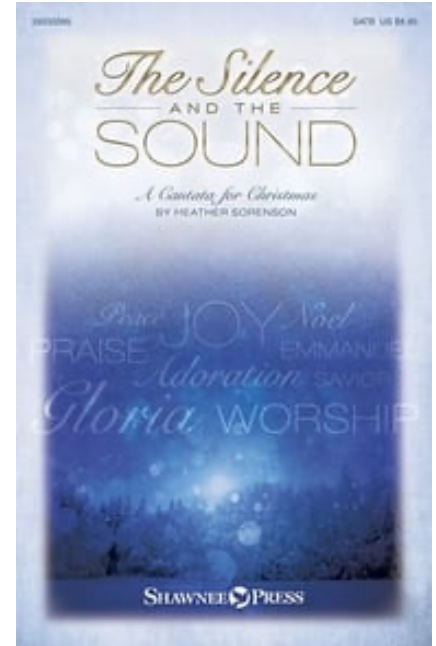


Music Ministry

*It is always fascinating to hear stories of how God has worked in someone's life to bring them to where they are today. Enjoy this testimony of God's goodness in the life of **Ruth Castillo Baker**.*



I built my roots in the Midwest. As a young child, my family transplanted there from Texas, a single mother and seven siblings, to be close to family. My father died by suicide. I did not know him well. Years later, I learned that he was not a good man. Due to alcohol abuse, he made bad choices, and we were not safe around him.

I remember that my childhood was surrounded by neglect, abuse, and addiction in many forms. As a young child, I didn't know anything else. I heard about God through Bible stories and even attended church on occasion with my aunt, but I didn't know who He was. To my small awareness, I viewed it as a fictional character in a storybook. At the age of eight, my aunt asked me if I wanted to accept Jesus in my heart. I didn't really understand what that meant, but I agreed to it. All I recall after that is her words to me that, "I can talk to him anytime." I feel like I held on to those words dearly throughout my life.

I was a young mom and wife struggling to find purpose in my choices. I always felt like there was something missing. I would pray to God, not really understanding how that worked. After a divorce, I spent many years living in my emptiness and anger, a deep depression and bitterness set in for the many reasons that my mind told me I should feel that way because of abuse. I lived in a desperate mindset for acceptance and belonging. I was always trying to find my purpose and walk the narrow path, but I was easily distracted by worldly things and lost my way again. Grasping for anything but God only left me hopeless and confused.

I found myself lost and alone raising two children, trying to just survive in an uncertain world. I was desperately praying to know God better and for a way out of the madness I was enduring. Then along came faith-based missionaries knocking on my door. When we're lost, I believe God allows people to cross our paths for a reason. It was what I needed at that time. It gave me hope that I could learn about God. I began a new pathway to building a foundation I never knew I had access to. I loved being accepted and having a sense of fulfillment. I met my husband Robin there and had two more children. After dedicating a couple of decades to this organization, I noticed that my heart was still yearning for something more. I began searching for a true personal relationship with God and his Son, Jesus Christ. A few years into this search, I realized I had to look within myself first for true forgiveness. True healing doesn't start until you're ready to accept forgiveness, and then God will heal your broken heart. The realization of how Jesus sacrificed His life for me as a sinner changed me forever.

The journey was long, but this year, I surrendered all to my Lord God. I am no longer the driver of my spiritual vessel. He is my refuge—my first and my last. Firsthand witness to His redeeming love and mercy now lives in my soul. I have released the bondage to my past trauma, and I am transformed with a new freedom and inner peace, knowing that Jesus is walking with me. I had a second chance with a new meaning and purpose to God's will for my life. Then, He led me here to Rockland Community Church. On my first visit, all my senses told me that this was the place for me. I felt welcomed and loved by those who crossed my path that day. I didn't doubt that this is where I would find Jesus. On my next visit, I invited my husband to join me. Only through God's grace and mercy, He has restored our marriage. I could not live my life without His guidance. I've been so blessed to be involved with believers who love Jesus. Robin and I now call Rockland Church and beautiful Colorado our home forever.

