The Elders meet at least monthly, and often more frequently. We enjoy a close working relationship with the Pastors and staff. If you are new to Rockland, or if you feel disconnected on account of COVID, we want to help integrate you into our great Rockland family!

These and other steps to get everyone connected are a top priority.

Joyce Dunbar, the Elder who stewards our Care Ministry will be working closely with our new Care Pastor Paul Lucks, to ensure our Care Ministry will be stronger than ever.

For decades faithful volunteers have worked in our Sunday School and Vacation Bible School. Many of their students went on to become members of Rockland, as did their children. A dozen volunteers regularly showed up to get Chimes out the door and in the mail. Operations volunteers worked to keep the Church grounds (and often the interior) beautiful and tidy. Our volunteer ranks have been depleted by COVID. Pastor Jim and the Elders are committed to rebuilding our volunteer ranks as quickly as possible as we emerge from the pandemic.

Historic Rockland Church and Cemetery

Hello Rockland, it is good to visit with you again. I wanted to share some items on what is going on at Historic Rockland Church.

We put in a new gravel road in the middle of Rockland Cemetery. This is meant to give all visitors easy access to graves and memorials which ware difficult to reach. The road was always planned on our maps and it was time to make it reality. If you have a grave or memorial that you want to visit feel free to drive up the road. There is a turnaround at the top.

We have had a wedding in January and we are available for small events with COVID restrictions.

We are taking reservations for burial plots and for memorial plaques and fence post memorial plaques for anyone that you would like to honor or remember someone. special. Burial and wedding guidelines are available with details on cost and procedure.

We still have on our calendar to hold Memorial Day and Christmas programs and this is difficult to plan with COVID restrictions. We will let you know.

Capital improvements for a restroom, storage area, picket fence replacements, kiosk for cemetery locations, water retention, and waste water disposal are still planned. The capital fund raiser we planned to launch was put on hold du to COVID. This is a terrible time to ask for money. We have a planned information folder that we hope to release when all returns to normal. We are currently working on rezoning with Jefferson county to allow these improvements.

Last, come visit us. It is a perfect outing even if you can't get out of the car. I have keys and would love to open access to the inside of the church. It is a beautiful, rustic and pioneer just like it was in 1879. Our location is 24225 Rockland Road which intersects US 40 frontage road about 1 1/2 miles east from Rockland Community Church. Come spring you may want to adopt a grave to clean and care for. We are the historical beginning of Rockand Community Church.




A Church is Born


Colorado became part of Kansas territory in 1854. The territorial capital was located near the present town of Topeka Kansas, but little was known about the western end of the territory that was populated by wild miners and Indians. A young Lieutenant Lucian Hunter Ralston who graduated from Centre College in Kentucky in 1852 was sent to investigate the western part of the territory. As part of his trip, he came up what we now know as Mount Vernon Canyon, and he fell in love with the canyon. He returned to fight in the Civil War, but later came back to found one of the major families in the Eastern part of Colorado.

Colorado territory was created in 1861 when the state of Kansas was created as part of the Kansas Nebraska act. No schools or churches were located in Mount Vernon Canyon at that time. In fact, there was little development in much of Colorado. The territorial legislature did create a school system in the sense that they defined school districts throughout the state. They did not however build schools. That was left to the individual communities. Mount Vernon Canyon was designated as school district 13 but there was no school.

The Mount Vernon Canyon area was surveyed in 1867 soon after the Civil War ended. Since the land was now surveyed people such as miners, ranchers, and farmers begin to move into the area.



Some of the early settlers became well known and famous in the state, such as Katherine Lee Craig whose family bought property that we now know of as the Katherine Craig Denver Mountain Park. The family arrived in 1870 when there was no church and no school.



Several people in the area got together and decided to build a school in 1874. The school was referred as District 13 school.

Soon after that what was to be the congregation of the Rockland historic Church began to meet at the school for services. The congregation of Rockland Church can be dated back to 1874.

Colorado became a state in 1876. With that development came further interest in developing a church.

Construction was started in 1879 for what today is known as the Historic Rockland Church.

A carpenter was engaged to build the church for \$200 using material that was available locally. The windows and the door were shipped to Colorado from Missouri by

The church was dedicated on January 10th of 1880.

In a column in the Golden Globe for August 28, 1880 that had the heading County correspondence, the School board gave a name to the district when they named the school district Rockland School District. The Church was also named Rockland Church.

The community finally had a church! -Sid Platt

During the past year of COVID we have stayed very busy with one-on-one contacts with mentors and mentees and virtual tutoring.

When COVID hit, many of the parents of our kids were pushed out of work. Since many live in hotels and trailers they didn't have a good way to cook. We were hearing that our families needed to be fed. So our staff felt moved by the Holy Spirit to provide hot food to our Rock House family. During March, April, May, our devoted staff, planned, purchased and cooked

70+ hot dinners (3 times per week) and delivered to the families of our kids. We couldn't have done this service without the help of Rockland Church which donated extra money to help us buy all this food.

