Imagine being SHIPWRECKED on an island with 165 kids, all whom are very excited to hear about Jesus Christ, the one who offers everything needed to rescue us. Well, that is exactly the experience that took place this year at Rockland during VBS. We, meaning 165 kids age 3 through 5th grade and 80 or more adults, spent the week of June 18-22 learning that Jesus is ready and waiting to rescue us in all of life's situations. Whether we are lonely, worry, struggle, do wrong, or feel powerless...Jesus Rescues!



No matter whether they were in the midst of Worship, involved in the Bible story activities, enjoying snack or playing some crazy game, anyone who walked by could tell the kids were having a great time. It was hard to tell at times who was having more fun, the kids or our awesome volunteers!



During the picnic on Friday, following the close of VBS, one of the parents commented, "I've sent my child to a number of VBS programs and I've never seen a group of volunteers, from the check-in crew to the crew guides, who look so engaged and really seem to love what they are doing!" She could not have said it better. Every one of our volunteers radiated God's love towards every kid, and to their parents.

Every year to help our kids understand what it means to share God's love with others, we partner with one of Rockland's outreach ministries. This year we partnered with Mean Street Ministries to raise the money to purchase school supplies and backpacks for kids in need. Our kids raised

over \$1500 and the Outreach Team contributed another \$1000. With this money, we filled 165 backpacks with the all of the school supplies needed for the kids who received them to start the school year off well.

A Mean Street staff member shared this note, "We had a boy entering the 2nd grade come in to pick out his backpack for school. When he entered the building, his shoulders were slumped over and he looked so discouraged. After he saw the backpacks to choose from and all of the school supplies that came with it, his demeanor changed. He left with his head held high, skipping out the door." What an incredible impact our VBS kids made in the life of this boy and so many others!

Memorial Services

Planning a Memorial Service is often the last thing that is on one's mind. It is our human nature to not want to have to think about death, nor what to do in the event of death if and when it happens. Whether we avoid planning all together, or do our best to put plans into place, the truth of the matter is, no one can ever, truly be prepared.

As a person who has experienced both spectrums of not planning because it was just too difficult to bear, to planning as best as I could, I can tell you that whatever the case may be, there is a true ministry in helping others during the most difficult day they will ever face. The day that finalizes the reality that their loved one has gone on home to be with Jesus and there is nothing that they can do to change anything. Whether one knows Christ or not, a Memorial Service Ministry can reach to the greatest depths of the soul. My goal in writing this is to help you understand the extent of ministry and service that goes on in a memorial service day.

Day you say? Yes day. Regardless of the size, shape or design of a memorial service, it takes a commitment to be there for that family for an entire day. The families that come to Rockland in search of help and support are looking for someone to carry them from start to finish. This is truly an extension of God's Plan and Will of ministry for the family. The ministry aspect can really begin several weeks prior to the day of the service to a few short days in an urgent request. During this time, we are helping the family organize every detail of the service and we are also reaching to people within the church for help in volunteering for these families.

The day of the service, our volunteers arrive two hours prior to the service start time to prepare the sanctuary, narthex, fellowship hall and kitchen. Greeters are stationed to begin welcoming the memorial service attendees. As the service is taking place, the fellowship hall is prepared with memoir items from the family and the food is prepared for serving. As the reception starts, volunteers begin cleaning of the sanctuary, narthex, etc. The heaviest amount of service is at the time of clean-up in the Fellowship Hall. This is the most important time that our volunteers are desperately needed for tear-down, trash removal, etc.

All this to say that our Rockland Volunteers are literally a gift from God! At the end of the day is when we hear the many ways our memorial service family was touched. There is no doubt you will be emotionally and physically exhausted. However, you will be headed home thanking the Lord above that you were part of His perfect plan. Thank you from the bottom of my heart to all those who have served in this capacity.




ROCK HOUSE

It was a pleasure watching over 40 adults eat good food downstairs, have conversation, and play a competitive volleyball mini-tournament, enjoying the Rock House as so many teens have for almost two decades.

The Rock House also has a new mentor coordinator on board. Steve Zimmerer, an Ohio native and one of thirteen children, is a retired public school teacher and coach of 27 years and moved to Evergreen in 2014 with his wife Jennifer and

their four children. Steve seized the opportunity to redirect his expertise and experience into serving our faith-based organization.



