

## Why and What is Advent

Until recently I've always wondered, "What is Advent and why do we call it that?" The answer partly lies in the word which describes the season itself. Advent is our Anglicized version of the Latin word *Adventus*. *Adventus* is the Latin word for the Greek word *Parousia*. Both words mean *Arrival* or *Coming*. The double meaning in this idea of *Coming* is both that Christ **was** coming into the world with his incarnation and that he **is** coming back one day. Historically, the church has spent two weeks reflecting on both seminal and biblical doctrines, but now Advent has become an extended practice for reflection.

Here is a meditation worth reflecting on: Knowing that God Himself came into the world to live like us, and to die for us. How **was** and **is** His Advent shaping your view of the holiday season?

I'd like to challenge each one of you to consider this Advent as a holy time to reflect on why Christ came and what it means that he will come again. Do you realize that Jesus came for you? To show you your need for a savior? To show you the love of the Father? To give you a past hope that forever extends into eternity? Take this time to contemplate how Christ came and will come so that he can forever be *Emmanuel*, namely, God with us.

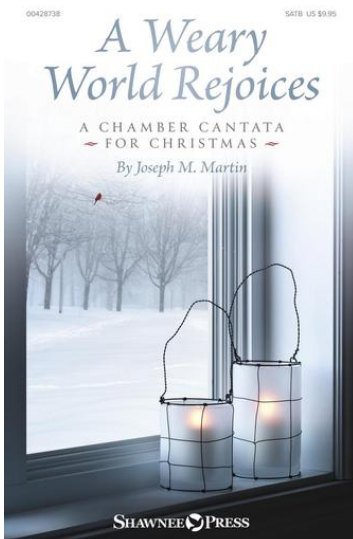

### ***Rockland's Recent Youth Activities***

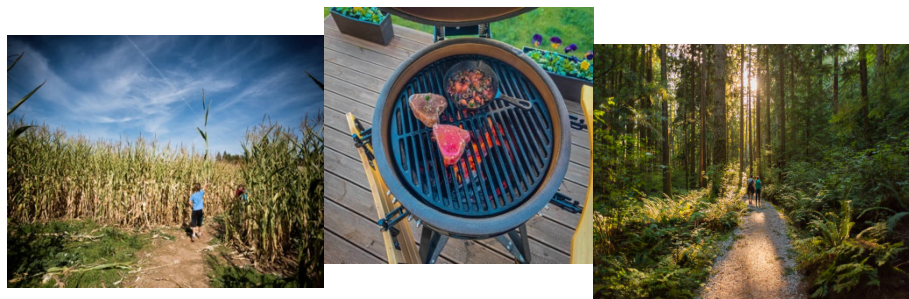

Here are some facts on the blues:

Feeling blue is NOT a normal part of aging. Surprisingly, over 58% of older adults think it is. Late-life depression affects millions of people, but only 10% of these ever ask for help.

People often do not talk about how sad, lonely, or scared they are. Before you say "I'm fine", ask yourself if you feel lonely, sad, restless, irritable, or very tired and slowed down.

Individuals often do not ask for help from family, friends, or clergy. Having the blues can then turn into a chronic, sad feeling that weighs you down from enjoying all the blessings that life has to offer.

Finding help when you are feeling blue, for whatever reason, is very easy. Rockland is a Stephen Ministry church, which means you can access a highly trained, caring, and compassionate individual for a supportive, one-on-one relationship. The confidential interactions that you have with your Stephen Minister can buoy up your spirits.

Doesn't Jesus want you to have a life that is worth living to the fullest, in His name? A Stephen Minister relationship can make a meaningful difference in how you cope with a wide range of life issues: grief, chronic pain or illness, divorce, unemployment, family stresses and yes, even feeling blue for no particular reason.

## Tanzania Action Committee Report

Four members of the Tanzania Action Committee went to Arusha, Tanzania this past August to visit our ministry partners who work alongside us to support our efforts there. The team had the opportunity to visit three secondary and three post-secondary schools and meet 48 girls who are sponsored by faithful members of Rockland's congregation. They also had the opportunity to visit two rural communities and churches in Maasai land, Moita, and Lendikinya. With the help of our brother and partner Patrick Ngala Olemong'i, 125 eye tests were given and 73 pairs of reading glasses were given out. In addition, 300 Bibles were distributed, and 11 baby goats were shared with families. The team was also able to visit the Ilboru church and primary school founded by our brother Pastor Abel, as well as tour the Ilboru Orphanage, the Arusha Lutheran Medical Center, and meet with the Selian Hospice team, all of which are supported by Rockland's Tanzania Ministry.

