Student Ministries

On a Wednesday morning in June, Pastor Aaron and Pastor Robby accompanied six Rockland students to Christ's Body Ministries in Denver. Their motto is *We Feed, Clothe, Heal and Share the Gospel.* They have a "Caravan of Care" that provides warm meals, hygiene products, clothing, and pastoral care to those in need.

The students helped to prepare and wrap 620 burritos to be delivered to those who are homeless and in need. The burritos serve as nourishment as well as open



the door for conversations about Jesus Christ. The students also spent some time sorting and organizing the donated clothing items to be delivered to those in need.

At the end of our service, they heard a very powerful testimonial from a gentleman who used to live on the streets. He has broken his addictions and now works on the staff at Christ's Body. All in all, it was a great time of service and fellowship that will leave an impact on this group for a long time.

Tanzanian Action Committee

As you read this, the 2023 Rockland Church Mission Team is making final preparations for its July trip to Arusha, Tanzania. Joining the trip this year are Scott, Grace, and Anaya Kern, Sonya Ostrander, Diane Wein, Steve Hannah, Nancy Clement, and Katie Bellott.

Our ongoing missions in Tanzania are the Christian education of young women to empower them to live independent and Godly lives. We also make livestock placements in rural areas to improve access to water and nutrition, especially among families with young children and widows. Our longstanding partnership with Ilboru Church allows us to support them in their precious and vital role in supporting their community. The cornerstone of each of these missions is *Relationship*. *Relationship* allows us to both demonstrate the love of Christ through service and also to encourage the Tanzanians we touch in their relationship with Christ.

As an extension of those relationships, and with the help of Ilboru Church, we are able to access areas of the Arusha region where many people have not heard the message of Salvation through Jesus. We will be conducting two "Eyeglass Clinics" on the outskirts of Arusha. These clinics are open to all in the region. The format is for each person's vision to be tested to see if they would benefit from a pair of simple reading glasses. Then, they are asked if they would like to hear the message of Salvation through Christ. The goal is for each person to first hear, then accept, the message of Salvation. Bibles(in Swahili) are gifted to all who would like to read God's word for themselves.

Please pray for the 2023 Tanzania Mission Team, for the physical safety of the team, and most importantly, that they fulfill God's will for them during their time with His children in Arusha, Tanzania.

Summer Reading Possibility



Rockland Talks

Awake Not Woke

The Disciple Ministry hosted another Rockland Talks, the fourth in our series, featuring Noelle Mering, speaking on the topic of *A Christian's Response to the Woke Movement*. We had a great evening with approximately 210 people attending from inside and outside Rockland.



Noelle Mering, a Fellow at the Washington DC-based think tank, the Ethics and Public Policy Center, author of the book, *Awake Not Woke: A Christian Response to the Cult of Progressive Ideology,* founder and editor of the website "Theology of the Home" and co-author of the book *Theology of the Home*, gave prepared comments for about 45 minutes followed by brief Q&A. She thoughtfully, but directly described the status of the "woke" movement, which traces its roots back to Marxist ideology, as anti-Christian, anti-family, and anti-American. While Marxism framed the power struggle as one of economics between the bourgeoisie and the proletariat, "wokeism" now defines its power struggle as societal oppression along the lines of gender, race, and sexuality. She explained how the woke movement is continuing the "long march through the institutions" and that its goal is not truth but power, division, and control. History, she said, shows us that because the movement cannot tolerate dissent, its trajectory is censorship, violent enforcement, and cultural totalitarianism. Christianity is the antithesis of what the woke movement is doing today. Christianity's goal is unity, restoration, love, and acceptance. Noelle's talk is anchored on five key themes:

- 1. Christianity defines us by what we *share*, our common humanity, our brotherhood/sisterhood, and our love of God. The woke movement defines us by our *divisions*, hatred, and contempt.
- 2. Christians are called to spread the *good news* that we are loved by God. A woke activist is called to spread the *bad news* that you are oppressed by an external force and deeply hated and to rub raw the sores of discontent leading to disharmony.
- 3. Christianity asks us to look inwardly and reflect on our own sin and take *accountability* for our own behavior. The woke ideology asks us to be a *victim* and perpetual accuser leading to helplessness as all my successes are due to privilege and all my failures are due to systemic oppression.
- 4. Christians believe God created Man and Woman as distinct yet complementary, uphold the sanctity of marriage, and cherish the *intrinsic value* of every person comprised of body and soul. The woke movement insists that your body, your biology, and sex is *meaningless* leading to transgenderism, homosexuality, and abortion which ends in instability, confusion, and dehumanization.
- Because sin is insatiable, the woke movement will continue its downward trajectory becoming more radical and more aggressive in its pursuit to normalize sin. There is no limiting principle. It will seek to corrupt our children, to remove any last remnants of purity and innocence in our society.