His enthusiasm for our cause is contagious with goals and visions for the mentoring program as well as a deep heart's desire to meet our teens where they're at and model the real relationship they can with Jesus Christ through mentorship.

We have upcoming trainings in August for our mentors! uptake in the amount of people who come through our doors this summer. We saw a lot of people who were traveling and a good amount of young people who were working for the raft companies. They all take advantage of our hot lunches on Thursdays and Fridays. We do need individuals or groups that could take the first or second week of the month to provide casseroles or a main course that would feed about 100 shoppers. The meals usually get dropped off on Wednesday and we warm them up on Thursday and Friday. If you are interested call Marty for more details.

Our big project this summer was the paving of our parking lot. This has been a goal of ours for years and it was completed in July! We thank all the people who contributed to make this dream come true. We also finished renovating a donated 23 foot, 1977 Dodge motorhome. It looks like a newly married couple, who are homeless are going to purchase it for a nominal fee. They are thrilled. The money collected will go toward housing other homeless.

We just got done handing out school supplies to some of the students in Clear Creek. We will be continuing our Totes for Hope program that supplies children with a backpack of food over the weekends. We also are supplying Senior Food Boxes to the elderly that are delivered to shut-ins by the Volunteers of America. We will also be supplying turkeys to our clients on both Thanksgiving and Christmas.

Once again we would like to thank Rockland for your support. August was Loaves and Fishes Month; we appreciate your contribution of dollar bills in the collection plate each Sunday. Our mission is to feed stomachs and souls. We would love to hear from you if you have an urge to serve. Remember, "When you do for the least of these, you do for me."

A Beloved Ragamuffin Project

Today we'd like to share about one of our guests who was dining at The Rising church. Mean Street feeds and ministers to our homeless friends in Arvada at The Rising Church two days per week. This particular guest is approximately 30 years old and the day that he came in he looked totally incapable of moving, eating or speaking. He had a blank stare and didn't seem to notice anyone. One of our volunteers sat next to him and asked him if he was having a bad day. He finally spoke and said it was the worst day of his life, but that he didn't want to talk about it. The volunteer said she'd check back with him, and about 45 minutes later she came back and told him that she didn't need to know what was bothering him, but she asked him if he would like God to be involved in the issue. He answered a strong "yes" and then shared that he was going to court the next day and was very scared about his future. The volunteer prayed that God would work and speak through the judge and that he would be full of mercy and forgiveness.

The next day the gentleman came back and was so happy because he had not been put in jail! He told the volunteer that he knew she was praying for him. He said "You saved my life! I have two children and you saved my life!" The volunteer shared that she just obeyed God and said a simple prayer, knowing that God is always listening and answering prayer. Her message to us is that we do not have to try to be spiritual giants. In simplicity, we can pray and trust the Lord and He will bring the miracles!

Again, this year Rockland sponsored a trip to Arusha, Tanzania June 4-15, 2018 in which 20 members of our church met with our sister church and mission outreach partners. Varied and exciting activities included: visits to the Neo Natal unit at Arusha Lutheran Medical Center, to ALMC Hospice where they prayed for the success of the hospice program with the staff, to Plaster House, to more than 36 sponsored secondary and post graduate students, to Ilboru and Ngaramtoni Children's Centers, to Faraja Orphanage, and to Selian Hospital.

While there the mission crew also painted the dormitories at Ilboru Primary School, presented Milky Way cows to recipients and attended Ilboru church service. As a follow-up for the mission trip, Rocklanders were offered a safari trip to the Serengeti, Tarangire, Ngorongoro Crater and Arusha National Park. With such an inspiring experience, several members of the Mission Team expressed their feelings as to this memorable trip.

Louise Decker: Each day was a new experience and different adventure. The smiles and joy from our Christian brothers and sisters were amazing. We have so much and they have far less but are filled with joy.

When you think about it, isn't most of our distress in life caused by a loss.

Your Stephen Minister can walk beside you and listen to your concerns, frustration, and depression over the way life is treating you right now. Your Stephen Minister will provide an outlet for you to voice your feelings. They will listen, they will focus on your feelings, they will be a supportive presence and they will share faith, hope and love.