Mission trips to Arusha are essential to our ministry efforts in Tanzania. The partnerships we have with the people on the ground there are greatly strengthened by meeting in person, and members of the committee as well as members of the congregation at large get to participate in the ongoing projects and missions that we have there. We are planning another trip for July of 2023 that will be open to any member of the congregation who would be interested in witnessing and participating in the important work we support in Tanzania. There is also a short safari experience at the end of the trip for those who are interested.

October was the ministry month for Tanzania at Rockland, and the dollar bills collected in the offering plates will support our ministry. Additionally, we had two fundraising Sundays in October where we were able to share with the congregation about the recent mission trip and start an interest list for the upcoming one in 2023. Money was raised to purchase animals (goats and donkeys) to support the Maasai families that have been chosen to receive these life-changing resources that the villagers so depend on. We were also able to engage sponsors for seven new girls who will be able to receive a secondary and post-secondary education not otherwise possible. We are grateful to God and to Rockland Church for the continued support of this important ministry.

### Engaging the Culture through a Biblical Lens

The Disciple Ministry hosted another successful Rockland Talks, the third in our series, featuring Philip Yancy, speaking on the topic of *Engaging the Culture through a Biblical Lens*. We had approximately 160 people attend from inside and outside Rockland.



We started Rockland Talks with the premise that we wanted to help you deepen your biblical worldview and help you "*See the World the Way God Sees it.*" Think of Rockland Talks as having today's newspaper headlines in one hand and the Bible in the other. We wanted to facilitate a conversation that isn't as easily addressed during Sunday mornings with an interactive Q&A session following the guest speaker's presentation. Rockland Talks represents the intersection of politics, culture, and religion. We host two events per year with insight and commentary from Christian speakers, writers, and thinkers.

Rockland Talks is part of our Discipleship Ministry and fits within our overall purpose to:

1. Go out and make disciples of Jesus Christ
2. Help equip the saints and mature you as Christians to advance and defend the faith with your families, in your communities, and in the public square

Philip Yancy gave prepared comments for about 45 minutes followed by a 15-minute Q&A session. His talk anchored on four key themes made more relevant given the context of our divided country:

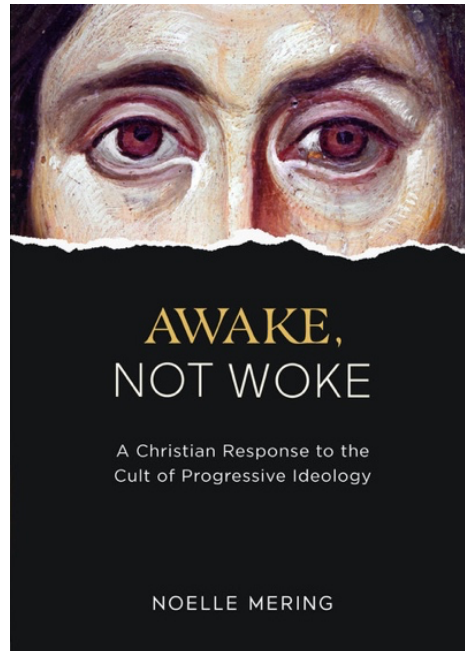
1. Don't confuse any nation with the Kingdom of God
2. A Church should resemble an urgent care center more than a country club
3. Christians fight with the weapons of grace
4. We can learn to communicate with those who see the world differently

The real-world application of the above guidance was further elaborated upon by Yancy and he encouraged us as individuals and Church leaders to:

1. Place your relationships and your Christian faith above tribal politics and be a light in a world of darkness. There should be a clear line of demarcation as to how Christians live and behave versus the rest of the world. It is better to have the Church and State separate because, historically, when the Church joins the State, it is usually the State that wins to the detriment of the citizens and the Church. Instead, the Church is to be the conscience of the State.
2. Go out into your local communities and serve others that are not like yourself and who are not part of your Church. You are to serve others not because they are Christian but because you are a Christian.
3. Love our enemies, real and perceived, just as Jesus loves us. That is, by definition, a grassroots bottoms-up effort.

4. When engaging in conversation with others that hold a diametrically different opinion than you, seek clarity and understanding not agreement. Instead of trying to convert or “win the argument” simply focus on intensive and intentional listening and hearing their story.

Our next Rockland Talks is scheduled for Wednesday evening, May 31, 2023, featuring Noelle Mering. Noelle is a Fellow at the Washington DC-based think tank, the Ethics and Public Policy Center. She is the author of the book, *Awake Not Woke: A Christian Response to the Cult of Progressive Ideology*. She is the founder and editor of the website Theology of the Home and co-author of the book *Theology of the Home*. She writes on culture, politics, and religion and has published for National Review, The Federalist, The American Mind, and Catholic World Report. Noelle has an MA in philosophy and is the wife and mother of six children in Southern California.