Four Perennial Worldview Questions

The Disciple Ministry hosted another Rockland Talks, the fifth in our series, featuring Dr Douglas Groothuis, who provided a Christian apologetics response to four critical questions of the ages. We had another great evening with people attending from inside and outside Rockland.

Dr. Douglas Groothuis, head of the Masters Apologetics program at Denver Seminary and author of 19 books, gave prepared comments for about 45 minutes, followed by an extended Q&A. He systemically and thoroughly covered the ultimate questions of our origin, morality, meaning, and destiny.



1. Origin – Doug provided the evidence and logic, based upon modern scientific discoveries of the twentieth century, that reinforced and supported the inspired writings found in Genesis, leading us to conclude that atheism, polytheism, and pantheism are false doctrines. He further discussed how the Bible comports with the state of humanity and nature of man across the millennium and the need for a Savior from our wretchedness.
2. Morality – Doug quickly dispensed of moral relativism and made the case for absolute, transcendent truths of right and wrong that have been imprinted on man's heart.
3. Meaning – Doug discussed how one's purpose in life is based upon one's worldview. Meaning the answer to questions #1 and #2, derive the responses to questions #3 and #4. A Christian seeks to glorify God and build His Kingdom by loving God and loving your neighbor.
4. Destiny – If atheism (no God), then extinction, and if pantheism (pre-existing universe), then reincarnation. For the Christian, you have been saved from death by Grace and may spend eternal life with God.

It is hard to do justice to Doug's densely packed content on the subject matter, which he has spent the better part of his life thinking about, studying, speaking with clarity and authority, and cogently writing. To that end, we should have a YouTube recap of this Rockland Talks available shortly and will make sure you will be notified when it is ready for viewing.

We started Rockland Talks with the premise that we wanted to help Christians deepen their biblical worldview and help us all "*See the World the Way God Sees it.*" Rockland Talks represents the intersection of politics, culture, and faith. As Christians, we recognize that everything from ideology to culture to values is based on one's view of God. The proverbial "fork in the road" where Americans parted ways can be fundamentally and finally traced back to one's view of God. What a society thinks about God matters, as do their corresponding culture of ideas. That is your worldview. Given this context, we host two events per year to bring insight and commentary from Christian speakers, writers, and thinkers.

Rockland Talks is part of our Discipleship Ministry and fits within our overall purpose to:

1. Go and make disciples of Jesus Christ (Matt 28).
2. Help equip and mature the saints (Eph 4:12) to advance and defend the faith with your families, in your communities, and in the public square.

Our next Rockland Talks is scheduled for Thursday evening, **April 18, 2024**, featuring author, professor, and speaker Dr Greg Jesson, PhD, who will cover the topic of the Problem of Evil: If God is Good, Why Does Evil Exist?

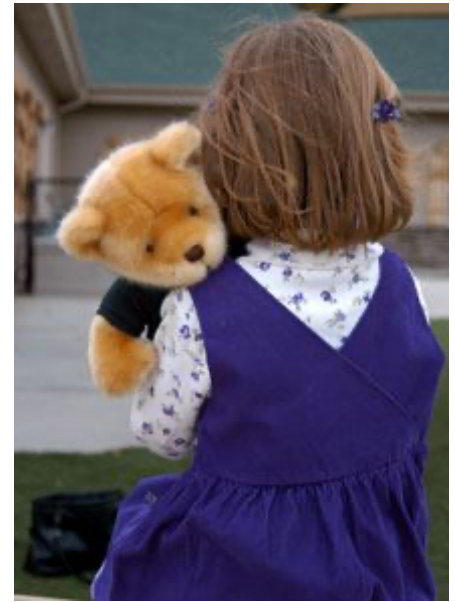
Deputy Hugs

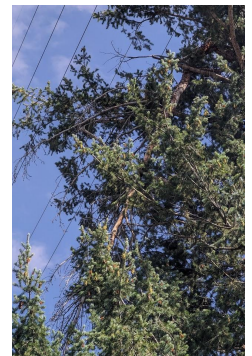
