following World War II.

Joan Cherry was in many ways responsible for the resurrection of the church. Joan was a very popular young lady who died tragically at the age of 18, and her funeral brought a number of people particularly pastors to the church which resulted in it becoming a living church again.

Joan Cherry was a daughter of Elsie Cherry Lee Darling (Ralston). Her mother was a member of a group of women who were instrumental in resurrecting the church. They went by the name of The *Ladies Home Demonstration Group*. A newspaper took a picture of them in 1938, and we can see an excerpt from that picture in this article.

Colleen Connelly is another person who we can see in the photograph of the *Ladies Home Demonstration Group*. She is the young girl that we can see the lower right of the *Ladies Home Demonstration Group* picture excerpt. My Wife Ann and I interviewed Colleen Connolly in September of 2002. At the time, she was a retired Lawyer who was living in an assisted living home.

Joan was born on March of 1932, and she died on June of 1950 at the tender age of eighteen. We can see her as the smiling girl in the middle of the upper picture.

Joan was very good friends with Jean Ann Ralston who is the daughter of Strode Ralston. He is the person who built the rock wall in front of the balcony in the current Rockland Community Church. Joan served as Jean Ann Ralston's maid of honor when Jean Ann was married. A photograph of Jean Ann's wedding picture shows both Jean Ann and Joan Cherry. Jean Ann is still alive and living today in a nursing home in Kentucky. Her family plans to bury her in the Historic Rockland Church cemetery along with her husband.


Joan was a very popular young lady. One can see her outgoing nature in the picture. In fact, she was so popular that the cars extended all the way from the Morrison exit on Highway 40 to the Historic Church on the day of her funeral. Colleen told us that Joan died of "a communicable disease. She did not remember the exact cause of death, but she did tell us that many of the boys who knew her were crying at the funeral.

Reverend Vernon A. Loescher of the First Plymouth Congregational Church in Denver presided over the funeral; and he noted what a charming church Rockland was, even though the members did not use the church very much. He brought this information to the attention of the Denver Association of Congregational Churches and Ministers. The ministers were so impressed with the church that they decided to try to resurrect it. For a while, they held services for the Congregation in the evening, but they quickly tired of that.

They finally hired a young student at Iliff School of theology, Cy Eberhart, to be the first full-time minister of the historic church.

It was finally a living church again.

When Ann and I got involved with the Rock House three years ago, the average number of kids in the mentoring program was 8 to 10 per year and same for tutoring – a solid participation but we all knew that the need was greater. But now we need 10 MORE Mentors! A good problem to have – please consider giving one night a week to these dear kids – they need YOU!

Here are some of the upgrades and the new look at the Rock House, made possible by your support:

Vicky Joel was selected as a fourteen year old Tanzanian girl to be sponsored into secondary education in the Rockland Secondary Education Program. Her sponsor had enjoyed watching a previously sponsored student succeed in secondary education and set out as an early childhood teacher and decided to offer the opportunity to yet another young girl.

Vicky was from a poverty-stricken family of tenant farmers and Vicky was living in the home of her grandparents with shortages of food. From the beginning, she showed determination to rise above her circumstances through the opportunity of education. By the time she completed the second year, she was already second in her class. That enthusiasm and confidence has continued and grown over the last two years of her studies.

She has now completed her exams and graduated from MWEDO Secondary School as a leader in her class and a leader of the worship choir. When members of Rockland visited her school in March, she had been selected to be the representative to offer the greetings, welcome and words of gratitude to the visitors.

Over the four years of sponsorship for Vicky, sponsor and student have developed a beautiful relationship based on support, encouragement, and prayer.

In Vicky's words:

I Love you so much dear Lovely mom as you know that when love comes into our life it makes the world to be a beautiful place. How merciful God has been in our life that has given us a great brilliant successful life. Let us say thanks to Him.


Mean Street

Family Winter Shelter... we are moving from a severe weather shelter to a daily shelter from December 1 thru March 31. We are excited to introduce our new Shelter Coordinator, Tina Stuckey, to our staff. She has a passion for helping the homeless and is excited to recruit and work alongside volunteers. Satellite Office in Arvada...we were approached by the City of Arvada to come alongside The Rising Church to help with feeding, counseling and sharing God's word with the homeless in that area. The Severe Weather group is also working on getting a shelter into place this winter. We have some volunteers already in place for this great project, which will begin on September 11. Interested in helping?

Bridges and Creeks...as mentioned before, our homeless population is exploding. Many are flooding to the highway bridges and along creeks. James Fry, Todd Graber and Kathryn Otten (Jeffco Human Services) have accompanied the local police officers into those areas. The idea isn't to run them out, but rather help them out of the condition of homelessness that they currently find themselves in.

WAM - Witness as Ministry

Our church has been supporting a wonderful ministry for the past two years. When the Syrian refugee situation became a humanitarian crisis, we felt we needed to educate ourselves and our church about this terrible situation that was displacing thousands of people.

We invited Jean Bouchebel, director of Witness as Ministry, (WAM) to spend several days with us here at Rockland. Jean is a retired director of World Vision Lebanon. Upon retirement, he started a new ministry. He is a native of Lebanon and a strong Christian, but now resides in California. Jean spent his time here educating us about his ministry and on the situation in the Middle East.

WAM is a Christian ministry that was established to help many of the thousands of displaced Muslims who are living in camps in Lebanon, Iraq and Jordan. They have joined with other non-profits to bring food and supplies to the camps. They also have set up educational programs. A unique part of their ministry is their support of Christian pastors and aid workers in the camps. They have supplied Bibles and support to them as they minister to these people and have been successful in bringing many to Christ.

These Christians work under very difficult circumstances, yet are faithful to their mission. WAM has now established a program to bring these pastors and workers to Lebanon to give them a rest and to receive trauma debriefing from trained psychologists as many of them are experiencing burnout and fatigue. This gives them the strength to return to their positions in the field. We have given them \$8,000 in the past

TRAUMA TRAINING REPORT: She heard the sound of a mortar hit in the distance. A while later, she received a call from a friend asking if her husband was ok. She had no idea. She tried to call him but there was no answer. With her kids in tow, she started searching hospitals. At the third one, she dropped her son off at the front, and went to find parking. As she walked through the doors, her son, Michel, met here there. He had found his dad. He lay unconscious in a hospital bed, bleeding profusely. The shrapnel from a mortar that hit the front of the store they owned had caused a severe injury to his face and neck. Michel tried in vain to keep Ilham from going into the room. He wanted to spare her the image. Little did he know how God would forever change his mother through this heart-wrenching moment.

She picks up the story, "As soon as I saw him on that hospital bed, I heard God's voice. He said, 'This is the going to be the hardest pain you will face, but I will bring you joy you have never known' And in that moment," she says, "I believed in God. That is the moment I believed in Him."

In the midst of chaos, God met Ilham. In the midst of her deepest pain, God made her a promise, a promise she says He has fulfilled. The months that followed that night were difficult. It's still not easy, yet He gave her hope. Eventually, she found a church, and through them a support group for widows of war. Now, years later, llham helps lead this group. Now she walks alongside other widows who wrestle with grief and trauma.

This is the story of just one of the 22 Syrian Christians working with traumatized people in Aleppo who participated in our EMDR trauma training in Beirut last week. Although Aleppo is liberated, those who have survived are struggling with the emotional effects of all they have lived through. 20