# Rockland Romania Mission

## A Fifteen-Year Success Story

As reported last Spring, Rockland has had a huge impact in different areas in Romania. In the early 2000s, the Romanian mission work involved fundraising for St. Mary's daycare center, a facility for developmentally challenged adults. What started as a dream project in Cluj materialized into reality in a system unaccustomed to supporting this element of society. Rockland ultimately assisted with the construction of an entirely new facility, complete with classrooms, a kitchen, and a chapel.

The most lasting mission work was in partnership with World Vision Romania (WVR), sponsoring students in their pursuit of a high school degree. Thanks to the generous support from Rockland members and friends over the years, the program "I Want to be in the 9<sup>th</sup> Grade" has served over 200 students. Approximately 140 have since graduated from high school, with the majority advancing to the university level. Others have gone on to trade schools or taken well-paying jobs they otherwise would not have been able to obtain.

With the impending closure of the WVR office in Cluj, the Romanian Task Force had to make the difficult decision to discontinue the sponsorship program as it has been structured. To commemorate and celebrate the successes seen over the years, Rockland hosted visitors from Romania this past September. The contingent from Cluj included Vali Sabau (Office Manager of WVR), Cristina Constantinescu (former WVR program coordinator), and former students Alis Baran and Bianca Cosma. Our visitors participated in the Worship Services on September 18 and had the opportunity to enjoy touring outlying areas such as Grand Lake and Colorado Springs. Bob and Kitty Ehret were instrumental in Rockland's participation from the outset and have remained dedicated leaders throughout the program. Additionally, Lynne Feldkamp served as Co-Chair of RTF and was actively involved in hosting this recent visit.

Following the Romanians' visit to Colorado, the Ehrets traveled to Cluj to further the transition. On October 8th they were hosted by Vali and Cristina at Livada Cultural Center, a rural village in Cluj County. A breakfast gathering was attended by 20 current and graduated students from the scholarship program over the past 15 years. The students thanked Rockland for its heartfelt generosity and the positive impact it has had on themselves and their families. Bob reports that "hugs and tears prevailed!" behalf of the Romanian Taskforce, we again extend our appreciation to everyone who has been a part of the Romanian Mission through the years. We hope the knowledge that your financial contributions, letters and other means of encouragement have made a significant impact half a world away.

Then slowly the employees began to show up.

That night we all celebrated how we had handled the situation. However, we still had a problem. It was Christmas Eve, and we still did not have an open highway up north for my brother and his family to drive home to Greeley.

Little Mick was not having a good Christmas Eve. So, we went together and came up with a stocking filled with goodies for Christmas morning and we called a friend who stepped into our drama beautifully. He called Mick and told him that he was Santa Claus and that he had left gifts for Mick at his home so they wouldn't have to haul them all that way. He assured Mick that there were many packages and as soon as he got home, he could open them but, in the meantime, Mick should just be happy with all the family around him.

We all gathered together that night and read the Christmas story from the book of Luke. We talked about Baby Jesus and how special our Christmas Eve was.

After that, three-year-old Mick seemed to thrive on our celebration of Christmas and had a good time on Christmas Eve and Christmas morning. They finally were able to head home later in the day when the highway had been plowed.

Some have special-needs diets and all are over the age of 75. One client is 98 years young!*

*I have become certified as a palliative care provider: going into homes with food, and supplies and providing personal care and companionship. Many times, we are the only link to the outside world.*

*Two of my clients are on a very fixed budget. I am not always able to shop for all their needs with the money provided, especially with the price of groceries (and everything) going up and up! When I discovered Loaves & Fishes, I was so relieved to find that the quality of the food met my standards as a nutritionist and I was able to secure needed supplies for organic, whole foods diets which are critical to healthy aging, and to provide for my clients with special-needs diets.*

*Loaves & Fishes not only saves time and money for my clients. They also provide a healthy takeout lunch! This is so important for the days that I am away shopping. I cannot also be present to provide a homemade meal and yet, I am able to secure supplies for the week and get to their home in time to serve the homemade healthy lunch provided by Loaves & Fishes, including a much-appreciated homemade dessert.*

*My 98-year-old client is feeling so spry these days, that she enjoys coming along to meet the volunteers and staff that provide such wonderful things for me to fix and for her to enjoy. The staff and volunteers are always so happy to greet her and answer her questions. She feels so honored and loves expressing her appreciation in person in a safe environment. Nutrition is an important component of her success, allowing her to stay in her beloved home with her cat.*

*The couple that I care for are also extremely grateful for the food, soap, and paper goods. They are especially excited by the produce. Although they are no longer able to tend the garden plots they have worked for several decades, they still love fresh organic produce!*

*All my clients expressed awe! They are uplifted, knowing that there is a community of people who care about them and others like them.*

*Personally, I want you to know, my "supply stop" at Loaves & Fishes makes my job easy and fun! I was really struggling to provide what I know to be critical to the health and wellbeing of my clients. Thank you for the much-needed relief. We can do this, together!*