The families were so appreciative since they were having trouble getting unemployment and didn't get COVID checks (they are off the radar). But the best part was that each family allowed our staff to pray with them every time a dinner was delivered. For many of these families this was the first time they were talking to God.....a REAL blessing to all.







Also, the Rock House has teamed up with Kitchen One-for-One ministry to serve hot tacos, out of the Taco Truck, the first Thursday of the month during winter and spring to the deserving folks in Clear Creek County.

As you can see from the pictures below, we put up lights, light a fire, have good music and Hot Cocoa to go along with the magnificent food.

In the past Thursday events, we served well over 100 to 150 meals per night as folks came by in their cars and we served them through the window. We had kids from the Rock House, families from Loaves and Fishes (food bank across the street), Young Life Kids and neighbors. It was a blessing to the entire community.

Many Thursdays we have 5 to 6 Mentor/Mentee pairs enjoying Tacos while they met (socially distant) inside the Rock House (we are doing mentoring one-on-one now as we move through this Covid time). Love is still on the menu!

We loved it. The Kids Loved it and I am pretty sure Jesus Loved it!! All in His Name.





Blessings to you Rockland Congregation, and thank you for the continued support of the Rock House ministry as we reach out to kids that are not being reached otherwise. Another note of thanks: because of the generosity of Rockland, we have contracted with a painter to paint and refurbish the outside of the Rock House and replace rotten boards this spring. It hasn't had attention like this for over 20 years!!

As for our services, we are still visiting the motels on east and west Colfax each week, we are still serving a hot meal Mondays through Thursdays in our café, we still open our food bank each Tuesday and Thursday, AND we are excited to announce that we are almost ready to open our new service – showers for our clients here at Mean Street! We have had wonderful volunteers working to renovate the showers that were already here in the gymnasium, also adding a new hot water heater for the showers as well as hookups for a washer and dryer! And we could not have done this without our very generous donors who have provided funds for this endeavor!

The washer and dryer that we are installing will not be for client use, but for the many towels that we will be using each time the showers are open. We are currently in search of a washer/dryer set to fill this need. We are looking for a top load washer, possibly an older model that still fills with plenty of water and a gas dryer. If you know of a set that is in great working order and not too expensive, please give us a call! Thank you!



Evergreen Christian Outreach

Hard to believe it's been a year since the lockdown started. As an organization we made the choice not to close the food bank because we felt it was more important than ever to be there for our community. First we went to the food box method, where the shoppers would get whatever was in the box, whether they wanted it or not. Then we tried having them shop under canopies on the lawn. And then through luck of having a wrap around porch, we moved the food bank shopping on the porch. We had a system where we would wheel out the shelves every morning and put them back into Bancroft in the evening. And there we stayed until October 2020.



During that time the stories that we heard from our shoppers were heartbreaking. Many had good jobs and life was going along just great. But COVID 19 had other plans for them, they got laid off, or lost their jobs completely. They would choke up when explaining that they never thought they would ever be in the position to have to come to get help. They had not planned for a pandemic, and neither had EChO. When the weather started getting cooler EChO knew we had to do something different. The old building we were in was not made for social distancing and we really did not want to go back to the boxes. So we didn't, EChO purchased a building instead.

Now all of EChO, except for the Resale shop is at our new location of 27888 Meadow Dr. in Evergreen. A few blocks away from our old location We were able to move in on a weekend and have the food bank open the following week, as well as client services and our Job Center. We still have work to do in the building, yet we are so grateful to begin a new chapter at EChO. We very much appreciate all of your support.

What a ride it's been! Loaves and Fishes had to make a lot of changes during this pandemic. Thanks to God and our wonderful volunteers and donors, we have been able to thrive. We only had to close one week to readjust, find some younger volunteers and decide to set up a roundabout in our parking lot and hand out pre-packed food boxes to our shoppers. The immediate demand for food went up by 30 per cent but we were able to handle the increase need. We were worried about our donations from churches and our our other income streams decreasing but God provided. Rockland and others kept up with their support, other grants became available and people we had never heard from wanted to help our mission. We are now close to being back to normal. We are aiming at June first to be serving meals again and having normal shopping procedures back in place.

During the crisis we had a building project in place. We built out our back room into a beautiful director's apartment with a kitchenette and a modern bathroom with laundry. There were numerous hiccups during construction, as always. We finished construction by the end of 2020 just in time for our new director and his new bride to move in. Our new director is Taylor Billingsley. Taylor and his wife, Noel live on site and serve as the property managers. He graduated from a small Baptist university north of Austin, Texas. They both have always had an interest in serving Christ and are already making changes at Loaves and Fishes and are teaching Bible classes for middle schoolers, at our neighbor, The Rock House. We are so glad God sent this couple to us and are excited for their new life together in the mountains of Colorado!

We have learned many things during this pandemic. The main thing is that life is always going to throw challenges at us. It is during these times of trial that draws us closer to God. It strengthens our relationship with him and builds our faith. We at Loaves and Fishes are just so glad he was at our side during this crisis and believe that better things are just ahead for our mission. 
Rockland Volunteers at "Hands Of The Carpenter"