Looking ahead, Noelle sees three categories of action: We need to heal, we need to awaken, and we need to stop the "woke" movement. Noelle posited that the re-establishment of the fatherhood role, as

protector, provider, and shepherd is one key pathway to renewal. She offered several real-world applications, and she encouraged us as individuals and church leaders to:

- 1. Be a good friend and co-worker to others to build relationships and community.
- 2. Stand for the truth knowing that you may suffer for it.
- 3. Engage in the dialogue with grace, dignity, and respect, and seek clarity and understanding.
- 4. Start and end with prayer.

We started Rockland Talks with the premise that we wanted to help Christians deepen their biblical worldview and help us all, "See the World the Way God Sees it." Rockland Talks represents the intersection of politics, culture, and faith. As Christians, we recognize that everything from ideology to culture to values is based on one's view of God. The proverbial "fork in the road" where Americans parted ways can be fundamentally and finally traced back to one's view of God. What a society thinks about God matters as does their corresponding culture of ideas. That is your worldview. Given this context, we host two events per year to bring insight and commentary from Christian speakers, writers, and thinkers.

Rockland Talks is part of our Discipleship Ministry and fits within our overall purpose to:

- 1. Go and make disciples of Jesus Chris (Matt 28).
- 2. Help equip and mature the saints (Eph 4:12) to advance and defend the faith with your families, in your communities, and in the public square.

Our next Rockland Talks is scheduled for Thursday evening, **October 19, 2023**, featuring best-selling author, Christian Philosopher, and Apologist, Dr. Douglas Groothius from Denver Seminary.

Our goal is to inform, inspire and connect the people to our community of Rockland Church.

Rockland Testimonial

I was born to devoted God-loving parents. My early memories of around the age of three included, beyond nighttime prayer, sitting at the dining table with Mother reading the 23rd Psalm to me daily. With an uncluttered mind I soon could "read" it to her. It began to give meaning to the picture on our living room wall of Christ praying at Gethsemane. I loved singing *Jesus Loves Me* and *Jesus Loves the Little Children*, as it gave meaning to my picture book of the children sitting and kneeling at the feet of Jesus.

The innocence and faith of a child! I knew Jesus was always with me. Each night I gave room for Him to lie down next to me in bed. I dreamed about Him at night. At the age of five when my sister was born and I was excitedly given the news, "You have a little sister," I confidently said, "I know. I asked God for a little sister."

Such a beautiful foundation my parents had given me in growing up with Jesus!



My growth in "knowing Him" to a deeper level came many years later. My dog, Heidi disappeared. When you live alone, your dog is often your everything! I was devastated, yet through the pain and condolences of many friends I continued to reply, "I have faith that she'll come back." My pleading prayers cried out nightly and throughout the day, yet I kept saying, "I have faith." One night, after several months, my cry was louder and more accusing that God was not answering my prayer. I heard very firmly my Lord say, "Your prayer is not in alignment with my will." I realized that my faith was in what *I wanted*, not faith in my Father's will. I cried, asking forgiveness and that Heidi, wherever she was, would be well taken care of.

That was the beginning of a beautiful plan in the making. Just as Heidi disappeared another pup was being born. After several failed attempts in adopting a pup, God guided me to the home of the final pup and the runt of a litter of 7. I fell in love with Baylea the moment I picked her up. Although she appeared in every way to be healthy, I had a gut feeling that something was not right. Upon taking her in for a wellness check a week later, it was discovered that she needed heart surgery. The vet was amazed that I had picked up on her "illness" and said, upon completion of surgery that, on a scale of 1-6 the hole in her heart was a six. She would not have lived beyond another three days. She is now an aging but healthy 16-year-old pup! AND, five years later, to the month, I received a call from a lady that had found Heidi living more than 100 miles away! God had it all in place for a healthy Baylea and a happy Heidi now living together with me.

As the return of Heidi opened a closer relationship with God, it was the beginning of His peeling back layers in the revelation of who He is and where He wants me to be. There are so many beautiful things that happened during Heidi's absence that would NOT have taken place had she not disappeared.

I had finally released my faith *in my will* to the **faith of my Father.** He knows. He never lets me down.

And now, as I grow nearer to God, I still lie down and ask Him to snuggle next to me. He does! I still sing. Oh, how I love to sing hymns!! But I now sing, *Jesus KNOWS me, this I LOVE*!

These Mean Street Ministry volunteers are bringing hope and prayer to individuals and families who are experiencing homelessness. Rockland Elder and Mean Street Ministry Manager Todd Graber has been leading the evening outreach trips for more than a decade. "Street Ministry is not what you think it is. Slavishly quoting scripture, or memorizing lines aren't the best ways to reach people," says Graber. Last year, through this outreach, Mean Street Ministry saw more than 60 individuals accept Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior! "Listening is the most



important way to illustrate your love for them," he explains.