Therefore encourage one another and build up each other, as indeed you are doing.

And all of this will be totally confidential. The congregation will not know anything about your problems and the fact that you have a Stephens Minister for they are sworn to secrecy.

Dawn Wanser, who handles Congregational Care for Rockland, shared the following experience with Chimes: "Today, I had the opportunity to minister to a young man, bless his heart, who was traveling on foot all the way from Kearney, Nebraska roughly 350-400 miles from Denver. He was only 23 years old and stopped at Rockland for prayer. He stated that the Lord told him to come inside to find comfort and peace. I don't believe that he had a place to lay his head but was so seeking the confirmation that God was with him.

Interestingly, he never asked for food or money only the gallon of water that was sitting in my office. His name is Daniel. He shared that he wasn't sure what God was going to do with his life. He accepted Christ three years ago and it has been a difficult road for him. Daniel made a comment about the fact that he felt we might all know more than him being a church. I assured him that this wasn't the case by any means and that it is all level ground for each of us at the foot of the cross.

What I found most remarkable is that though I have a roof over my head, a ministry and a glimpse of what God is doing in my life, the worries, questions, doubts and even praises that young Daniel shared were really no different than mine. It was like I was hearing my own stories and cries to God just by listening to him.

I had a vision after Daniel left today. A picture of all of us in a marathon with hundreds of people on the sideline cheering us on. This was no ordinary marathon this was a representation of our running the race for Christ. The people on the sideline are the body of Christ, the angels of the Lord, the Holy Spirit and our Lord and Savior Jesus at the finish line. Today Rockland took part in Daniel's marathon, cheering him on, letting him know that Christ is right around the corner waiting for him and to keep going. Whose marathon are you part of today? Pay close attention, you're running in the same shoes." When I am employed in serving others, I do not look upon myself as conferring favors, but as paying debts. I have received much kindness from men to whom I shall never have an opportunity of making the least direct returns; and numberless mercies from God, who is infinitely above being benefited by our services. Those kindnesses from men I can, therefore, only return on their fellow-men, and I can only show my gratitude for those mercies from God by a readiness to help His other children."

Elders' Corner

The Elders met three times since our last update. We begin our meetings spending a significant amount of time in an elder-led devotional and prayer asking our Lord for wisdom and guidance as we seek to serve Him in His church.

Aside from the normal business matters such as approving minutes and financial reports, the larger issues we dealt with were:

- As you may remember, at the last congregational meeting the congregation approved setting up Historic Rockland Church as a separate entity from Rockland Community Church. We are making great progress and have appointed Dick Parks and Peter Miterko to the newly organized governing board of our Historic Rockland Church. They will do a fantastic job leading this ministry to our community!
- Each elder and their respective ministry teams are to be leading a game or activity at the Rockland State Fair. Many thanks to Elder Linda Smith and her team for getting this organized and helping create an event that is always a very big success!
- Wire instructions for funds to support our recent Tanzania team's trip were changed by, what the church believed was, our local representative on the ground. In fact, it was a clever scam to intercept the funds by computer hackers. The result was a loss of over \$20 thousand, leaving the trip in jeopardy. Elder Steve Hannah, working with the Tanzania team and Patrick, our local contact, was able to renegotiate the costs of the trip to a near breakeven for our partners there. The balance of the costs were covered by several generous donors and some funds from the Tanzania Action Committee and the Outreach Team. Though these types of issues are hard to prevent entirely, the elders have been working with the Operations Team and the Outreach team to implement stronger operational controls and clearer operational policies to ensure nothing like this happens in the future.

 We would like to thank those generous individuals willing to support this important ministry of Rockland.
- We have spent considerable time in discussion of ways to fund a more consistently good second service. Issues in this area surround the need for modest improvements in the sound system and the need for a strong musical team focused on the second service. Red Rocks Church has made the decision to close its Evergreen campus. We believe we can attract some of those members to Rockland if we can consistently deliver an excellent contemporary worship
- experience as we do with the traditional first service.
- We continue to work through Pastor Gribnitz's goals. This year, they are centered in three primary areas; Grow the Church (Worship); Grow the People (Discipleship Groups); Grow the Staff (The Team).

We finish each meeting with individual elders praying for specific Rockland members or friends who are struggling with health or other serious issues.
